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REMINDER TO BIRD KEEPERS ABOUT NEW REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

All bird keepers with flocks of less than 50 are encouraged to register their birds ahead of the legal deadline on 1 October 2024.

These new measures are designed to better protect the poultry sector from future avian influenza outbreaks and require all bird keepers, regardless of the size of their flock to register their birds. Previously only keepers of 50 or more birds had to register.

By registering their birds, keepers will ensure they receive important updates relevant to them, such as on any local avian disease outbreaks and information on biosecurity rules to help protect their flocks.

This will help to manage potential disease outbreaks, such as avian influenza and Newcastle disease, and limit any spread. The information on the register will also be used to identify all bird keepers in disease control zones, allowing for more effective surveillance, so that zones can be lifted at the earliest possible opportunity and trade can resume more quickly following an outbreak of avian disease in Great Britain.

Registration can be completed on the GOV.UK website.

The new rules cover owners of backyard flocks, birds of prey and pigeon fanciers, but do not affect caged pet birds (excluding any poultry species) kept entirely inside a domestic dwelling, such as a parrot, canary or budgie, which never leaves the property other than to visit a vet or another short-term period.

Keepers will also be legally required to update their information on an annual basis.

LATEST CONSUMER ALERTS AND TRADING STANDARDS NEWS

Scam Alert - Rogue buyers on Facebook Marketplace

Facebook Marketplace can be a great place to buy and sell goods and services, however, unfortunately the platform is also seen as a hunting ground for scammers. Scammers are there selling non-existent, fake and dangerous goods, but there are also there to try and prey on those selling products.

If you are selling on Facebook Marketplace, look out for these red flags:

- Refusing to meet up in person
- Moving conversations outside of Facebook Messenger
- Asking for items to be shipped before payment is received
- Buyers providing a prepaid shipping label
- Buyers overpaying then asking for a refund of the difference
- Messages claiming you need to pay a fee to 'upgrade your account'
- No profile picture
- Requests for your phone number or other personal information

Payment scammers pose as buyers who ask to purchase an item and claim to have sent a payment. They may send a counterfeit cheque, use a fraudulent payment method, or claim to have overpaid and request a refund for the excess amount.

Payment scammers might also exploit sellers by using payment methods that can be easily cancelled after an item has been posted or delivered.

Even in person the scammer will try to exploit a payment via a banking app buy showing the transaction on their own mobile device. Always wait for the payment to have cleared before allowing the buyer to leave with the item.

Here's a quick summary of ways to stay safe when selling on Facebook Marketplace:

- Deal with local buyers whenever possible
- · Avoid sharing personal information unless absolutely necessary
- Use secure payment methods like PayPal or cash-on-delivery

Check comments under listings for warnings from other users
 Report suspicious buyers to Facebook

Scam Alert - Employment scams

We are warning residents about scam adverts and messages claiming to be offering employment opportunities.

Adverts will often be placed on social media and messages are often sent by text or on WhatsApp.

If contact is made the scammer will start by asking for personal information 'to confirm identity', may ask for a CV to be sent or will send a questionnaire to complete.

Providing too much personal information can put you at risk of further scams or identity theft, you should be very wary if asked to provide the following:

- Your full date of birth
- Full address
- Passport number
- Driving licence number
- National Insurance number
- Bank account details

Other employment scams may ask for fees to be paid upfront to cover administration, background checks or travel.

Scam Alert - Telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Amazon'

We are again warning residents to be on their guard for telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Amazon'.

This follows a report from a resident who received an automated cold calling stating that '£1,000 has been charged to your Amazon account' and giving the instruction to 'press 1 to speak to the Amazon fraud team'

Previously, where residents have interacted with calls received, they have then been connected to a person who attempts to gather personal, account or financial details.

These calls are a scam and are not connected with Amazon in any way. If you receive this or a similar call our advice is do not interact



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with the call and hang up.

Amazon have put together some helpful tips on how to identify if a phone call is from them. This information can be found on the Amazon UK website.

Scam Alert - Telephone cold calls claiming to be 'bank security'

We are warning residents about telephone calls which claim to be from 'bank security'.

In a recent call reported to us the automated call stated, 'this is bank security', the call then said that 'three payments have been authorised on your bank account'. The message then offers a number of press button options to authorise the payments or to speak to a member of staff.

The wording of the call is designed to panic the call recipient into interacting with the message, if they do it is likely they will be connected to a call handler who will then attempt to gather personal and financial information which could in turn be used to commit further fraud on or with the account.

We always advise people to be very wary of claims made during telephone cold calls. If you receive this or a similar call our advice is do not interact with the call and **hang up**.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account or credit card contact your bank or service provider directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or app. **Never** use details provided in a cold call.

Scam Alert - Text messages claiming to be from Three

We are warning residents who are Three customers to be alert for scam text messages that are circulating.

The messages claim that you have 'Three points' that will expire in '3 working days'. The message then provides a link to 'redeem the points for available rewards in time'.

These messages are not from Three and anyone following the link will be taken to a website which will attempt to gather personal, account and financial details. This warning follows similar text

circulating within the last month which made the same claims for Vodafone customers.

Suspicious or scam text messages can be reported by forwarding the message to 7726.

Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from 'Halifax'

We are warning residents about scam emails circulating claiming to be from 'Halifax' stating they have 'attempted to contact you recently but could not get through'. The email then states 'Action Needed:' to 'verify and update your contact information' via an 'Update Now' button.

information' via an 'Update Now' button.

These emails are not from Halifax and anyone following the link will be taken to a website which will attempt to gather personal, account and financial details.

Our advice is always to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and never click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

Reporting scams

Reporting scams you receive helps us continue to build up intelligence on the scammers and how they target people.

If you have received a telephone cold call which you believe to be a scam or think you have been a victim of an online scam you can report it to us via our partners the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on freephone **0808 223 1133**.

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Feltwellians Around The World

Memoir for Sylvan Ellwood Weaver Born August 5, 1915. ↓ Killed in action April 4, 1943. Part 6

Written by Larry Weaver (son of Sylvan's younger brother Armand)

As I write in the first person I, Larry, will type I(S) so you will know it is what Sylvan thought or felt as I imagined he would. When I write things that I am feeling or thinking I will write them as I(L).

The program at Pennfield was designed over three phases. Conversion training (30 hrs), operations (35 hrs), and Armament (35 hrs) for a total of 100 hrs for pilots under training. Navigators and WAG's (Wireless Air Gunners) received 70 and 78 total training while AG's 35 hrs at the armament phase only. Flying was only a small part of the training. Considerable time was given to ground lectures. Subjects included airmanship, army air, support, Bombing, Gunnery, Instructional Fuselage, Intelligence, Meteorology, Navigation, Operations Photography, Signals and Tactics. It varied by crew position. Instructors at O.T.U. 34 came from Greenock, Scotland. They were tour expired pilots rested from operations. Shocking to me (S) was the number of accidents here. It averaged 2.5 airframes per month and that meant our buddies were being killed right before our eyes! That induced the need for better aircraft. Well, these problems I(S) could do nothing about.

I(S) transferred out of there on Oct. 25, '42 and headed to the U.K. via an R.A.F. Trainees Pool in Halifax. This operation was something else to behold. From what I(L) can figure the November crossing of the North Atlantic was one of the largest. It involved 8 (Cruise ships converted to) troop carriers carrying 14,023 men. It took from Oct. 27 to Nov. 6 to get everyone on board and records filed. We all had to pass through the P.R.C. that's the Progress Review Committee to





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figure where we were all going. They had that strange way of record keeping where it said that I was T.O.S. i.e. Taken on Strength into the #3 P.R.C. They of course kept Canadians of the R.C.A.F. together so we could get to know the guys we would be in operations with. This was only outdone by the Queen Elizabeth cruise ship in 8/43 which carried 14.313 men across. No escort was needed upon embarkation, but 2 days out from port on the European side fighters would come alongside for protection. Life on board was pretty hohum. We needed some R&R but not much like a cruise in the Caribbean! In staterooms for two, 10 men were assigned and rooms for three got 15 men. This was pretty close-quartered but it was a good way to get familiar. This is where I got the low-down on what the weather would be like where we were going because Robert Steedman (pilot of our plane shot down) took his formal schooling in Nanaimo and Victoria, B.C. and he seemed to think weather was the same where we were headed. Most of the day was spent in long line ups for the two meals served per day. There wasn't time enough for three meals anyway. Being on the ocean was brand new for me (S) but I didn't get seasick because we had experienced plenty of bucking around in planes in our training. Then when we arrived in England we were S.O.S. Struck off Strength from #3 P.R.C. and T.O.S. to R.A.F. Royal Air Force Feltwell. Feltwell was the name of the base from which we would be flying the Ventura's. Luckily for me I missed Operation Oyster. That was the raid attacking Eindhoven in occupied Holland. That was a pretty impressive one actually even though there were some losses. I(S) was just as glad to miss it because it had been prepared for one month. This was the Philips factory where parts, sp. radar vacuum tubes were being made for radios and radar. This 'radar' war had been going on since 1933 (in which anyone involved was sworn to solemn secrecy, so that included all airmen) and had progressed to the point in 1940 where England had 29 ground based radar stations giving protection along its southern and eastern coasts against invading German bombers. What had not been produced yet was the implementation of radar sets on planes.

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Our speaker for June was Christopher Samuels. This was the first time our host at the Wellington had given us a presentation and we are very grateful to him for stepping up to the mark. Chris choose to deliver a talk which he titled,

The Winners Write the History and sub-titled, Covering Up Cockups! He began by talking about the Bayeux tapestry stating that it is one of the earliest pieces of art that 'lies' overtly about warfare in that it shows King Harold as being just over a third of the size of William the Conqueror when, in reality, he was taller. Norman propaganda? He is portrayed as being small, being weak, when in fact his army had just defeated the Vikings in the north and marched down to face the Normans. Having lost the Battle of Hastings the winners, the Normans, wrote their version of the event ignoring the reality of the day, that their opponent's army was so tired that they made tactical errors. In today's parlance, they 'bigged' themselves up.

Chris then moved forward several hundred years to examine the war in the pacific, particularly the attack on Pearl Harbour and the Battle of Midway.

The attack on Pearl Harbour is considered by the Americans to be an act of murder, not an act of war. The Japanese High Command had transmitted a declaration of war to their embassy in Washington DC with the intention that it would be delivered an hour before the attack. What they hadn't allowed for was the fact that the embassy would take so long to decode the message that by it was delivered the attack had already happened. Therefore, it is considered an act of murder. However, the Americans had broken the Japanese code and were aware of a pending Japanese attack but had done nothing about it and so, Pearl Harbour was woefully unprepared or defended. Sadly, good arguments, therefore, can be made that all who died that day needn't have. However, anything you read about this event up until the late 1980s completely ignores even the possibility that anyone on the American side was at fault. A reevaluation in the 90s, following the release of documents under the 50 year rule, highlights what was known and history begins to be



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rewritten more accurately.

Following the attack a number of air raids were carried out on the Japanese mainland and various islands known as the Doolittle raids. In the first major sea battle of the Pacific war—the Battle of the Coral Sea—just of mainland Australia the Japanese believed they had destroyed two aircraft carriers, the Lexington and the Yorktown. However, the Yorktown had not sunk, it had limped its way back to Pearl Harbour. The repair crew reckoned it would take three months to fix but the Pacific Fleet Commander gave them three days!

The Americans thought that the Japanese fleet would either head towards the Aleutian Islands or Midway. Midway sent an uncoded message saying that their desalination plant had broken. The intercepted Japanese message in response said that target AX (code for Midway) was running short of water. Thus, the Americans knew that the next target was Midway but the Japanese didn't know this. In addition, the Japanese thought they had sunk two carriers, out of the four the US had in the Pacific, leaving only two, but Yorktown had set sail, being repaired on route, making three. In addition, and often overlooked, there was a large airfield on Midway, the significance of which will become apparent later.

As the battle progressed the Japanese lost all four of their carriers and any planes in the air had nowhere to land except in the water! American pilots had Midway airfield available to them when their carriers were lost and so could be refuelled to return to the fight.

The Japanese attacked Midway, lost two planes, returned to their carriers for rearming and refuelling. Half way through, a scout plane reports it has found a US carrier so the bombs already loaded are removed to be replaced by torpedoes. Shortly after an American scout spots the Japanese fleet. American planes, already loaded, leave to attack. The 'Four minutes that changed the war' begins.

10.22—74 US planes arrive over the Japanese fleet where their planes are half refuelled and decks covered in bombs and torpedoes. The *Kaga is hit and destroyed*.

10.23. The Akagi is hit and destroyed.

10.25. The Soryu is attacked and hit twice. By sheer luck one bomb



goes down a 5-foot wide tube leading to the magazine.

10.26. The Soryu breaks its back and sinks.

In four minutes 164 planes and three carriers are destroyed. The one remaining carrier launches everything it has at the American fleet. They find the Yorktown, believing that it isn't the Yorktown as they had sunk it earlier (but hadn't). The Yorktown is hit and set ablaze. They return to be refuelled and fly out again to find another American carrier. However, by the time they return, the fire on the Yorktown has been extinguished and so they think they have found another carrier. They assume that they have by now sunk two American carriers. By the time they return for a third time the remaining two carriers have found the last Japanese carrier. Eight and a half hours after the '4minutes' the last Japanese carrier is destroyed and all remaining planes crash into the sea. The Yorktown sinks on 7th June 1942 and, after four days of battle, the Americans retreat fearing the loss of additional carriers.

Returning to propaganda. In all of the news reports following the battle the word *LUCK* is never used. It was lucky that the Japanese didn't find the Americans 20 minutes earlier otherwise their planes would have been armed with torpedoes and in the air before the Americans had arrived. Had the Americans not luckily found the 5-foot wide tube would the Japanese carrier have been destroyed, after all only two bombs hit it. Probably not. It was a great victory. Only in the early 90s is the battle reevaluated and the role of luck emphasised.

In conclusion, when writing history, if you are the victor, ignore the luck, cover over your cock-ups and make sure you shout from the rooftops how wonderful you are.

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

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
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The Mounting Cost of Missed Appointments at the Surgery.

The first of these articles appeared last month and at that time it seemed as though the number of monthly missed appointments at the surgery had stabilised in the low sixties. As can be seen from the chart below I spoke too soon. The


number of *No Shows* increased in June to 72 from 63. This brings the total number of missed appointments for the year so far to **429**. This means that 429 other patients could have been seen by a doctor in the first 6 months of 2024 if only people had cancelled their appointments rather than simply not turning up.



"Please, if you cannot attend your appointment, cancel it."

As stated in previous articles each missed GP appointment costs an average of £30. Using this figure I calculate the accumulated cost of all the missed appointments so far this year and this is presented in the chart over the page. The additional 72 missed appointments in June represent an additional loss of £2160 worth of lost healthcare for the month. If there are no more missed appointments this year the total cost will remain at £12,870, money that has to be spent to

pay the bills and the staff but for which no direct medical benefit is received by anyone.



It is worth repeating why I am highlighting this issue. There are several reasons. First, I want to make it an item of conversation in order to raise awareness of the problem beyond the confines of this magazine and, second, to make people think about cancelling appointments rather than simply not turning up. And thirdly, because it is, ultimately, your and my taxes that are being needlessly wasted at a time when the NHS is under immense pressure to meet all of our expectations. As I did last month I'll finish with this startling statistic:

A NHS England report in 2019 estimates more than 15 million appointments are missed annually in England. Approximately 7.2 million of these are missed appointments with GPs, costing NHS England £216 million per year.

Our new government promises to cut waiting times with 40,000 additional appointments a week. This would not be needed if everyone turned up for theirs. (7.2 million shared by 52 weeks is approx. 138,000 missed appointments a week!)

DR. IAN NISBET'S TALK ABOUT MEDICINE AND SURGERY IN THE 19TH CENTURY

Before Dr Nisbet delivered his talk in late June at St Mary's, he sent me an outline detailing a chronology of medical advancements that he intended to address. It makes interesting reading.

1800 Smallpox vaccine promoted by Edward Jenner.

1816 Laennec uses a rolled up tube as a stethoscope.

Mines and Collieries Act No child under 10 to work in mines , women and boys under 15 not to work underground.

1846 The first binaural stethoscope.

1847 Chloroform discovered as an anaesthetic. First used by Scottish physician Sir James SIMPSON. *Ian's Great Uncle.*

Ten Hours Act Women and children in cotton mills not to work more than 10 hours a day. 1868 widened to all factories.

1848 First Public Health Act The first of many, compelling local boards of health to appoint a medical officer, build sewers, inspect homes and check the state of food on sale.

1853 Queen Victoria delivers 8th child using Chloroform.

John Snow (later Queen Victoria's anaesthetist) demonstrated, using a dot map, that a Cholera epidemic occurred in houses fed with water by the Broad Street pump.

1858 Elizabeth Blackwell became the first woman on the medical register.

1858 The Great Stink The smell from the Thames became overpowering and led Joseph Bazalgette to develop an extensive sewage system to keep sewage away from the river.

1859 Florence Nightingale produced Notes on Nursing and Notes on Hospitals. She implemented them and is considered the founder of modern nursing.

1865 Joseph Lister introduced aseptic surgery, IMPORTANT.

1866 Elizabeth Garrett Anderson became the first woman to qualify as a doctor and a surgeon in Britain.

1870 Thomas Bernardo opened his first home for destitute children.

Second Public Health Act to clean up towns, stem the spread of disease demolish slums and provide better housing.

Patrick Manson discovered that parasites can be transferred through the blood by mosquitoes. 20 years later, Ronald Moss proved that malaria is transmitted by mosquitoes.

1875 Robert Koch identified different germs which each cause a disease. He found germs for 21 different disease including Anthrax, Cholera and Tuberculosis. This helped Louis Pasteur and others to produce vaccines that would save millions of lives.

1885 Royal Commission for the Blind to improve life for blind people.

William Hesketh Lever founds Lever Brothers and sold 40,000 tons of Sunlight Soap each year.

1890 Quinine becomes the predominant treatment for Malaria.

1893 Acetominophen (later Paracetamol) synthesised.

1894 Jesse BOOT founds Boots Chemists.

1895 Wilhelm Roentgen discovers X Rays.

1895 Alex Cappelen of Oslo conducts the first heart surgery.

1897 Ronald Ross proved that malaria is transmitted by mosquitoes.

Miller Hutchinson invented the first Electric hearing aid

1899 Aspirin synthesised and registered.

often depicted as a fat club being held by Asclepius with a single snake, gentle and benign, wrapped around it, consistent with gentle healing and idealized medicine.

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


The trees had been given by Norfolk County Council, and the chairman of the parish council, Mr J. E. H. Porter, said it was "a magnificent gesture" on their part.



WILDLIFE CRIME UPDATE

It's always a good month when there is little to write in this section. We have had a couple of enquiries around various issues including wild bee orchids, a young dead kestrel and couple of bird nest enquiries. But all these have quickly been established not to be criminal matters and no need for further police involvement.

In regard to ongoing investigations, we still have a bat roost destruction job ongoing on a development site which is being put together alongside a bird nest destruction job which is also nearing completion.

OPERATION SEABIRD



As we have already touched on, we can expect many visitors to Norfolk in the next month or two, some for the first time and I am sure many returning.

This brings us an extra challenge in policing in so many ways but for us and our local wildlife as sometimes visitors are unaware, they may be committing offences by

disturbing or destroying our wildlife. It's important we engage with these tourists and work with partners to educate especially on the need to follow local signs for keeping everyone safe and the right side of the law.

We really need your support too as good behaviour promotes further good behaviour. So, if your local area has signs up for keeping dogs on a lead because of livestock, nesting birds or seals please follow the instructions as that will encourage others to do the same. Sadly, if one person has their dog off the lead in these areas it encourages others to do the same which can cause a real problem. We really do appreciate your support in this.



OPERATION SEABIRD

Please respect birds and wildlife along the coastline of Norfolk





Norfolk provides an important nesting ground for many marine birds, some of which migrate long distances just to breed here. Our unique coastline and shingle beaches provide perfect nesting grounds from March to September.

Nests are vunerable to disturbance as eggs are laid directly on the ground, shingle beaches, and sand dunes.

NEW LEGISLATION AROUND GLUE TRAPS BEING BANNED

This month brings a new piece of legislation which comes into effect on the 31^{st of} July 2024. This will make glue traps illegal to use in nearly all situations unless you're a professional pest controller and have applied to Natural England for an individual licence or to use the general licence.

Companies and individuals were given a grace period to use up old stock but that comes to an end on the 31st of July 2024 when it will become illegal to set such traps. The offence is very simple, it will be an offence to set any glue trap.

These traps have caused plenty of controversy over the years and often considered inhumane. Whilst obviously pests need dealing with, but with technology moving on there are much better alternatives available now and the use of these traps has declined dramatically in recent years. If you still have any of these traps in the back of your shed or garage, please dispose of very carefully to avoid animals becoming entangled with the glue inadvertently

How You Can Help When Out And About

- Read local signs and follow guidance
- If paths are marked, stay on them
- If you spot birds & nests, move away immediately to prevent disturbance
- When taking phots, observe wildlife quietly from a distance.
- Keep your dog on lead when instructed, and under control at all times.
- Take rubbish home. Please don't litter
- EGG THEFT is a crime, please report if witnessed





ELEPHANTS, TIGERS AND GHOSTS

In my garden last night, I had an elephant, a tiger and a ghost! Do I live near a haunted zoo?! No, I had a moth trap out in the garden and those were among the moths I caught!

Moths are a fascinating group of insects and one that is generally over-looked by most people. I used to fall into that category too. In fact, I didn't used to like moths at all, especially when they fluttered in my face. I also used to think that moths were dull, only flew at night and ate your clothes. Then I was encouraged to attend to a moth night at my local reserve, where I met an expert who completely changed my mind!

I quickly found out that there are some very beautiful and intricately marked moths, such as the pink and olive-green Elephant Hawkmoth, or the Burnished Brass, which is as shiny as a well-polished coin. I also discovered that several species fly only in the daytime, such as the black and red Cinnabar moth, which is a familiar sight around Common Ragwort, on which its black and yellow stripy caterpillars feed. And while there are two species of

UK moth that do eat clothes, there are thousands that do not! Moths also have fascinating lifecycles and are often used in schools to teach children about the natural world. The process of transformation from egg to caterpillar to chrysalis, and finally to a beautiful moth (or butterfly for that matter) is truly a wonder of nature. Some have lifecycles that involve them living as a caterpillar for several years, before finally pupating and emerging as an adult. Some moths even have an aquatic larval stage, protecting themselves with pieces of leaves cut from a lily leaf!

Both adult moths and their caterpillars are food for a wide variety of wildlife, including other insects, reptiles, amphibians and insect eating mammals such as shrews. Night-flying adult moths form a major part of the diet of bats. Many birds eat both adult moths and their caterpillars, but the caterpillars are especially important for feeding the young. It is estimated that a family of blue tits can eat around 1000 moth caterpillars a day!!

Several species of moths are excellent long-distance travellers too! Most moths found in the UK are resident, but some are actually immigrants from southern Europe or even Africa. One common immigrant is the day-flying Hummingbird Hawkmoth, which amazingly does look like a hummingbird as it flits from flower to flower, hovering as it feeds. If you have honeysuckle, jasmine or buddleia in your garden, keep an eye out for it.

The best, and most common, way to discover what moths are using your garden is to run a light trap, although it doesn't necessarily require specialist equipment. A light bulb suspended above a white sheet is enough, or you could try hanging a sheet behind an outside light. I've occasionally been known to spot moths that are attracted to the outside lights and hanging baskets of my local pub! So go on, have a go, you may be surprised at what you find!

In a survey carried out by the British Veterinary Association last year, it was found that half of all vets treated animals for conditions relating to hot weather, such as heat stroke.



With the summer coming, its important to keep you cat cool. Cats with white fur, especially on their head, are in danger of getting skin cancer on ears and noses. You can use a sunblock on their most sensitive parts, but check with your vet first about a safe one to use. Try to keep them indoors between 10am and 3pm when the sun is hottest. Make sure there is lots of shade both indoors and outside providing bushes outside and boxes indoors. Keep curtains closed to keep your house cooler.

Hydration is the key. Clean fresh drinking water is important. Place lots of bowls away from their food bowls and don't use plastic bowls, use ceramic, glass or metal instead. Use large bowls with a big surface area and keep it topped up so that the cat doesn't have to bend down too far. Cats like running water, and may prefer a water fountain. Keep lots of fans in different places indoors. You could fill a bottle with water and freeze it, and then place it wrapped in a towel in the cats bedding, making sure that they can get away from it and that the bottle doesn't leak.

If you are having a barbecue, please remember than open flames are a risk to all animals. Don't leave the barbecue unattended and cover the grill while it is cooling down. Don't feed a cat from the barbecue as you don't want them around that area which may encourage the cat to come back for more food.

Keep onions, garlic and chives out of reach as they are toxic to cats. It might be best to set up a safe place for your cat indoors, as he might not appreciate having lots of visitors as you do.


