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

kitchen will be installed in June and the floor lowered by the end of the summer. We are still fighting the contractors over the state of the churchyard. Thanks for your patience.




Census 2021 results for Feltwell Ward—Religion and Qualifications

The census results and data that follow were made available in June 2022 but it is only now that I've had space in the magazine to include these analyses.

To start with I have extracted information on the declared religion of usual residents and households in the Feltwell Ward. There were 57 possible answers to the question and in the list that follows is every answer chosen by at least one respondent.

Of the **6328** respondents **433** did NOT answer the question, **3081** described themselves as Christian and **2720** said that they had no religion. The remainder of the answers is shown on the graph below.



Sticking with Feltwell Ward we'll move on to look at the breakdown based upon the Highest level of Qualification. There are 8 categories in this data set as follows:

- Does not apply
- No qualifications
- Level 1 and entry level qualifications: 1 to 4 GCSEs grade A* to C, Any GCSEs at other grades, O levels or CSEs (any grades), 1 AS level, NVQ level 1, Foundation GNVQ, Basic or Essential Skills


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- Level 2 qualifications: 5 or more GCSEs (A* to C or 9 to 4), O levels (passes), CSEs (grade 1), School Certification, 1 A level, 2 to 3 AS levels, VCEs, Intermediate or Higher Diploma, Welsh Baccalaureate Intermediate Diploma, NVQ level 2, Intermediate GNVQ, City and Guilds Craft, BTEC First or General Diploma, RSA Diploma
- Apprenticeship
- Level 3 qualifications: 2 or more A levels or VCEs, 4 or more AS levels, Higher School Certificate, Progression or Advanced Diploma, Welsh Baccalaureate Advance Diploma, NVQ level 3; Advanced GNVQ, City and Guilds Advanced Craft, ONC, OND, BTEC National, RSA Advanced Diploma
- Level 4 qualifications or above: degree (BA, BSc), higher degree (MA, PhD, PGCE), NVQ level 4 to 5, HNC, HND, RSA Higher Diploma, BTEC Higher level, professional qualifications (for example, teaching, nursing, accountancy)
- Other: vocational or work-related qualifications, other qualifications achieved in England or Wales, qualifications achieved outside England or Wales (equivalent not stated or unknown)



6321 people answered this question.

MANY MOURNERS AT FUNERAL IN FELTWELLL

The funeral of Mr William Bensley took place at Feltwell on Thursday week. The cortege was met at St Nicholas' Church by the Rector and fourteen boys of the choir, under the leadership of Mr J. H. Fassnidge fully surpliced. (Mr Bensley had been a member of this choir for several years.)

The bearers were Messrs. F. E. Rudland, H. Lawrence, W.H. Beamis and J. Hicks, the first three of whom were fellow choristers. The Rev. Wilkinson was assisted by the Rev. T. J. Davis, a nephew of the deceased. Mrs J. A. Steward was the organist....

...The internment took place in the churchyard and the coffin was inscribed:

"WILLIAM BENSLEY, died November 5th, 1933, aged 72 years."

THE MOURNERS

The immediate mourners were Mrs W. Bensley (widow), Mr & Mrs A. Bensley (brother and sister-in-law), Mr & Mrs J.F. Brecon, the Rev & Mrs T.J. Davis (nephews and nieces) and Mr. Wadham.

There then follows a list of 94 other mourners.

In an additional note from local historian Pip Orange – I remember Mr Bensley and his wife (Tillie) as a very nice and friendly old couple who lived in Cock Street (now High St).

Before retirement Mr Bensley was in service with Mr & Mrs C.E. Butler of Framlingham Hall, near Norwich, I believe as a butler. They lived at No. 22, High Street.

Scam Alert - Fake listings on Facebook marketplace

We are warning Norfolk residents to be vigilant when buying second-hand goods online after receiving a number of reports of people losing money after responding to a fake Facebook Marketplace advert.

In these cases the item was being advertised for around £30 or the purchaser was asked to pay a 'small deposit' on a higher priced item. The seller claimed they would post the item to the purchaser's home after the money had been paid via bank transfer. However, once the money had been transferred the purchaser was unable to make further contact with the seller and the item did not arrive.

We are advising residents to be cautious when purchasing items using second hand selling sites, especially if you are asked to pay directly into a private individual's bank account or told that the item will be delivered to you after payment has been received. We recommend to never pay for an item before seeing it in person.

Scam Alert – Recovery room scams

We are warning residents to be on their guard for telephone cold calls claiming to be able to 'recover money lost in a scam'.

This follows a report from a Norfolk resident who had previously invested a small amount in cryptocurrency via a website. During the call, the cold caller claimed this website was a scam and they could recover the money lost. At this point the resident declined the offer and ended the call.

'Recovery room' scams are where cold callers target consumers who have previously lost money, often to investment scams, and use high pressure selling techniques to persuade the call recipient that they can recover this money. The cold caller will then claim fees need to be paid, often for items like solicitors, taxes or administration charges which can total more than was lost to the initial scam.

Our advice is to always be very wary of claims made during a cold call, even if the caller appears to have basic personal information about you. If the caller is claiming they can recover losses from a scam, **do not** give or confirm any details and **hang up**.

Scam Alert – Telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Amazon'

We are again warning residents to be on their guard for telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Amazon'.

We continue to receive reports from Norfolk residents of recorded message calls claiming to be from Amazon. Previously these have included:

- That 'you are required to make a payment of £399 to your Amazon account'. The call then states you can 'press 1 to speak to an advisor'
- That 'an order of £700 has place for an iPhone, if this isn't you please press
 1'
- That 'a payment has been taken to renew your Amazon Prime subscription'. The call then states you can 'press 1 to cancel the payment'
- That 'a purchase costing £1,000 has been made on your Amazon account'. The call then states you can 'press 1 if you did not make this purchase'
- That '£1,000 has been charged to your Amazon account'. The call then states you can 'press 1 to speak to the Amazon fraud team'

Where residents have interacted with the call, they have then been connected to a person who attempts to gather personal, account or financial details.

These calls are a scam and are **not** connected with Amazon in any way. If you receive this or a similar call our advice is **do not** interact with the call and hang up.

Amazon have put together some helpful tips on how to identify if a phone call is from them. This information can be found on the <u>Amazon UK</u> website

Scam Alert – Emails claiming to be a 'Warrant' or 'Notice of Prosecution'

We are warning residents about a number of scam emails which are circulating which claim to be 'warrants', 'notice of prosecution' or 'notice of court proceedings.

The emails carry a range of logos including the Metropolitan Police, the National Crime Agency and the Children's Commissioner.

The emails claim they are from senior officers within the Metropolitan Police and make false claims about illegal online activity undertaken by the email recipient. It goes on to claim the recipient has a limited number of hours to provide an 'explanation' and 'supporting documents' to prevent arrest and prosecution.

These emails are **fake**. This type of approach is used to panic people into responding which often leads to the scammers offering to 'settle' the case for a sizeable 'fine' payment.

If you receive this or a similar email or any other suspicious email it can be reported to the <u>National Cyber Security Centre</u> by forwarding the email to <u>report@phishing.gov.uk</u>.

Scam Alert – Telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Hello Fresh'

We are warning residents to be on their guard for telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Hello Fresh'. During the call the cold caller claims that the



MUTTERINGS FROM THE FARMYARD

As I write these notes in May we are beginning to see the crops that are in the ground really start to grow away and give some idea of their potential for harvest. The wheat and rye are growing apace and it is always encouraging to begin to see the rows of sugar beet and onions that we planted this spring. These crops are planted with precision equipment to provide a crop density of about 630,000 onion plants per hectare and 115,000 sugar beet plants. This is to achieve maximum yield with the optimum size of onion.


March and April have been so wet that farmers in many parts of the country have had great difficulty getting all their crops established. I must say that our free draining soils here have allowed us to get everything in the ground in reasonable time and even the very small seeds that we drilled on our environmental areas have had moisture and are growing away.

The big project for this spring is the planting of 31,000 vines on about 20 acres of gently sloping ground. We have a specialist contract team coming with a planting machine controlled by satellite to provide dead straight rows and precision spacing. These vines should all be in the ground by the end of May. We are planting some traditional champagne varieties for English Sparkling Wine but also some much newer German hybrids that are much more disease resistant and better suited to the English climate. Unfortunately, we don't expect to pick any meaningful amounts of grapes until 2026!

I have previously written about our plan to plant trees on some very poor land for carbon capture. We still expect to do this in 2023 for a government backed project as part of their Net Zero by 2050 aim. However, despite the fact that some 500 acres were planted successfully near Thetford last year, some of the Government agencies are still moving at a snail's pace in terms of approving our project. We have satisfied them that there is nothing of archeological interest here but they are still looking for deep peat on fields that are as sandy as Holkham beach. It looks as if the planting will take place much later in the year than would be ideal but there will be a system of trickle irrigation to support the saplings in their early years.

We are still concerned about the availability of water for irrigation this year. Despite the wet spring many aquifers are still not completely replenished and some growers have not been able to refill their reservoirs. On this farm we rely on surface water from dykes and what we really do not want is another scorching summer like 2022.

It was this last paragraph and a chance conversation that led me to the Anglian Water website where I discovered their plans for creating hundreds of kilometres of new, interconnecting water





### WILDLIFE CRIME IN NORFOLK

I am pleased to say this month hasn't seen any major issues. PC Holmes has completed an investigation in to a bat roost entrance being destroyed/blocked. This was done without the correct mitigation in place at the time this has since been implemented and the individual involved has been dealt with using an out of court disposal. There is no excuse when it comes to wildlife for not understanding the law when carrying out work around protected species, please be mindful of this.

We have seen a number of reports of nesting birds being disturbed or nests destroyed by hedge work. A couple of these reports remain under review as to whether they meet the criminal threshold - it is a criminal offence to destroy any nest which is being built or active. Where possible please avoid doing any work on trees and hedges until the end of the Summer.

Over the last week we have also received a report of a number of dead ducks and pigeons turning up in Swaffham, evidence suggest these have been killed using ball bearings. We are looking at investigative opportunities in relation to this but if anyone knows anything about this matter is encouraged to contact us.

#### **CLOSED FISHING SEASON**

Since March 15 the closed fishing season has been in place and remains in place until June 15. During this time, its an offence to fish on any rivers in the county and we will continue patrol key areas alongside our Environment Agency colleagues.



The reason for the closed season is it allows our native species to spawn and repopulate our rivers for the year ahead. The closed season does not apply to most private fishing lakes and similar but some clubs do impose their own rules so be mindful of this when heading to the lakes.

#### **OPERATION EASTER**

The national enforcement campaign to protect our nesting wild birds is underway for 2023.

Egg thieves will go to any lengths to raid the nests of rare wild birds. Operation EASTER is determined to stop them in their tracks.

The taking of wild bird eggs is a serious crime yet it remains an illicit hobby for some determined individuals. Whole clutches of eggs can be taken from some of the UK's rarest birds with potentially devastating impacts. The eggs are stored in secret collections.

Operation EASTER was developed in Scotland 26 years ago. The operation is now facilitated by the National Wildlife Crime Unit (NWCU) in conjunction with police forces and partner agencies across the UK. The operation targets egg thieves by sharing intelligence and supporting enforcement action.

In recent years, the operation has also been expanded to cover some emerging trends of criminal behaviour such as the online trade in eggs and the disturbance of nests for photography.

If you have any information on egg thieves, or those who disturb rare nesting birds without a license, you should contact your local police by dialling 101 - ask to speak to a wildlife crime officer if possible.

Information can also be passed in confidence to Crimestoppers via 0800 555 111.

#### **BUILDING SITE THEFTS**

Unfortunately, we are still seeing a number of the thefts from building sites. This is including everything from small plant, tools, and fuel. If you see something unusual at any of your local building and development sites please get in contact. If it doesn't look right its likely to not be!

We continue to encourage anyone who owns any tools or equipment to mark it suitably, so it is clearly marked as yours with postcode and name

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#### What Happened In The Countryside In May

May brought us the moment to finally say Spring has sprung and summer is on the way. The daffodils wilted away to be replaced with tulips in all the different colours of the modern varieties. Snowdrops sat leaf building reserves for next year and bluebells appeared in forests. We are lucky in Norfolk to have some amazing bluebell forests; it is an offence to uproot any wild plant but bluebells are afforded additional protection so please enjoy the spectacle but please do not take these wild flowers. If you want to do your little bit now is a great time to plant some wildflower seeds.

If you step into our woodlands at this time of year, particularly in the early morning, you're welcomed with an absolute chorus of birds. Many of our native birds are now in full swing - looking after egg clutches and rearing young as the month goes on, please keep your distance from nests. Also, be mindful some smaller birds (always seems to be blue tits from experience) like to nest in obscure places (letter boxes, cigarette disposal bins, and even bins themselves) wherever they nest they are protected and need our help.

On our livestock farms most of the animals kept inside over the winter period were turned out to the meadows and marshes. I am sure you will have seen lambs doing well in the fields in recent weeks and you will have noticed just how quickly they grew.

Due to the rather odd spring weather, our grass crops are a little behind as grass requires some warmth to really kick start its growth and, whilst we have had the odd warmer day, they have often been flanked with frosts either side stunting the growth. Despite the odd weather the first cut of silage was made. Silage is a vital feed for livestock over the winter period, its basically the preserving of grass and all its goodness to feed them during the cold months.

Along a similar theme, our arable farms have struggled to get the spring crops in the ground after an above average wet past couple of months. The oil seed rape was also noticeably late coming into flower. May is a vital time for arable farmers, especially in Norfolk, in getting next years sugar beet crop into the ground, if it isn't already, alongside fertiliser and insecticide programs. The industry is always looking at ways to reduce these inputs not only because of the current cost but also for the environment but they remain essential if we are to produce as much food as we need. Farmers and landowners do a huge amount for our environment so much of it goes unnoticed, one which you can't fail to notice at this time of year is the Lapwing scrapes. These are small pieces of land in a field which appear to have no crop growing and these are designed to give the vulnerable ground nesting bird somewhere to lay its eggs safely. Many are also reinstating hedge lines lost over the last 100 years, installing beetle banks, turning field margins to wild flower margins and more. Lauren, Mark & Sam Skinner

It was about 10 years ago when a group of us invited Lindsay Peacock to sample a hands-on gliding experience at Wattisham Airfield. Last Tuesday, 2<sup>nd</sup> May, we invited him again to our stage, this time, at the



Mundford Bowls Club. He is well known in aeronautical circles as an editor of Jane's Encyclopaedia of Aviation and has self-penned several books on various fighter types. His presentation at our meeting provided an account of his experiences at Fairford over the last twenty odd years. This is where the internationally renowned Royal International Aircraft Tattoo is held each year. He worked there as a media escort and was often in the privileged position of enjoying free rides in modern fighter aircraft and meeting some influential people: last year there were four British veterans present, together with one aging WW2 Luftwaffe pilot.

The weather is invariably inclement at Fairford and on one occasion the rain stopped when Queen Elizabeth arrived to honour the event; after she left, the rain commenced its invasion. When it was suggested to Lindsay that he was a bit of a name dropper he seemed somewhat affronted but soon mellowed when it was advised that the targets would have been honoured by his exposés.

Not only was Lindsay's photographic material extensive but also colourful: extensive because some of his aerial shots of stationary aircraft were taken from a cherry picker and, colourful, because the livery of many of the subjects was extreme to the point of psychedelia and animalia, with cues taken from orcas, zebras and, would you believe, peacocks; perhaps the plumage adorning the fuselage of the Indian helicopter display team was an attempt to pay tribute to our speaker.

On the question of extremes it has to be said that Lindsay has experienced a few: let's not forget the cherry picker which takes off but doesn't always come down; let's not forget the Wattisham glider winch which, during take-off, induced the greatest adrenalin rush he had ever experienced. 




Our Taster day is after I forwarded this to the editor, I will update in the next issue.



#### **BITTERNS AND HARRIERS**

One of our main jobs at this time of year is bird monitoring. It's our best measure of whether the management we are doing in creating and maintaining the reedbeds is working, or not! April and May tend to be the busiest months for surveys as it is when birdsong is at its best. June however is much quieter. Most birds have found a mate, nested and will be either busy feeding young or back on second broods.

This works in our favour, particularly for two of our key species such as marsh harrier and bittern. To do this, we spend up to four hours at a time, looking over reedbed for signs of nesting and feeding young – it's a tough job but someone has to do it! These are usually co-ordinated between a team of staff and volunteer surveyors, who sit at known points with radio's and maps to track and record flight patterns and behaviour.

Marsh harriers are quite straightforward. We wait for males to come in with food, who does a fancy food pass/drop to the female, who hopefully will catch it! If they have young chicks, she'll take it back to the nest and carefully tear off little bits to fit in little mouths. As the chicks get older and more demanding, both the male and female will take larger prey straight into the nest for the chicks to sort it out themselves. Grass will often be brought in too, just to keep the nest a bit cleaner. When the young are ready to leave the nest, the adults will circle above the nest with food and the fledglings fly up to catch the meal, often tussling with each other over who gets it!

Bittern nest watches can be a bit more tricky. We rely on the females flying to and from feeding sites back to the nest. Three or more flights over the four hours would count as a nest. Timings help to determine whether she's likely to be fishing or brooding as when the young are small she'll spend less time fishing and more time brooding, and as the chicks get older, she'll spend more time out fishing. However, this is much more tricky in practice as bitterns unfortunately don't read textbooks, and our birds sometimes walk to fishing spots or fly very low along channels, which means we don't see them! However with perseverance and patience, we do come up with a fairly accurate picture of what is happening.

#### SOCIAL TARIFFS: CHEAPER BROADBAND AND PHONE PACKAGES

Social tariffs are cheaper broadband and phone packages for people claiming Universal Credit, Pension Credit and some other benefits. Some providers call them 'essential' or 'basic' broadband.

They're delivered in the same way as normal packages, just at a lower price.

#### How a social tariff could help you

- It's available to those on a variety of benefits. If you or someone in your household claims Universal Credit, you could switch to any of the tariffs available.
- It's cheaper than a regular package. Current prices range from £10 to £20.
- **Fast, unlimited broadband.** Most tariffs offer superfast broadband at speeds over 30 Mbit/s fast enough for you to keep in touch with friends and family, stream HD films or shop online.
- You'll pay next-to-nothing to get set up. If you do have to pay any setup costs, these should only be small. Your provider should tell you before you sign up.
- It could cost nothing to switch. If your provider offers a social tariff, you can switch to it at any time, free of charge.
- The price won't go up mid-contract. You won't pay any more than what you agree at the start of the contract.
- It costs nothing to leave. You won't pay a fee to leave the tariff before the end of your contract.

#### Who could qualify

If you or someone in your household claims Universal Credit, you could switch to any of the tariffs available.

All major providers also include people on Pension Credit, Employment and Support Allowance, Jobseeker's Allowance and Income Support.

Some providers might include additional benefits, like Personal Independence Payment and Attendance Allowance.

The person receiving the benefit needs to be the main person on the contract.

#### How to apply

First, check if your current provider offers a social tariff. BT, EE, Sky and Vodafone do plus many smaller providers. You can apply for most tariffs online, or call your provider and ask to switch.

If your provider doesn't offer a social tariff, you can switch to one that does. Your provider might let you leave your current contract without paying a penalty fee.

## **Breckland Branch**

For many of us trying to make a vet appointment for our pet seems to be a lot harder than it used to be.



Appointments can be difficult to come by and sometimes, especially if the visit is for a non-urgent issue, you may be asked to wait a few weeks.

One of the biggest problems facing the veterinary industry is the huge increase in pet ownership over the last few years, particularly since the pandemic when thousands of us took on cats and dogs for companionship during lockdown. Social distancing rules and enhanced cleaning protocols meant each appointment took twice as long and, unable to work with their usual efficiency, veterinary practices simply couldn't offer as many appointments. As a result, routine appointments and surgeries were put on hold, and priority was given to the most urgent cases. This all caused a huge backlog of pets needing appointments. Although the situation is largely resolved, for many clinics, the ongoing demand of a larger pet population is still causing issues.

The second reason for a lack of appointments lies in the falling number of veterinary professionals available to meet the increase in demand. Brexit played a major role, with many EU vets leaving the UK. This left the profession understaffed and many more veterinary professionals have since left practice due to burnout, long hours, poor work-life balance and mental and physical stressors. The current mismatch in supply and demand means that life is getting harder for the vets and nurses still remaining in practice. Sadly, with fewer staff there comes the obvious corresponding reduction in available appointments.

While the profession struggles to meet demand, it is important to remember that our vets do want to help, and they want to do it to the best of their ability, they will do their best to fit you in, but unfortunately this may mean a wait time a little longer than we are used to.

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The Annual Parish Meeting was held on Monday the 15th of MAY 2022 in the British Legion, Long Lane. Ten Councillors
 attended and 20 members of the public

Clerk gave a report of the Rawlins Charity accounts.

The Chair said each planning application was considered in depth as to how it would affect the parish and as the proposed route for the planning applications was on the edge of the village, not through it, and smells/pollution met environmental standards, it was decided the village would not be affected and no objection was made.

Mr Storey gave the latest position on the planning applications and said the Borough Council was currently in the process of obtaining further information required by three of the consultees. Once obtained, he said it was possible local Parish Councils would be consulted again and this would probably be in September but would depend on how long the information took to gather. A resident then asked the Parish Council to request a public consultation and it was agreed to be looked into if the Parish Council is consulted again.

The **Annual Meeting** of the Parish Council followed the above meeting. Ten Councillors attended and 4 members of the public.

Mr Rayner was duly re-elected as Chairman and Mr Lambert as Vice-Chairman.

Mr Fenn will represent the Parish Council on the Internal Drainage Board.

Residents are encouraged to deposit any glass waste into the bottle bank on the playing field as the Parish Council can obtain recycling credits for every tonne collected.
