#### **SCIENCE WEEK at EDM**

The whole school of Edmund De Moundeford Primary School in Feltwell took part in a variety of activities for British Science Week which ran nationally from the 10<sup>th</sup> March to the 19<sup>th</sup> March. The science lead – Michelle Harding – was keen to further engage children with this subject and develop children's curiosity and interests with the world in which they live. "It has been a fantastic week with some amazing learning and the children have also learnt about careers linked with this subject which we hope to further promote in the schools Big Me day next term."

Children in the Year 2 class, Owls, were able to share their science learning with parents and family members during an open afternoon. Linking with the classes recent learning around fairy tales they were able to build different bridges for the goats to cross, test out transport for Cinderella and plant a bean ready for Jack. 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# How the population changed in King's Lynn and West Norfolk (KLWN): Census 2021 results

The census results and data that follow were made available in June 2022 but I have been unable to publish them in the magazine owing to page count limitations. Now that a couple of series have finished space has become available.

The population of England and Wales has increased by more than 3.5 million in the 10 years leading up to Census 2021. Using the first results from the census, we can look at which places have seen the biggest increases and decreases, which areas had the largest growth in different age groups, and how KLWN compare with others.

The English region with the largest population increase was the East of England, which grew by around 8.3% or 488,000 more residents. The English region with the smallest increase was the North East, growing by 1.9% or around 50,000 people.

In KLWN, the population size has increased by 4.6%, from around 147,500 in 2011 to 154,300 in 2021. This is lower than the overall increase for England (6.6%), where the population grew by nearly 3.5 million to 56,489,800.

Nearby areas like Breckland and South Holland have seen their populations increase by around 8.4% and 7.7%, respectively, while others such as East Cambridgeshire saw an increase of 4.6% and North Norfolk saw smaller growth (1.5%).

At 4.6%, KLWN's population increase is lower than the increase for the East of England (8.3%).

There were 434 residents per square kilometre in England in 2021, up from 407 per square kilometre in 2011. Population density varies from area to area. We can see the difference between local authority areas if we measure the land in football pitches and work out how many people there would be on each one. To put all these figures into some sort of context we can say that there are three people for every football pitch-sized piece of land in England.

As of 2021, KLWN is the second least densely populated of the East of England's 45 local authority areas, with an area equivalent to around one football pitch per resident. Tower Hamlets is 112.


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

There were more people than ever aged 65 years and over in England. The population has continued to age. Across England, more than one in six people (18.4%) were aged 65 years and over on Census Day in 2021. This is a higher percentage than ever before.

The largest age group in 2021 in the East of England was those aged 50 to 54 years. In England, the largest age group in 2021 was people aged 30 to 34 years.

Overall, in England, there has been an increase of 20.1% in people aged 65 years and over, an increase of 3.6% in people aged 15 to 64 years, and an increase of 5.0% in children aged under 15 years.

This is how KLWN compares. There has been an increase of 17.9% in people aged 65 years and over, a decrease of 0.1% in people aged 15 to 64 years, and an increase of 3.8% in children aged under 15 years.

RAF Feltwell to close: over 100 men will lose jobs

OVER 100 CIVILIANS WORKING AT RAF. FELTWELL WILL LOSE THEIR JOBS FOLLOWING THE DECISION BY THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE TO CLOSE THE STATION GRADUALLY BETWEEN MARCH AND AUGUST NEXT YEAR.

It was built in 1937 as a bomber station, became a flying school after the war and was the R.A.F.'s first strategic missile site. Since 1963 it has been used as an officer cadet centre and radio training squadron.

The 451 Service personnel will be moved to other stations - the officer training unit to Henlow and the radio squadron to Cosford.

The whole station will close except for a small number of personnel.

The news was broken to the civilians today by the Acting C.O. Wing Commander R. Jell, who afterwards told the "E.E.N." that they were "naturally disappointed," but they took it very well.

#### **Rumours**

Rumours, he said, had been circulating about the closure ever since they moved in two years ago, but rumour had only just turned to fact.

In a letter to Mr Paul Hawkins, M.P. for South-West Norfolk, an official of the Ministry said: "I am afraid that by the time the move has been completed all the civilian employees will become redundant in their present jobs"

There are 178 civilians—including 75 established ones—and about 40 Ministry of Public Building and Works employees. The letter adds: "Established civilians who are under 60 years of age will be offered other Government appointments although this may not necessarily be in the same area. The Ministry shall, of course, do all it can in conjunction with the local office of the Ministry of Labour to help all those who leave the service to find other jobs'.

There would be certain "terminal benefits' available, the letter adds.

#### 'Severe loss'

Mr. Hawkins, who was at a passing-out parade at the camp only a week ago, when there was no hint of the closure, said today: "The closure of Feltwell, which has served the nation so well during and after the war, will be a severe loss to the whole district, particularly the village of Feltwell.

"The station will be missed not only for the employment given and the money spent in the shops, garages and other businesses, but also for the excellent social and recreational facilities made available. It has about the only indoor sports stadium in the Eastern area and facilities for gliding.

"Now we must use every endeavour to see that the station, with its many excellent houses and buildings, is put to as good a use as possible...

He added. "I know Mr. Maxwell, the county planning officer, with whom I have been in touch today, and his department, will do all they can to interest industrial and other concerns to come here by that time.

#### Jobs

"Certainly I will do all I can as I know the employment officer will, to find jobs for those thrown out of work here."

The village postmaster at Feltwell, Mr. F. O. W. Ingham, said: "This will hit the whole village considerably."

He estimated that 25 per cent of the male working population were employed at the camp and he did not know what would happen to them. He thought possibly that Brandon or Thetford might be able to absorb them.

There were no industries in the village, he said, but a number of people worked on the land. Some of those made redundant could perhaps do this work. Mr Ingram did not expect that there would be any mass migration from the village following this announcement.

Mr H.G. Hill, the Downham Market Employment Exchange manager, whose area includes Feltwell, said: "I don't think we want to start a scare at the moment. I think we shall be able to fit in those who are young enough and able enough to work."

Feltwell was built as a bomber station. It carried out this role throughout the war, and then became a flying school. Later it became the R.A.F.'s first strategic missile site, and its present occupants moved in in 1963.

## **LATEST CONSUMER ALERTS AND TRADING STANDARDS NEWS**

#### Scam Alert – Emails claiming to be from 'TV Licensing'

There continues to be a range of emails circulating claiming to be from TV Licencing. Common themes for these emails are claims that there is an issue with your direct debit and then provides a link to enable the recipient to resolve the 'issue'.

These emails are not from TV Licencing and any links contained within the message are likely to go to a genuine looking fake version of the TV Licencing website which will attempt to gather personal and financial details.

Our advice is always to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and never click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

TV Licensing offer the following advice to help spot scam TV Licence emails:

- Check the sender Genuine TV Licensing emails are sent from donotreply@tvlicensing.co.uk or donotreply@spp.tvlicensing.co.uk
- Partial postcode If you have provided us with your postcode details, our emails will include part of your postcode and/or the name on the licence
- Look for your name If you've given us your name, then we'll always
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  address you as "Dear client" or "Dear customer" or just use your email
  address (or part of it)
- Check the spelling and grammar Because scammers can't use our genuine TV Licensing web addresses or email addresses, they'll try to use slightly different spellings – look out for things like hyphens and full stops in odd places. Be suspicious too if there are mistakes in the email with capital letters or other grammatical errors, like missing full stops – this could be a scam
- Check the links Be wary of emails promising money/refunds. For example, phrases such as, "click below to access your refund", followed by a request to provide your credit card or bank details (we would never process a refund in this way). Always check links in an email before clicking or tapping them
- If you're on a computer Hover over the link (but don't click it). This will reveal the name of the web address that you are being sent to

If you're on a smartphone or tablet - Press and hold on the link (don't release while you are on the link). This will reveal the name of the web address that you are being sent to.

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#### Scam Alert – WhatsApp account take over scam

We are highlighting an alert from Action Fraud after they received over 60 reports relating to a scam that steals access to a WhatsApp user's account.

The scam begins when a criminal gets access to another WhatsApp account which has you listed as a contact. The criminal, posing as your friend or someone that's a member of a WhatsApp group you're in, will then send you seemingly normal messages to try and start a conversation with you.

However, around the same time you will receive a text message from WhatsApp with a six-digit code. This is because the criminal has been trying to login to WhatsApp using your mobile number. The criminal will claim that they sent you their code by accident and ask you to help them by sending it to them. Once the criminal has this code, they can login to your WhatsApp account and lock you out.

The criminal will then use the same tactic with your WhatsApp contacts in an effort to steal more accounts and use them to perpetrate fraud.

#### What you need to do

- Set up two-step verification to give an extra layer of protection to your account: Tap Settings > Account >Two-step verification > Enable.
- **Think, Call.** If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person to confirm their identity.
- Never share your account's activation code (that's the 6 digit code you receive via SMS)

You can report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions

# Scam Alert – Automated telephone cold calls about 'unauthorised transactions'

We are warning residents about automated telephone calls that claim they are from 'your bank' about 'unauthorised transactions'.

The calls, which are often spoofed to appear on caller ID as if they are from a local number, state that they have 'detected two charges on your card'. The message then giving details for these transactions, often for several hundred pounds each. These messages will often use well known names like 'Amazon' and 'Apple' for these transactions or will claim they are for 'foreign money transfer services'.

At this point the recording states that you can 'press 1 if you do not recognise these transactions'.

These calls are a **scam** and the claims made are **not genuine**. They are designed to panic the recipient into handing over personal and account

information to prevent these fictitious transactions going though.

If you receive this, or a similar call, **do not** interact with it in any way and **hang up**.

It is likely there are several variations of these calls stating different transactions, amounts and actions that can be taken.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account or credit card contact your bank or service provider directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or app. **Never** use details provided in a cold call.

#### Scam Alert - Investment Scams

We are continuing to receive reports of individuals falling victim to investment scams. Losses to these scams can range from a few hundred to several thousand pounds.

Common investment scams where you're offered the chance to put money into things like shares, cryptocurrencies, gemstones, or fine wines.

The promise is that these will rocket in value.

In reality, what you are being offered is often over-priced, very risky and difficult to sell on.

Most of these so-called investments are run from overseas and may not be authorised by the UK's Financial Services Authority. As a result, there is almost no chance of getting your money back if things go wrong.

#### **Protect yourself**

- Be very sceptical about calls out of the blue or online adverts from companies you don't know offering shares and other investments – especially if they're 'guaranteed' or 'risk-free'
- Get independent financial advice before making any investment
- Never sign up to anything immediately or if you're told to keep the deal confidential

Make sure the firm is on the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) register of authorised firms, you can check the list by visiting the <u>FCA website</u>

Which? Have put together useful guidance on how to spot an investment scam which can be found on the Which? website.





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## **BOOK LAUNCH AT THE WELLINGTON**

On Monday 3rd April a packed restaurant room at the Wellington listened to New Zealand author Rohan West talk about his new novel *Find Your North Star*. He described it as historical fiction based on the history of his great uncle who was a navigator and bomb aimer for 75 New Zealand squadron based out of Feltwell in 1942.

This is Rohan's second book, his first being based upon the lives of his maternal grandparents who had a forbidden romance and was called *Broken Vows*. His grandfather was a Catholic priest who fell in love with a nurse. This led to a split in the family and a rejection of his grandparents by the rest of the family. Eventually his great-uncle Jim began to reconnect with his brother and this, together with Jim's exploits in the NZ air force is the inspiration of Rohan's second novel. Jim's experiences in the book with 75 squadron, including the other crew members mentioned in the book, are accurately based upon his log books whilst everything else is created, including the love and spy stories. Historical accuracy was important to Rohan and to achieve this he was advised at every stage by two military historians based in the UK and Jim's second pilot, Arthur Osborne's son who gave him access to Arthur's log book.


Rohan read a couple of extracts particularly relevant to Feltwell and these were followed by a Q and A in which he revealed that he had lived in the UK for eleven years which is when his historical research for the background to the book began. It took six years to write the book, including research, as he was working for most of the time as a sports manager and could only write when time permitted such as on the train or in a café. He wrote longhand and always carried a notebook with him and would sometimes write up to a 1000 words a half hour when the 'creative juices were flowing'. He also stated that he spent three times as long researching it as he did writing it.

Most members of the audience purchased a book including my wife who, I have to say, enjoyed it immensely and remarked that the local colour and details are very accurate.

Our speaker for our 1st April meeting was David Cordner and the title that he choose for his presentation was, "Couch Potato to International Athlete."

David began by explaining that he would be talking to us about the world of

triathlon and how he became involved in it and ended up representing Ireland at the World Championships.

David was born in Belfast in 1970, Northern Ireland, at the height of the troubles. In the mid 1980s the idea of bringing children together from both sides of the sectarian divide in an effort break the cycle of violence was put forward. Activities offered ranged from theatre groups to various sport activities. David joined the triathlon sessions in 1985 at the age of 15. Over two weeks he learnt about the skills involved in the three triathlon disciplines of swimming, cycling and running. He participated in mini-triathlons and the course ended with the teenagers entering a proper triathlon run by Belfast city council in which they did quite well.

At the age if 17 he joined the RAF, moved to East Anglia, had a family and all of that left him with insufficient time to continue with his sport. What he did do was... eat cake! The inevitable happened, he became unfit and put on weight.

It was at a work event where the guest speaker was Barry McGuigan that David had his photo taken with Barry. Looking at the result shocked him so much that he decided that he had to do something to loose the extra pounds and improve his fitness. So, he cut out the cakes and biscuits and bought a mountain bike and began riding the trails around the forest. At some point in time he saw an advert for a triathlon being organised by a club in Newmarket and entered it. Being disappointed in his result made him more determined to improve, to take his training more seriously and so he joined the club.

The Newmarket club helped him improve his techniques as well as providing targeted training. He bought a new bike, set himself the target of doing a 15 mile circuit around the area in an hour. Soon



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weight was dropping off him and the running got easier. He did Park runs, joined running clubs and got fitter and fitter. Winter training is done indoors using Zwift, a computer controlled machine that allows you to race on virtual tracks against other competitors who can be anywhere in the world! This was a saviour during lockdown.

He then moved on to tell us in more detail about the three separate triathlon disciplines. Swimming can be done in a pool where competitors are started at 30 second intervals unlike the chaos of the mass start when the swim is in the sea or a lake and legs and arms are flying everywhere. It is known as the "washing machine." Many is the time he has been kicked or hit in the face during a mass start.

Then follows the short run to the transition area where you jump on your bike and begin the cycle race which could be done on any kind

of terrain, from flat to extremely hilly. Back to the transition area, quickly put on the running shoes and set out on the final part of the event, the marathon.

There are different distances for triathlons ranging from Standard or Olympic distance—1.5k swim, 40k ride, 10k run. A Sprint is half the Standard. Going the other way we have the half Ironman (twice the



Standard) and Full Ironman (double the distance again). David takes part in the Sprint and Standard triathlons because the time required to train for the Ironman distances "takes over your life".


David then proceeded to take us through the kit he uses, from his carbon fibre bikes to his helmets, explaining about the technicalities of each piece. The bikes are not just cycles, they are pieces of high tech equipment. The tyres run at 120psi and the pedals have sensors in them! Everything, from the kit to the physical techniques, are all designed to improve efficiency and conserve energy for the next part of the race. It's no good running out of energy half way

David competes in the 50-55 age category. To get selected to compete for Ireland he has to enter a number of triathlons each year and submit his performance data to the National Federation of Ireland. In 2017 he was selected to represent Ireland in the world finals in Rotterdam and in 2018 he competed in the European championships in Glasgow.

David's brother also competes in triathlon for Ireland but in an older age group.

Members found David's presentation extremely interesting and informative. They asked many questions and expressed their gratitude in the usual fashion.

The Wellington staff did an Irish themed breakfast to mark St Patrick's Day including soda bread, white pudding and potato pancakes. Delicious.





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### WILDLIFE CRIME IN NORFOLK

In terms of wildlife investigations, we have been involved in 19 investigations to varying degrees over the last two months. Sadly, we have seen several dead raptors (Buzzards, Kestrels and Red Kites) reported in some unusual circumstances. To date, every one that we have submitted for lab analysis has returned a negative result for shot but has tested positive for Avian Influenza. This means no further testing can be done to establish if that was the reason for the death or indeed if there are other natural underlying issues or something more sinister. We continue to work with the RSPB, Defra and APHA to keep an accurate record of what is found and where. Work is also ongoing with the National Wildlife Crime Unit to look at further testing beyond the AI diagnosis because while it's quite possible AI was the reason for death, we always want to completely rule out foul play.

We have also had several badger sett disturbance offences and suspicious deaths. We've completed some x-ray analysis for some of the badgers which have showed that the death is highly likely to be a road traffic collision. This is something you traditionally tend to see a little more of at this time of the year as badgers' hierarchal set up means that some lesser family members can be pushed out of the sett as young are born to 'stronger' females. Of the badger sett disturbance offences, one was later confirmed as a fox den and with the landowner's permission, we captured some lovely footage. The landowner is really pleased as he is looking to encourage wildlife, and I can honestly say I have never seen such a large fox den – it was amazing to see. The other one we dealt with this month involved some work on a tree that was carried out above ground on top of the badger sett. This is always very difficult to deal with as there is some discussion about how much disturbance a badger can take above ground. However, suitable advice was given by officers and no further work will be carried out at this location until the correct licence is in place.



Speaking of licences, sadly, we have had several activities carried out without official Natural England licences being in place. We are currently dealing with two bat offences where building work has destroyed or modified a bat roost that is protected all year round.

There is also an incident involving work on a pond on a building site before the licence had been authorised and paid for, which means the work completed around a pond is highly likely to have disturbed hibernating Great Crested Newts and therefore illegal. These three all remain ongoing currently and discussions are ongoing with relevant authorities in how best to deal with these matters. Not all these of cases end up in court and may be suitable for out of court agreements and disposals to further enhance habitat recovery.

Another incident which is currently being dealt with by local officers is an incident in which a person's cat, which was missing for a number of days, has returned home with a Gin trap on its legs. Fortunately, the cat is OK but these traps have been illegal for more than 60 years and yet, incredibly, we pick up a couple of these illegally set every year. A gin trap is a spring trap that basically has teethed edges (see photo) and although it isn't illegal to own a Gin trap, it

must never be set. If you are using a spring trap of any kind, it must be set up so not to catch untargeted species so it must be in a tunnel or artificial cover, and correctly fitted baffles.

This week we picked up a legal fenn trap that was set in a tunnel made of two



roofing slates! This means there was absolutely nothing in place to stop untargeted species (hedgehogs, birds, stoats etc.) entering the trap and either becoming injured or killed. This is illegal and simply not good enough. There are many organisations out there that can provide training and advice, as well as rural crime officers.

Looking at some of the cases we have closed this month, some of you may remember the Otter that was killed in a trap in the Diss area last year. It was decided that this would be dealt with out of court using a community resolution – this was completed this month with some really positive outcomes for local wildlife. Sadly, we will never be able to replace the Otter that was killed, but the community resolution measures should enhance the habitat for many years to come and we are confident all involved have learnt from this mistake.

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# WHAT HAPPENED IN THE COUNTRYSIDE IN APRIL

As the temperatures started to consistently remain warm, the countryside cames alive over the last few weeks. The hedges turned green, and many trees started to show life. Birds started to build and occupy nests. Birds will of course nest in unusual places (post-boxes, bins and plant pots amongst many others). Remember that all nests whilst being built and in use are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act no matter where they are located. You will probably see many more tits and finches in hedges and similar as they become more active in their breeding season.

One of my favourite sites of spring is the return of the swallows (probably our most well-known migratory bird) and we started to see them return. Many of our other native species who spend most of the winter months hidden up in warmer areas became much more active. If you were lucky enough you may have seen badgers, hedgehogs, butterflies, and dormice.

A lot of woods started to have a distinctive purple to blue carpet where our beautiful native bluebells appeared. Sadly, these are all too often targeted by thieves, and I ask anyone who witnesses someone uprooting bluebells to contact police immediately. They are a protected species under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, and all wild native plants are protected from being uprooted.

Farms began hitting their very busy period, many of our dairy and cattle farms were starting to turn the cattle out. If you did get the opportunity to watch cattle being turned out on to spring grass, you will have seen that they can pull some remarkable moves such a large animal. I also saw plenty of very young lambs around which is always lovely to see especially in the sun. Again, if you sat and watched a field of ewes and lambs you may have been lucky enough to observe the ewes quietly getting on and the lambs – often in groups of between 30-40 - playing together. It's a wonderful sight to behold.

Many farmers would have been breathing a sigh of relief as they turned out their stock, looked at their food and bedding stocks and saw that all last year's hard work had paid off. However, there is little rest. Preparations started back in Autumn 2021 for Winter 2022 will have seen the planting of crops like winter barley and winter wheat. You may also have noticed fertilising having taken place alongside pest and weed control methods to ensure that this summer's harvest is good enough to see livestock through Winter 2023. You may even have seen the first cut of silage taking place. The ideal time to cut the grass for silage is roughly a week before the full head of seed appears. This is when the plant contains the optimum amount of sugar and energy to produce the best quality feed.

Please, enjoy the countryside, respect it but leave it how you found it!

This they did using the most basic of navigational aids which included spare parts, some of which included crystals for unruly radios. John concluded his presentation with a film clip of four Chipmunks stunting in close formation; he was too modest to say whether he was a participator in this display.



### **DIETING AND WEIGHT LOSS**

If you ask most people what they do to lose weight, they will probably tell you the ONLY way to lose weight is to reduce calories and create a calorie deficit.

Whilst I agree that it might be one possible way to lose weight, it's not always the best way to lose weight.

People say I'm lucky, they presume it's because of all of the training I do. Nope, I don't do so much these days.

I observe a few simple rules only.

When I trained as a personal trainer, we studied Sports Nutrition and they too supported the calorie deficit rule.

But we are not all young sports people, nutrition is vital, yes, and our bodies change as we get older and whilst taking in too many calories will certainly make you gain weight, cutting calories can cut out the nutrition we need for muscle mass.

I encourage my clients to focus less on calories, because

they would often feel deprived, have low energy, and get massive cravings.

They often found after they lost some weight – almost every one of them would GAIN IT BACK. (Sometimes they'd gain even more.)

They didn't understand that they were shutting down their own fatburning mechanism. And they were slowing down their metabolism at the same time.

Losing weight by cutting calories will "turn off" your body's natural fat-burning mechanism.

I consider dieting differently:

## My trick is to

Forget about calories. Forget the scales.

Look at the bigger picture.





# **Nigel Whittingham**

In an article on your website reference is made to my late father H. 'Johnnie' Whittingham and his misadventure when flying 21 Sqd Ventura AE796 on 21st August 1942.

Extract from the article—
Sgt H. J. 'Johnnie' Whittingham
of 21 Squadron found the
Ventura tricky when he
attempted a forced landing at
Bodney on 21<sup>st</sup> August 1942. His
aircraft, AE796, landed heavily
on the airfield and had to be
written off. Sgt Whittingham
and his crew survived but
sustained injuries.

I am certain that he would want me to point out that the port

engine suddenly cut out at 100ft on that particular approach! Also, usually expressed in language that would not be appropriate here, he had a very low opinion of the Ventura aircraft to the last.

He went on to fly Sterlings, Lancasters and Yorks, survived being shot down (by the Americans) and earned a DFC along the way.

He was back in Feltwell in September 1944 with No 3 L.F.S. converting to Lancasters.

# RSPB Lakenheath Fen

MARSH HARRIERS IN THE UK- A TALE OF A BEAUTIFUL BIRD COMING BACK FROM THE BRINK OF EXTINCTION

At RSPB Lakenheath Fen, marsh harriers play a big part in the wildlife scene- visitors to the reserve could easily see some of their spectacular aerial displays on a visit in the coming weeks.

However, this has only recently been the case- after years of persecution, the UK was left with just one breeding female in 1971. It's hard to believe now, when you visit a suitable wild space and see several birds at once! However as recently as the 1990's, a special trip to the Norfolk Broads was in order if anyone local wanted to see one. Thanks to greater protection, the population began to recover. Marsh harriers can now be seen quite widely over East Anglia as



well as in Lincolnshire, Yorkshire and small numbers elsewhere in England & Scotland.

In terms of their lifestyle, marsh harriers aren't too fussy- their only requirement is for a reedbed large enough to hide a nest and to support enough food for them to hunt during the breeding months. Their diet covers a wide range

of reedbed prey- from voles to small birds, as well as larger birds like moorhen and coot.

For most of the year, the marsh harrier lives a quiet life, but during Spring male birds engage in beautiful courtship displays that are a joy to watch. He chooses a patch of reedbed he believes offers a good supply of food and a safe spot to nest. Then he will call to attract nearby females, and glide over slowly to show his chosen area. When he has caught the attention of a female he will 'sky-

dance' in the air above his territory. This really has to be seen to be appreciated fully but it involves swooping, almost-vertical flights upwards, followed by cresting an imaginary peak and then plummeting down, as if falling through the sky, before swooping back up. This looping behaviour is designed to show females not just his aerial skills but also his fitness and strength. The tougher and more agile he is, the better he could potentially hunt for food and provide for a growing family.

If the female is impressed, she will then encourage him (mainly vocally) to catch and bring her some food. If he does this, and she thinks the food suitable, he may then move on to suggest a nest site by flying very slowly towards it, landing on it and calling loudly. If you want to come and experience some of this drama, marsh harriers should be quite easy to see during May and into June and July. Anywhere with reedbeds on the reserve could host lots of action but if you ask in the Visitor Centre before your walk, we can give you the latest information!





# **Breckland Branch**

A recent survey carried out by Cats Protection found that around 600,000 cats have microchip details that are not up to date. Microchipping is an excellent way of reuniting cats with their owners and is to become law in this country, along with dogs. There is nothing more frustrating than to find a cat with a microchip, only to find that its owners details are out of date and there is no way of contacting them. If your cat is microchipped, please make sure that the details on the database are up to date, so that you don't become one of the 600,000 whose details are outdated. If you are with Identibase, check your details by visiting www.identibase.co.uk There are around 13 microchip companies in existence, so check your paperwork to see which company you are with.

If you have a stray cat turn up in your garden, whether you are feeding it or not, please take it to the vet so that they can check for a microchip. There is no charge and someone maybe looking for their beloved cat, who has wandered off and can't find his way home.

A stray kitten came into the care of one of our branches and it was discovered that the kitten had no sex organs at all, so could not be deemed either male or female. Hermaphrodite cats which are also extremely rare, have both male and female sex organs. This kitten has neither externally nor internally. This condition is so rare that there isn't a common term for it, but it is effectively 'sexual organ agenesis' where agenesis is the lack or failure of development in relation to body organs. The kitten has no problems urinating and defecating as these were checked out before it was put up for rehoming. The kitten was initially named Hope, but now in its new home, the kitten is known as Bean.

If you have an unneutered cat, either male or female we can help you with the cost of neutering. We can send you a voucher for £35 towards the cost of neutering a male cat, and £50 towards the cost of neutering a female cat. Just call the number below, listen to the message and make a note of the phone number you require. You cannot leave messages on this helpline. Kittens can be neutered at 4-5 months old, providing they weigh 2kg.


