News cutting Circa 1933/34

Remembrance Sunday

Services were held at the various places of worship. In the evening an appropriate sermon was preached at St Mary's Church by the Rector Rev G.A.W. Wilkinson

The evening collection was for the Earl Haig Fun. At the High Street Methodist Church a retiring collection was made for the Fund and the Hillside Methodist are to have a retiring collection for the Fund next Sunday.

On Armistice Morning Ex-Service men of the village paraded at the Legion Headquarters and marched, headed by the Legion Standard Bearer Mr A. Lemmon and in in the charge of the branch Chairman Mr A. Osborne to St Nicholas' Church, where a Poppy Wreath was laid by Capt. H.D. Briggs, C.M.G., R.N. to the memory of Ex-Service men and women of the village who have died since the war and are buried in the adjacent churchyard.

The Ex-Service men's parade went to the War Memorial where a large number of villagers had assembled and the schoolchildren were mustered under the direction of Mr J.H. Fassnidge.

Many wreaths and crosses had been placed on the War Memorial by relatives and friends of the Fallen.

The united service commenced with Scripture reading by Mr W. Addison of Hillside Methodist Church.

Prayer by the Rev. G.A.W. Wilkinson, M.C. was followed by the reading of the Roll of Honour, comprising 47 names, names by Major H.L.A. Swann, D.S.O., and the sounding of the Last Post by Mr J.T. Orange.

Then followed "the Silence" at the end of which a wreathe of Flanders' Poppies from Ex-Service men of the village was placed by Mr A. Osborne. Capt. H.W. Briggs, C.M.G., R.N., recited "They shall grow not old."

When I opened the bottom drawer, I found a note from Deannie, written in small notebook and the page torn out. Working back, I am certain that this must have been the last billet doux she wrote for me and I would love to share it with you.

LATEST CONSUMER ALERTS AND TRADING STANDARDS NEWS

As scammers are very active at the moment there are more pages in this section than is usual. But I think it important that you are made aware.

Scam Alert – Letters claiming to be from the 'Chartered Trading Standards Institute'

We are highlighting a warning from the Chartered Trading Standards Institute (CTSI) about further examples of scam letters falsely using their name.

In this case the letters claimed that the recipient is eligible for 'Capital Reimbursement Settlement' due to the liquidation of a company you invested in. The letter went on to give a contact name and telephone number in the text.

If you receive this or a similar letter it is a scam, and we advise you do not contact any numbers quoted in the text.

Anyone making contact via the details given in the letter is likely to be targeted by a scammer looking to gather personal and financial information.

CTSI have previously issued warnings about letters and emails falsely using their name and branding which have made claims including:

That you have been 'exposed to a company that CTSI have investigated in the past'

That 'insurance scammers have been captured by Trading Standards' and the letter recipient should fill in a 'creditors debt form' to obtain compensation

That you can claim compensation for 'failed investments'.

If you receive a letter claiming to be from The Chartered Trading Standards Institute, or any letter which you believe to be a scam you can report it to us via our partners, the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on freephone 0808 223 1133.

Scam Alert – Automated telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Visa'

We are again warning residents about automated telephone calls that claim they are from 'Visa'.

The calls will make claims about 'suspicious' or 'unauthorised transactions', giving details for purchases of several hundred pounds often quoting well known online retailers like Amazon and Apple. The recording then requires the call recipient to interact with the call, recent examples stated the caller needed to 'press 1 to accept these charges or press 2 to reject and be connected to a customer service representative'.

These calls are a scam and the claims made are not genuine.

If you receive this, or a similar call, do not interact with it in any way and hang up.

It is likely there are several variations of these calls stating different transactions, amounts and actions that can be taken.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account or credit card contact your bank or service provider directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or

Scam Alert – Scams targeting users of Careline Community Service

We are highlighting an alert issued by our colleagues at Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk of scams targeting users of the council's pendant scheme for vulnerable adults, Carline Community Service.

Reports have been received that service users are being targeted by other companies and fraudsters trying to take their money.

They are taking advantage of the fact that users need to switch to digital technology but instead of switching them to a digital unit from the council, they are switching them to another provider – or just scamming them out of money altogether.

The council is writing to all users of the service to warn them, but it is also trying to raise awareness in the community so that people who may support service users are also aware.

The council has advised users of the Careline Community Service to be cautious when people call.

- The council will never ask for money upfront. (The service is paid for, usually through a monthly direct debit, but there is no separate charge for the box.)
- Members of staff will always clearly identify themselves as calling from Careline Community Service and will be in uniform, and carrying ID, when they visit to switch the unit over.

Careline users can call the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk on 01553 616200 if they have any doubts.

Scam Alert - Text messages claiming to be from 'Royal Mail'

We are warning residents about text messages continuing to circulate claiming to be from the 'Royal Mail'.

One recent example reported to us states that 'We are unable to complete the delivery due to incomplete address details' and then offers a link to 'view and modify your information'.

Criminals are experts at creating spoof messages that then link to fake websites using official logos and branding of trusted organisations to trick you into taking urgent action without closer inspection.

Always be wary of unexpected messages received and **never** click on any links or attachments unless you know you can trust them.

Scam Alert – Fake emails offering 'free spins' at online casinos

We are highlighting a warning from Action Fraud who have received 2,400

The Atmere Charity

The charity awards grants to individuals who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress.

It also helps for severe chronic illness in younger people.

Applications for assistance must be made to: The Atmere Charity Secretary, 16 Falcon Road, Feltwell, IP26 4AJ giving as much detail as possible about the need, distress or illness being experienced.

Any applicant MUST be a Feltwell resident.

The links in these scam emails lead to phishing website which are designed to steal personal and financial information.

You can report any suspicious email by forwarding it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Scam Alert - Council Tax 'annual fee invoice' emails

We are warning residents to be aware of scam contacts claiming to be relating to Council Tax.

This follows information from our colleagues at South Norfolk & Broadland Council after they received reports from residents of emails claiming to be 'your annual fee invoice from Council Service' with a link to 'pay your fee by Direct Debit'.

Our advice is **always be wary** of claims made in unexpected email approaches and **never** click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

If you need to confirm a contact about council tax is genuine, or you have any other council tax queries, <u>contact your local council directly</u>, their contact information is available on the GOV.UK website.

Scam Alert – Emails claiming to be from BT

We are warning residents about a number of scam emails circulating which claim to be from 'BT' stating that 'your webmail account is not actively secured' and that you need to 'validate your account' to prevent 'disconnection from all services'.

The emails, some which carry BT branding, contain a 'Validate here' button within the email text.

These emails are fake, anyone clicking on the link will be taken to a fake version of the BT website which will attempt to gather personal and password information which can then be used to take control of your email account.

Reporting scams

Reporting scams you receive helps us continue to build up intelligence on the scammers and how they target people.

If you have received a telephone cold call which you believe to be a scam or think you have been a victim of an online scam you can report it to us via our partners the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on freephone 0808 223 1133.





Bamforth & Co Ltd was started in 1870 by James Bamforth, a portrait photographer in Holmfirth, West Yorkshire. The company originally made Lantern Slides before moving into films. It was in 1910 that they started making illustrated 'saucy' seaside postcards which, like its films, were exported worldwide for sale.

The company was bought out by the Dennis Printing Company, of Scarborough during the early 1980s.

Following the demise of Dennis the Bamforth & Co name, with postcards rights to over 50,000 designs, were purchased by Ian Wallace in 2001.

In September 2010, on the 100th anniversary of the original launch of the postcards, Ian Wallace relaunched the publication and sale of the postcards, with the Jane Evans Licensing Consultancy.

Currently Mercury Print & Packaging, in Leeds has the exclusive right to reprint and distribute.

On Tuesday 7th November at the Mundford Bowls Club the WNAS were delighted to play host to Stewart Samuels: celebrity, historian and co-owner of Feltwell's prestigious family-run, Wellington Inn.

For an equally prestigious airfield Stewart's introductory photograph did not pay tribute to its status. The main entrance to the site shows a rather grandiose brick monolith bearing the noble inscription: 'Liberty Wins'. Unfortunately, undergrowth has recently been given too much liberty.

Stewart soon reset the balance by revealing that everything else about the location could be described as treasure. The infrastructure is almost exactly as it was during WW2: hangers, workshops, schools and even a beautiful timber church built by Boulton and Paul. There is no living accommodation on the site but the houses are regularly maintained and original camouflage paintwork can still be discerned on the property walls. There are veterinary, dog training facilities and schools there. A testimony to this fact comes from WNAS member, Lee, who used to teach there. Stewart explained that RAF Feltwell has never been deactivated and a concrete runway was never built. It was designed as a satellite to Lakenheath in 1937. Before that there was a WW1 airfield between Feltwell and Hockwold; evidence of this can be seen there today. The geography of the surrounding area seems to be ideally suited to the construction of airfields and it is not surprising that we see the 'golf balls' (radar surveillance scanners) there now. This scenario was a development of the Star wars initiative instigated by Ronald Reagan in the days of the Cold War. With radar and the atomic clock together with the Thor missile it would be possible to detect an adversary and counter attack with pin point accuracy. Feltwell was host to the first Thor missiles. They were originally of a German design. The British built the rockets and the Americans built the warheads. Ironically, the rockets were taken back to Vandenburg test site in California and were commissioned by RAF engineers from Feltwell. Stewart intimated that there is now evidence of the construction of the first

Stewart intimated that there is now evidence of the construction of the first purpose built runway; a very short one. Can we see electric vertical take-off aircraft on the horizon?

Stop press: at an affectionate level Stewart made mention of the bond we have with America. Every day on the base at 4-30pm the National Anthem is broadcast followed by the Star Spangled Banner. At Halloween, children head for the officer's quarters first where the pickings are more juicy. RAF Watton is not the only base to host its own wartime ghost.

HARE COURSING

November saw a steady rise in reports of hare coursing which obviously means we have stepped up our enforcement action. PC Lovelock and the West Moonshot team arrested four individuals, seized a vehicle and four dogs. The four involved have been bailed while the case is built and further information is retrieved from electronic devices.

We have also seized two vehicles in the South Norfolk area which had been left in farmers fields having been involved in coursing and criminal damage of the fields. Those investigations are ongoing to identify those responsible.

BATS - DON'T FALL THE WRONG SIDE OF THE LAW!

We are continuing to see a rising trend in the amount of reports we receive involving bat roosts being destroyed or disturbed. We currently have a number of ongoing investigations because of the planning process which causes these come to light. Sadly, dealing with bats in properties can incur extra costs to the project but it is not an excuse to ignore them and cut corners. It could end up being far more expensive in the long run and delay the process even further.

All bat roosts are protected, whether they are being actively used at the time or not, there are no defences for destroying or damaging a roost without the relevant Natural England licence in place before the work starts. Should you discover a bat or evidence of bats in an area you are working, you should cease work immediately and seek expert advice.

DIESEL/PLANT MACHINERY THEFTS

Whilst it sadly isn't anything new, there have been several larger plant type machinery stolen in recent months including telehandlers, mini diggers and slightly smaller items like generators and quadbikes. The demand for these items has raised significantly due to the war in Ukraine and most are being quickly shipped out of the country.

Whilst we have recovered some items with assistance from colleagues from the national project tackling this and from other neighbouring forces. One of the continuing frustrations when dealing with this sort of criminality is owners who do not know the individual serial numbers for some of this expensive kit.

It is essential we have those details, as soon as it is reported stolen, so we can record it on our national computer. If it is then stopped on the back of a lorry three counties away, it can be identified as stolen immediately. This is also sent to our international colleagues which the National Rural Crime Team have built up strong relationships over the last 12 months to tackle this issue. All you need to do is have a little black book of serial numbers/vin numbers from plant, particularly those not road registered, expensive tools, and any other expensive equipment. It is highly likely that it will have a unique serial number. We can all get complacent and think it would never happen to us, of course it might not but if it does, this information is critical.

WHAT HAPPENED IN THE COUNTRYSIDE IN NOVEMBER

November brought a lull in activity, on the farm and amongst our wildlife.

Many of our native mammals were quickly building up their reserves to get them through the winter. The hedges still had a few berries on them and all the chestnuts and acorns dropped for the squirrels and mice to clear up. Our other popular mammals, hedgehogs and bats, began entering hibernation and it is essential they are not disturbed whilst hibernating. Bats will unlikely be seen until around May time now. Hedgehogs are a little less predictable with some not fully hibernating at all and their behaviour changes significantly depending on the weather. That said, if you see hedgehogs out and about during daylight hours, please seek advice as this is not normal behaviour at anytime of year.

Many of our native birds enjoyed the fruits of the hedgerows for a few final weeks but these quickly disappeared. If you can provide some fat balls and nuts over the coming months, they will be enjoyed. It's a lovely sight to see in your garden during these slightly duller months.

Our coastline and waterways saw an influx of migratory birds from colder climates, who enjoy our milder winters. You may also have seen fields of geese, particularly the pink-footed geese, who love to feed on the waste sugar beet tops which are left behind from the harvester during the winter period. It can be a very surreal sight to see fields full of geese in quiet inland areas.

Our farms tended to be a little quieter but let's be honest, there is rarely a moment to take stock on a farm! Arable farms made use of any dry weather windows to get cultivations done and the last of any autumn planted crops in the ground (given how wet it has been I doubt there will be much more in the ground this side of Christmas now!). Otherwise, it is a vital period to complete annual maintenance on machines and buildings.

Livestock farms probably hit one of their most intensive periods, with nearly all livestock now inside, which is labour intensive with daily feeding and clean bedding needed. Cattle do not generally thrive outside over winter unless they can be kept on some very free draining soil or a purposely grown crop like stubble turnips. Sheep cope a little better and you will see these outside throughout winter as their small feet don't cause so much damage and mess. November is often a very important month for commercial sheep farms as the tup will likely go in with the ewes. The general rule is if the ewe is tupped on the 5th of November she should lamb on the 1st of April. Most breeds of sheep only lamb once a year and are reliant on seasonal change to bring them into season, they come into season as the daylight gets shorter. Purebred Berrichon and Dorset's are two who can breed all year round but they are generally not seen as commercial.

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

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

SIX WILDLIFE HIGHLIGHTS TO LOOK FOR IN DECEMBER

December is a time of year when some of us will be busy preparing, shopping and organising ahead of the festivities at the end of the month, but some people prefer things quieter or simpler. As always, wildlife will be ever present in our lives and I hope that no matter how you spend the month, the list of highlights below will help you enjoy the month:

1. Harrier roosts in reedbeds

If you have a reedbed nature reserve nearby, such as at RSPB Lakenheath Fen or the National Trust's Wicken Fen, it's worth paying a visit at dusk to look for raptors roosting- these should mainly be Marsh harriers but if you are lucky you may also see Hen harriers joining them too. It can be really exciting watching these beautiful birds of prey come in from all directions just as the light is fading; to glide over the reeds and then drop into their favoured spot for the night.

2. Lesser redpoll and Siskin on bird feeders

If you have Goldfinches visiting your garden bird feeders, you may also spot a couple of other finches which only visit for the colder months. Both Siskin and Lesser redpolls are smaller- roughly Blue tit-sized, but very different in plumage. Siskin are a streaky yellow and black in males, with female birds more greenish in colour. Lesser redpoll are a mixture of cream and grey with black streaks and a small red patch on their forehead. Males have a red/pink flush to their breast which varies quite a bit in intensity.

3. Mistle thrushes beginning to sing

In quiet areas with tall trees surrounding open farmland or parkland,

you may hear the beautiful, haunting warble of a Mistle thrush. They are roughly the size of Jackdaws and their song a repeated short tune, often going on for half an hour or more. They breed early- often laying eggs in February- so their singing starts early too!

4. Jays collecting acorns

These colourful members of the crow family will be busy carrying acorns- up to six at a time- to spots to bury them ready for Spring. Then, when the Jays have hungry chicks to feed, using their amazing memory they'll return to the burial site, pull up the seedling and snip off the fat first pair of leaves ('seed leaves') to feed to their youngsters.

5. Corvid roosts in tall trees

Whilst Carrion crows are solitary, Rooks and Jackdaws will nest and roost communally and these roosting sites can number thousands of birds. If you see corvids flying overhead as the light begins to fade, try to see where they end up- they'll take you to their roost. If it's in a public area, then pause a while underneath as darkness falls to watch them swirling, lifting and settling again in a noisy rabble. All this communication is thought to be the birds reinforcing bonds and keeping up-to-date about good feeding spots.

6. Keep an eye on the 'Northern lights'

Believe it or not, every now and again it's possible to see the Aurora Borealis where we live. Keep an eye on this website https://aurorawatch.lancs.ac.uk/ or download the 'AuroraWatch' app if you are able- these track the Earth's geomagnetic activity hour by hour, and if it's dark and clear where you are at the time of a 'Red' alert, you're in with a chance. If you can find somewhere with a clear view towards the northern horizon, away from major sources of light pollution, like towns and industrial areas, you'll have the best luck.

It is with great sadness that I have to report here that on the evening of 16th October, eight cats were dumped in cat carriers on farmland at Didlington.

The people who dumped the carriers containing the cats were about to open the carriers and set the cats free, when they were spotted by the farmer and quickly drove away.





The cats came into our care in very poor condition – very thin and sickly. We took in four of them and the other

four cats went to our Ely Branch. We quickly booked them into the vets for blood tests for feline immune-deficiency virus and feline leukaemia. Sadly two of the cats tested positive for feline leukaemia. This condition is untreatable and fatal. The cats were already poorly so it was decided to put them to sleep. There is no cure for feline leukaemia, so it was the kindest thing to do, otherwise they would have suffered a horrible, painful death. It is very infectious. Feline leukaemia affects the cats immune system, making them vulnerable to other infections, anaemia or tumours. It does not infect humans.

Meanwhile the four cats with our Ely branch were also taken to the

vet but sadly three of them were also suffering from feline leukaemia, and were put to sleep. We take some comfort from the fact that the cats were not let out of their carriers when they were dumped, otherwise they would have been out there in the rain and cold when they were so ill. And they would have died a horrible death. We think the cats came from a breeder as they appeared to be pedigrees. If you have bought a cat or a kitten from a breeder and it appears to be unwell, please take it to your vet as soon as possible.

There is a vaccine for feline leukaemia and all the cats and kittens in our care are vaccinated against it, along with cat flu and feline infectious enteritis (parvovirus). If only these poor cats had been vaccinated, they could have been saved. We have had cats in our care die from cat flu, or had to have eyes removed because they were badly damaged by it, and also cats die from parvovirus. So it is very important that your cats are vaccinated.

There are some good deals around at the moment for vaccinations. Jollyes in Thetford will give your cats two vaccines, 3-4 weeks apart which covers them for a year for £33. For another £10 they can be microchipped as well. Some larger branches of Pets At Home, will also vaccinate your cat for life for £95. That is the first 2 vaccines, and then yearly for as long as they live. Of course all vets offer vaccinations too.




