
Lost Again (Inspired Nonsense or Alternate History)

Every year it's the same and this year was no exception. The Golden Globe awards were given out in early January and not a mention of Feltwell anywhere, not even a single nomination. Now, this is hardly surprising owing to the lack of film and television production facilities in the village. However, I had higher hopes for the *haut couture* worn by the ladies walking the red carpet but, no, none of them sported dresses by any Feltwell designer or seamstress. Lots of Armani and Bottega but nothing home grown. A sad night for Feltwell overall but there's always next year.

Now, Feltwell doesn't have a great track record as a centre for the filmic arts. I put this down to the failure at the box office of the 1957 film, A Felt Wellington Is No Good As Footwear. This arthouse movie, the first in a proposed trilogy focusing on the daily struggles of those living on the fen edge, had such an uninspiring title that it, and all reputable critics of the time agreed with this, was most likely the reason why it was a flop at the box office. It was rumoured during production that an alternate title of A Felt Wellington Will Not Fly but a Canvas Covered One Will was dismissed as being overly long to fit on the standard billboard of the time. I do believe that takings came nowhere near covering the production costs.

However, not to be disheartened at falling at the first hurdle those behind this valiant initial effort followed it three years later by releasing the even more ambitious but equally poorly titled, *A Felt Well Holds No Water.* This was another sombre arthouse piece concerning the plight of the now extinct Fen Tiger. This deeply thoughtful, almost surrealist and certainly semi-biographical film was amongst the first to use colour in combination with monochrome, to explore the guilt-ridden life of a tiger hunter

LATEST CONSUMER ALERTS AND TRADING STANDARDS NEWS

Scam Alert – Emails claiming to be from the National Crime Agency

We are highlighting a warning from Action Fraud who have reported a recent increase in reports of emails impersonating the National Crime Agency (NCA).

The email states that the NCA has evidence that the recipient has accessed and viewed 'child pornography' or other 'illegal pornographic content'.

The emails demand that the recipient make contact within a specified deadline. If they do not, the email claims that a warrant will be issued for their arrest and that the recipient's details will be added to the sex offenders register, quoting legislation to make the threat sound legitimate.

It is assessed that the intention of the email is to prompt the victim into initiating communication with the suspects so that personal information can be disclosed to be used for blackmail or to commit fraud. Unlike other emails which impersonate law enforcement, there is no up-front demand for money however, where victims have engaged with the suspects, they have demanded money at a later stage.

The use of such threatening language creates a significant and emotional impact upon the recipient. The time pressure that is applied encourages victims to panic and act without thinking, unknowingly exposing themselves to compromise and blackmail.

The NCA offer the following advice:

 The NCA will not send unsolicited correspondence requesting money or bank details. If you have doubts about the authenticity of a message received from the NCA, please call 0370 496 7622

Remember, your bank (or any other official source) will not ask you to supply personal information over email. If you receive what you think is suspicious you can report it to the National Cyber Security Centre by forwarding the email to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Scam Alert - Investment Scams and fake cryptocurrency exchanges.

We are continuing to receive reports of individuals falling victim to online investment scams, including fake cryptocurrency exchanges. Losses to these scams range from a few hundred to several thousand pounds.

Bitcoin is the most famous cryptocurrency, but there are more than 1,500 cryptocurrencies including other well-known ones such as Ethereum and

Litecoin. Cryptocurrencies only exists online and are not controlled by a bank, treasury or country meaning you can't get physical notes or coins from the bank.

Our advice is to always ensure you understand a cryptocurrency or an investment before transferring any money.

A cryptocurrency scam can take many forms, this could include:

- A fake cryptocurrency which doesn't or will ever exist
- A bogus investment which promises to put money in a legitimate cryptocurrency
- A dangerous website link that then downloads malware onto your computer

Which? have put together useful guidance on how to spot an investment scam - find details on their website.

The Financial Conduct Authority website also provides further details on how to avoid investment scams online.

If you think you have received an investment offer that you believe is a scam or you have become a victim of a scam, you can report this to us via the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on **freephone 0808 223 1133**.

Scam Alert – Consumer website Which? warns drivers to avoid search engines when downloading parking apps.

We are highlighting a warning from the consumer website Which? about scammers using online adverts to trick drivers into paying for expensive subscriptions when looking for parking payment apps.

Which? report that in recent weeks they have seen adverts impersonating well known parking apps including JustPark, PaybyPhone and RingGo on search engines, often appearing higher in searches than the genuine websites for these companies. Read the full report about downloading parking apps on the Which? website.

Which? advise drivers looking to download apps to pay for parking to use the official Apple or Google Play app stores to avoid the risk of downloading a copycat version.

Scam Alert – Automated telephone cold calls claiming to be from 'Visa'

We are warning residents about automated telephone calls that claim they are from 'the Visa card department'.

This follows a report from a resident who received a call which stated 'This is a call from the Visa card department, your card has been debited by £500 to Amazon and eBay', the call went on to say 'If you did not make these transactions press 1 to speak to a member of the fraud team'.

These calls are a **scam** and the claims made are **not genuine**.

If you receive this, or a similar call, **do not** interact with it in any way and **hang up**.

It is likely there are several variations of these calls stating different transactions, amounts and actions that can be taken.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account or credit card contact your bank or service provider directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or app. **Never** use details provided in a cold call.

If you have received a telephone cold call which you believe to be a scam you can report it to us via our partners, the Citizens Advice consumer helpline, on freephone **0808 223 1133**.



Feltwellians Around The World



Larry Weaver

I am the nephew of **Sylvan Ellwood Weaver**. I have been doing detailed research as I am piecing together scattered details of my Uncle. Our family has the consolation of four of his letters sent home shortly before his death April 4, 1943. As per actual war records, I am just now piecing together for his memorial which I will submit to the Nanton, Alberta, Canada war museum. I managed to find an O.T.U. picture taken at Pennfield, N.B. just before he left for England, Nov. 1942. That was 60 men. Now I see a panorama picture of Sqn 21, Squadron 464, and Squadron 487 the latter of which he was a part, on your website. Would it be possible to get a close-up of this picture so as to identify faces? That photo was taken early '43 and he wasn't killed until April 4, '43 so I'm thinking he may be there. I located him in the grainy picture of 60 men - if he's in your picture I'm sure I can locate him.

Unfortunately, his family did not have the consolation/luxury of knowing very much about Sylvan other than scanty war records. He has no known grave and is commemorated in Runnymead. There is a granite memorial wall at the Nanton Bomber Museum with 10,000 names. Sylvan's name is there with 3 other Weavers - unrelated. Of course oral records of Sylvan from my father, his younger brother and his older sister until her early passing. His family have all since passed and only 3 nephews and 3 nieces remain.

The war museums here in Canada sp. Nanton - the Bomber museum has limited records of the Venturas on which Sylvan flew. As far as I can ascertain, there are no remaining Venturas anywhere in Canada.

If I could ever afford it I would really like to visit Feltwell as it seems such an obscure part of our family history.

Any other information you could give would be greatly appreciated.

I sent Larry the photograph as requested and this is his reply.

So, I've been pouring over this photo but at the moment do not have a positive I.D. It was taken before the Amsterdam raid but it may have been taken after April 4, in which case, he is not there.

Do you know if there are two airfields, one at Feltwell and one at Methwold? Sylvan refers in his letters going into the village (which I presume is Feltwell) and there not being much to do there i.e. it's as dead as Castor (his home town) so for his parents to not have to worry about him. He did have a good sense of humour which I refer to in my memoir.

After some further email exchanges it became apparent that Larry was writing a biography of his uncle to be lodged at the Nanton Bomber Command museum as well as sharing with his family. I asked if I could read the memoir that Larry was writing and, fortunately, he agreed. What follows is the beginning of its serialisation.

Memoir for Sylvan Ellwood Weaver Born August 5, 1915. Killed in action April 4, 1943.

Written by Larry Weaver (his younger brother Armand's son)

So, because Sylvan did not write his own autobiography, nor could he tell any details after he died, I only have stories my Dad told me, actual letters Sylvan wrote home after being posted in England, and military records by which to put forth this memoir. I am not a writer by any stretch of the imagination but, I like you (the reader) have an imagination. When I read a story or watch a movie, I get immersed in the story and cannot tell the difference between me and the character I am reading about. In my imagination we are the same person. So, based on this I will write it in the first person as I imagine Sylvan would have felt. So, in some ways, it is a bit like a novel when I write as if I can feel like he felt and truer perhaps than when I write just the military facts recorded. Also. I do have the same DNA so a lot of my feelings and thoughts will be the same. Eg. I am quite sure our senses of humour are much the same. I can still have a good

laugh today from this story Dad told us about Sylvan: They were driving down the road in their car of that time - perhaps a Model A. Grandpa was driving and Dad and Sylvan were in the back seat. Sylvan pipes up, "Dad can you drive any faster?" Grandpa replies, "No, son. Why do you ask?" "Well, there's a guy behind us pushing a wheel barrow, and he's trying to pas, us!"

As I write in the first person I, Larry, will type I(S) so you will know it is what Sylvan thought or felt as I imagined he would. When I write things that I am feeling or thinking I will write them as I(L).

So, I(L) think that every human ever born regardless of race or colour, family or religion, has pretty much the same basic human needs i.e. to feel needed, loved and safe. When that is interrupted it shocks us. I(S) felt that way also. I(S) just wanted life to be safe. So, at the age of six I got a major shock. First of all my younger brother was born. That was different but felt good. It felt kind of nice actually. What was shocking about it was that Mom was sick for four months and then the real blow hit. She died! Was it my (S)'s fault? Where did she go? They told me she went to heaven to be with God. But where was God? Was he up in the sky? Could she come back out? Back to the ground where she could keep me safe? Daddy couldn't slop crying. My older sister, Reta couldn't stop crying. She had to look after me. But she wasn't my Mom! And she was only 8. I was six and baby Armand was four months. For sure Reta could not look after a baby. So Dad sent Armand away to live with some relatives in Didsbury who were unable to have children. What a shock! I no longer had my Mom - she was up in heaven and I didn't have my brother. How was he making out? 1 couldn't be consoled. So how could I have stopped this? It did seem somewhat my fault.

So, after a couple of years I(S) sort of forgot the shock. School took my mind off my little brother and my older sister Reta was doing pretty good at cooking and looking after me. Then Dad got interested in another German girl. I(S) have no clue how they got together but Dad was happy and my sister was even happier because someone else could take over cooking and housework.

Brian was born in Mitcham, Surrey, and during WW2 was evacuated together with his sister and two cousins to a farm in Devon. He remembers the time very fondly and the fact that he acquired a Devonshire accent while there.

Upon marriage he lived in Lingfield, Surrey, but as he had a printing business in Crawley he and his wife eventually moved there. A business colleague asked him if he would film his daughter's wedding as cine photography was Brian's hobby a the time. This was to change his life as, at the reception the cabaret was a Barbershop Chorus. This so impressed him that he sought out the nearest Chorus, which happened to be in Crawley, and joined that in 1971. Whilst there he joined a quartet called The Fortunairs which stayed together for over 30 years. They entered many competitions, winning two National Silver medals and finally the coveted Gold.

They were invited to appear on many shows including some abroad and a weekend trip to America where they did two shows and came home with a pocket full of money! They even appeared on the TV show Magpie on ITV. (This brought back some memories.)

The Crawley Chorus grew and performed all over the world—Canada, Belgium, America several times, Ireland, Spain, Cyprus, Germany and many top hotels such as the Savoy and the Dorchester and the Armourers Hall in London. They even did a season on the Natica, one of the Thames cruise boats.

The Crawley Club was a founder club together with Brighton,

Reading and Tyneside of The British Association of Barbershop Singers (BABS) which has now, in its 50th year, over 70 clubs and nearly 2000 members.

After many years the Quartet members were old enough to enter the National Seniors competition at the yearly National Convention. They won and went off to compete in the States were they came 4th out of 22 quartets. Good going.

Despite popular belief barbershop singing was not invented by the Americans but in Elizabethan England when men went to get a haircut. A lute would be hanging on the wall and men would start singing and harmonising. The art died out here but the Americans revived it and now have 700 clubs.

As you can probably imagine Brian's talk was punctuated with examples of barbershop singing, both from his own chorus and quartet and others and several personal anecdotes, such as this one. The, by then, 40-man Chorus had a regular yearly date at the Xerox staff dinner. One year Roy Castle was headlining and when they sang *Battle Hymn* he sneaked back to his dressing room, got his trumpet and joined in. It was magical!

And this one...

The Wedding Bell Rag was written by Charlie Chester and sung by him on the radio. It was written for his daughter's wedding. The Quartet asked if they could have a copy to uses and he agreed saying, 'No one must ever have a copy'. When they were in Old Town, USA, there was a recording studio and they decided to make a recording to send to Charlie. The guy doing the recording gave them a copy and as they left the studio there was a small crowd outside who burst into applause. They hadn't known that their recording was being relayed to a screen outside. They gave the CD to Charlie's wife who played it to him shortly before he died.

When Brian's father became ill he moved to Bognor Regis where he met his future wife Janet and retained his membership at Crawley which, owing to loss of members, slowly declined. He then joined the Burgess Hill Chorus with whom he sang underneath the English

Channel. After ten years together he and Janet got married and decided to start a new life in Feltwell. That was seven years ago. He joined the Cambridge Club which unfortunately lost its director Simon Hilton. They then slowly lost members and the Club folded. Brian stayed on as Director after forming a small mixed chorus but what with the winter weather, the cost of petrol and the A14 it just wasn't worth it, so he retired and joined Feltwell Breakfast Club instead.

Members showed their appreciation of Brian's entertaining and informative talk in the usual fashion and questions were taken.

Thanks must also go to Colin Clement who masterminded the technical aspects of Brian's presentation.

HARE COURSING UPDATE

Whilst numbers of incidents have increased ever so slightly in the last couple months, slightly above this time last year, so have prosecutions. We are currently in the process of charging four people from the incident back in October last year, whilst another four men were arrested and charged earlier in January with hare coursing. On top of that we have another male currently on bail after reports of hare coursing and being found stuck in a field in his vehicle (we have his vehicle too!). As you can see, we are working hard to make Norfolk a very unwelcoming county to those who wish to commit crime. All this work comes from work as one big team with assistance from local officers, our Op Moonshot team and traffic officers all pulling together to bring those responsible to justice

DOGS WORRYING LIVESTOCK

It's always incredibly frustrating when I have to write about these incidents as they shouldn't be happening. We have had two in the past where dogs have got into fields of sheep causing distress to the livestock, it can also have significant impact on the owners of the livestock. These remain under investigation with all options of prosecution remaining.

Please keep your dog on a lead around livestock at all times, no matter how good your dog is they can change in an instant and it also encourages others to keep their dogs on a lead.

If you're a livestock farmer please do put some signs up to especially in popular dog walking spots/footpaths to encourage people, we can provide some laminated simple signs too if required please get in touch.

WILDLIFE CRIME UPDATE

Norfolk Police have issued an appeal for information after further tests revealed a Red Kite discovered dead in North Creake in August 2023 had died from suspected insecticide poisoning.

Tests and a post-mortem exam were carried out through the Wildlife Incident Investigation Scheme (WIIS) at the end of November detected a number of pesticides and insecticides, including very high levels of Bendiocarb which has been concluded as the likely cause of death.

Searches carried out by police alongside National Wildlife Crime Unit officers and the RSPB investigation team to find the source of the substance have so far proved negative and now officers are keen to speak to anyone with information that may help their investigation or who has witnessed anything similar in the area.

Further toxicological analysis, revealed that the levels of Bendiocarb within the bird have not come from the approved use of such a product.

I have to conclude that this product has been used illegally in very close proximity to where the bird was recovered.

Bendiocarb has been the active ingredient in a number of insecticide products in the past approved to deal with wasps and ants. In more recent years the number of products including this ingredient has reduced and its approved use has been to tackle such species inside buildings. Products containing this ingredient can only be purchased and used by professional pesticide users, and only then can they use the product inside a building to reduce the risk to non-target species.

Red Kites are listed under Schedule 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside




We are currently dealing with some drainage work which has not only caused damage on neighbouring land but has potentially damaged the site of a European Protect Species (EPS) namely Great Crested Newts. This is an interesting job as it involves some incredibly unique water features called 'Pingos'. These are natural water filled pond-like features which were left behind after the last ice age by ice being trapped under ground and then thawing. They are incredibly rich in biodiversity due to their uniqueness. Sadly, many have been lost over the years but here in Norfolk and in particular Breckland we still have quite a few. We are currently waiting on survey data to prove the presence of such species, but we have already used our drone capabilities to capture the damage.

Another job we have been dealing with concerns the potential illegal catching of pheasants. Pheasants are a very strange anomaly in law in that they are a non-native species, and whilst most are reared and released by someone and at that point considered property, once released into the wild they are not owned by anyone nor are they classified as a wild bird due to the fact they are non-native. This causes many confusions throughout policing and the industry. This all said the Wildlife and Countryside Act does define under some sections that game birds are included in such protection. Section 5 of the act makes clear game birds are not allowed to be trapped by any means for the purpose of killing. The only exemptions are at the end of the season those who have released pheasants can catch them back up for the purpose of breeding. So, in short you cannot use any sort of trap or net to catch any wild bird or game bird otherwise you are committing an offence under Section 5 of the Act unless acting under a licence.



Householders to get free DIY waste for small projects

Norfolk residents will be able to dispose of small amounts of DIY waste at Norfolk's Recycling Centres free of charge from 31 December following changes made by Norfolk County Council.

The change applies to small-scale projects carried out by householders on their own home, allowing them to bring a maximum 100 litres (must fit into 2 x 50l bags) for free or one single item (maximum size of 200cm x 70cm x 75cm). Each household is allowed four free visits with DIY waste every four weeks. Anything beyond this will still be charged at normal rates.

Cllr Eric Vardy, Norfolk County Council Cabinet Member for Environment and Waste, said: "This is very welcome news for Norfolk residents who have carried out small projects on their homes or gardens and can bring these materials to us for recycling or disposal.

"From 31 December, the Government has set out the limits to household DIY waste which can be taken free of charge, but our Pay As You Throw service will remain in place as a convenient way to get rid of larger amounts. It's important that people are encouraged to dispose of their waste responsibly.

"In 2022/23 the County Council's Recycling Centres handled more than 60,000 tonnes of waste and 72% of this was diverted from disposal. We hope this change to legislation will be a further boost to householders to recycle as much as they can."

The change in policy follows Government abolishing charges for the disposal of limited amounts and types of DIY waste at recycling centres across the UK.

Prior to 31 December, customers with DIY-type construction and demolition waste will continue to be directed to the 'Pay as you throw service' which is available at all centres.

Traders must continue to pay for DIY waste.

Arthritis is a common problem especially in middle aged to older cats, although sometimes younger animals are affected too. The joints most susceptible to arthritis are the ones permitting free limb movements - called synovial joints. There are several causes of arthritis – it commonly occurs as part of the normal ageing process, leading to wear and tear on the joints, but in other cases it can be linked to previous trauma to a particular joint. Arthritis develops when the articular cartilage becomes pitted and cracked, resulting in exposure of the underlying bones, causing pain and inflammation.

Signs of arthritis often include sleeping more and some cats may take extra time or effort to jump up onto surfaces or show signs of toileting issues such as incontinence or missing the litter tray. And some cats will show changes in temperament due to pain.

Arthritis is usually diagnosed on a combination of clinical examination – examining the joints for swelling, thickening, pain and a range of movements. X rays may be helpful confirming the degree of bone changes.

To help your cats with sore joints, especially in the winter, make sure they always sleep on a deep, soft bed and keep the ambient temperatures warm. A key consideration is weight loss for cats carrying excess weight, as this hugely impacts on the joints. Some cats benefit from anti-inflammatory medication to reduce the pain, plus dietary supplements are often beneficial too.

If you are concerned about your cat, talk to your vet and see what help can be offered.


With the central heating on, a quick reminder of what else likes the warmth on our homes – fleas. Fleas were once thought as a problem in the warm summer months, however they are now a year-round problem. Fleas can get into our homes on our cats, on us, or just hopping in by themselves. Fleas feed and breed on our cats with female fleas laying eggs which fall off around your house ending up

under furniture or deep in carpets. There are a variety of veterinary licensed products available, which are much more effective killing fleas than products bought in the supermarkets or pet shops. Please ask you vet for the best products for your cats.

MANAGING OUR HABITATS AT RSPB LAKENHEATH FEN

Winter gives us an ideal window to carry out much of the habitat management work at Lakenheath Fen, as it is outside of the breeding season for the wildlife here. Between the months of October and February, we shouldn't encounter any nests, young animals or disturb any hard-working parents trying to raise their families.

So far this winter, then, much progress has been made in transforming our new land north of the river from intensively farmed arable fields into a wetland home for wildlife. For those readers not familiar with this project, in February 2023 the purchase of an additional 54 hectares was completed, thanks to a grant from the Morgan Sindall Construction Group. Hundreds of years ago our ancestors began to drain the Fens to turn the fertile but waterlogged peat soils into something dry enough for arable farming. However, wildlife lost out and the peat is now disappearing as it slowly dries and blows away in the breeze. By adding in sluices, dams and new ditches we are helping our piece of land to hold more water once again.

As I write this in mid-January, our excavator driver is working on the new land now and is making good progress with creating new ditches on a very large, square field that made up a good chunk of the land purchase. As he works, the water table is rising, and we hope that the un-grazed wet grassland this work is creating will attract breeding Redshank, Lapwing and Snipe. Work is ongoing but hopefully this Spring will see our first positive results. Every day the excavator is keenly followed by Great white egret, Little egret and gangs of Pied wagtails and Starlings after an easy meal!

Elsewhere on the reserve, the annual process of reedbed cutting is well underway. Each year, different areas are cut on rotationallowing us to keep the habitat varied. The longer we leave an area uncut, the denser it becomes, and these dense patches are favoured by birds like Bearded tit, Bittern and mammals like the Harvest mouse for nesting in. However, birds also like more open areas to forage for food in, as the small pools created in the cleared areas support small fish, frogs and aquatic insects (see photo). Whilst



cutting the reeds themselves, we will also remove sapling willows and cut back mature bushes. Willows are very happy growing in waterlogged ground and without intervention, they would dry out the reedbed and begin a process called 'succession'. This is where the habitat gradually reverts to woodland. Centuries ago, the Fens were wetter and would have resisted this change better, but now they are drier and more isolated, the reedbed needs our help to stay as it is.

All this work would not be possible without the dedication and commitment of our volunteers on our weekly work parties. Whilst we have six members of staff, we have dozens of volunteers so hopefully you can imagine the impact they have on what we can achieve.





A Meeting was held on Monday the 8th of JANUARY 2024 in the British Legion, Long Lane.

Ten Councillors attended, two members of the public, RAF Commander Geary and RAF Community Liaison Officer, Victoria Quamina.

RAF Commander introduced Victoria Quamina, Community Liaison Officer, who deals with complaints, volunteer opportunities and public events etc. He then gave an operation update and community engagement report for November and December. 48FW will be conducting night flying activities for two weeks starting 8/1/24. RAF Commander advised he would be leaving the role in Spring and would forward the name of his replacement as soon as possible.

Mr Storey said a proposal to include family members on short breaks for disabled children was due to be considered by Norfolk County Council as well as proposals to increase the number of preferences a parent or carer can make when applying for a mainstream school place from three to four. He briefly touched on a multi-million-pound Norfolk Fire & Rescue scheme to modernise buildings and 24/7 free bus travel for all disabled bus pass holders in Norfolk. He said parents and carers affected by the sudden closure of three Alpha Nurseries (Dereham, Diss and Downham Market) can get help to find childcare from Norfolk County Council. Further information on these and other matters can be found on the NCC and Borough Council websites including info regarding disposal of small amounts of DIY waste now being permitted at recycling centres (www.norfolk.gov.uk and www.west-norfolk.gov.uk).

Following his meeting with Andrew Wallace of Highways, Mr Storey confirmed 4 roundels, funded via his Road Safety Community Scheme, will be painted on both Lodge and Wilton Road within six weeks, coinciding with the white-
