Paid study examining impulse control in Parkinson's disease

We are seeking individuals with Parkinson's disease who are either:

i) not yet taking medication

OR

ii) taking Ropinirole as part of their medications (also known as Requip, Repinex, Aimpart, Ippinia, Ralnea, Raponer, Ropilynz, Ropiqual and Spiroco)

We aim to look at the mechanisms underlying how you control your movements. To examine this, we will measure your brain activity during a simple task involving finger movements, using non-invasive brain stimulation and recording techniques.

The study involves two 3-hour sessions, which take place at the University of Birmingham.

We provide compensation of £10/hour (approx. £60 total) for your time, cover travel expenses and can provide hotel accommodation.

If you take part in our research, we will learn more about how impulse control is affected in Parkinson's. In the long term, we hope this information will help us to better predict individuals with a higher risk of developing an impulse control disorder.

A very familiar phrase, but what does it really mean? There is no specific definition, because it is a phrase that can be used on numerous occasions. Generally speaking, it is accepted that it can be used when you don't know who is going to read it!

My letterbox is marked 'No cold callers or tradesmen' I'm going to have to look for one that says 'And no letters addressed- 'To whom it may concern' either! I haven't given it a thought until now, but you can't be too careful, can you?

I used to get a lot of mail addressed to 'The householder'. Sounds quite innocent, I suppose, but how did they know I am the 'householder'? Especially as they didn't put my name on the envelope! A bit of an assumption, in my opinion! I usually deal with

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN!



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LATEST CONSUMER ALERTS AND TRADING STANDARDS NEWS

Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from 'ASDA'

We are highlighting a warning from Action Fraud after they received almost 1,800 reports in two weeks of emails claiming to be from ASDA stating that 'you have been chosen' for a free prize. The email contains a link to 'take the survey' to claim the item.

Anyone following the link will be taken to a phishing website which will attempt to gather personal and financial information to claim the fictional offer.

Our advice is **always** to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and **never** click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

Scam Alert - Fake parcel delivery text messages

We are again warning residents about text messages claiming to be from parcel delivery companies stating they are unable to deliver an item.

Recent examples have included messages claiming to be from EVRI stating a package has 'arrived at the warehouse' but it 'cannot be delivered' due to 'an incomplete address'. The message goes on to say that the recipient needs to update address information via a link in the message.

These messages are sent by criminals who have created fake websites to look like the genuine ones, with the same branding, layout, and font choices. These are used to gather personal and financial information or take payments.

If you receive one of these messages do not click on any links.

Scam Alert - Telephone cold calls claiming to be from banks

We are warning residents after receiving reports of telephone calls which claim to be from banks making claims of 'compromised debit cards', 'unauthorised transactions', 'attempted withdrawals' or applications for financial products, like personal loans, on your account.

In a recent report a resident received a cold call claiming to be from 'Barclays', the cold caller then attempted to gather personal and account information before stating that the resident needed to post their card to 'their office' in London.

We always advise people to be very wary of claims made during telephone cold calls. If you receive this or a similar call our advice is do not interact with the call and hang up.

We also advise that:

NEED LASTING POWERS OF ATTORNEY?

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Your bank will never ask you to withdraw money or transfer it to another 'safe' account.

They will never ask you to reveal your full banking password or PIN.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account contact your bank directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or app. Never use details provided in a cold call.

Remember these steps if you are approached:

Stop - take a moment to think before parting with your money or information.

Challenge - Could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests, only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

Protect - Contact your bank immediately if you think you have fallen victim to a scam. Report it.

Scam Alert - 'New Council Tax bill' emails

We are warning residents to be aware of scam contacts claiming to be relating to Council Tax.

This follows information from our colleagues at South Norfolk & Broadland Council after they received reports from residents of emails claiming to be from 'BDC Council tax' stating that 'a new Council Tax bill has been issued' with a link to make a card payment.

Our advice is always to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and never click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

If you need to confirm a contact about council tax is genuine, or you have any other council tax queries, contact your local council directly, their contact information is available on the GOV.UK website.

Cold Calling Alert - Telephone cold calls regarding 'loft insulation'

We are again warning residents to be aware of telephone cold calls regarding loft insulation.

This follows a report from a Norfolk resident who received a call in which the cold caller stated that they 'needed to arrange a visit' to 'check insulation which had previously been installed'. The cold caller then made a number of claims about the insulation 'being incorrectly installed' and that they 'just wanted to check it was all ok'.

Our advice is always to be very wary of any approach made in a telephone cold call, **never** give, or confirm any personal details and **never** agree to someone visiting your home if approached in this way.

Reporting scams

Reporting scams you receive helps us continue to build up intelligence on the scammers and how they target people.

If you have received a telephone cold call which you believe to be a scam or think you have been a victim of an online scam you can report it to us via our partners the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on freephone **0808 223 1133**.

<u>Citizens Advice consumer service website</u>

If you've been the victim of an online scam you can get advice and support from Citizens Advice Scams Action: 0808 250 5050 (freephone)

You can also report Frauds, Cyber Crime and Phishing attempts to Action Fraud, the National Fraud & Cyber Crime (NCSC) by forwarding it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

You can report suspicious text messages received by forwarding them to 7726.

What is 7726? A free service for you to use to report suspicious texts or calls you might receive on your mobile.

7726 is a number that most mobile customers using UK networks can text to report unwanted SMS messages or phone calls on a mobile. The number '7726' was chosen because it spells 'SPAM' on an alphanumeric phone keypad – that's a handy way of remembering it.

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Feltwellians Around The World

Memoir for Sylvan Ellwood Weaver Born August 5, 1915. Killed in action April 4, 1943. Part 5

Written by Larry Weaver (son of Sylvan's younger brother Armand)

As I write in the first person I, Larry, will type I(S) so you will know it is what Sylvan thought or felt as I imagined he would. When I write things that I am feeling or thinking I will write them as I(L).

July 7, .42 I was assigned to #34 0.T.U - Operational Training Unit Pennfield N.B. The unit had just been transferred from Yarmouth, N.S. Of that year. Yarmouth was considered a better base for an operational and not a training unit at the time. By the time we arrived the base was just getting up and running and a lot of the protocol of running it as a training unit had not even been established yet. The airfield lacked the proper infrastructure to function as a training unit. It sorely lacked accommodation and 200 men were left behind in Yarmouth. This detachment was responsible for armament training that included gunnery and bombing. The separation of key training personnel deeply impacted the quality of our training. In addition to Venturas our Unit had various other aircraft. One of these was a Lysander whose primary use toeing gunnery targets for us practice shooting at. Problem was they were too slow and did not have proper towing gear! When we arrived however, some of these shortfall were being resolved, however moral was low. Training was to include 'ferry' training that would enable pilot graduates to transfer our machines to England upon completion of our course. The only reason the faster Venturas were chosen is there was a limited quantity of the Hudson Bombers to train in at Pennfield.

This place couldn't help but remind me of my Pennsylvania Dutch roots, close to St. Jacobs, Ontario where a great many Pennsylvania





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
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Dutch settled, and where my dear mother was born. It was chosen as an O.T.U. because of its similarity to the south of England where bomber units were stationed. It had a very low ceiling, was often foggy, similar to airfield in England sp. Feltwell and Methwold where we would be taking off from. This place wasn't without its problems though either. It was here that we were introduced to the Ventura twin-engined bombers. Over the course of training from '42 to the end of the war 59 airmen became fatalities at Pennfield i.e. they didn't die in action, but in training!



(Larry found the Course number 2 that Sylvan took. There were 60 airmen. Sylvan is the fifth from the right in the back row). There were 3 divisions of soldiers with two squads A & B for each division: Pilots, Observers or Navigators, and Wireless Operators/Air Gunners. There was twice as many Air Gunners as both Pilots and Navigators. Course 2 started July 20. '42 for Wireless Operators/Air Gunners and graduated October 10, '42. The Navigators graduated at the same time but they didn't start until Aug. 20. The scale of training for these four areas began to coalesce with the arrival of 54 Ventura 2 bombers between May and August of '42. These planes were dubbed the 'flying pigs' because of their cavernous fuselage space. These Venturas had major maintenance issues, so much so, that by the time I(S) left in November '42, 18 B-25 Mitchell's were brought in and Venturas reduced from 54 to 39.

Our speaker for June was Kevin Boardman. This was Kevin's fourth visit to the Breakfast Club and his chosen topic was the Life of Emmett Till.

Emmett Louise Till was born to Mamie and Louis Till, in Chicago, July 25, 1941.

Louise was executed in July, 1945 and Emmett was brought up by his mother.


When Mamie was two-years-old her parents moved from Mississippi to Chicago where they had been sharecroppers, growing cotton. They left some relatives behind. At that time Mississippi was a segregated state, with, for example separate water fountains for black and white people, separate restaurants, cinemas, etc. Even the pavements, where black people were expected to step into the road to let a white person pass.

There had been 500 lynchings in the

previous 75 years in Mississippi, often with a policeman in attendance as many of them belonged to the Klu Klux Clan. But they never saw the lynching happen!

Emmett had polio as a child, had a bit of a stammer which he just about managed to control and when he was fourteen he asked if he could visit his relatives back in Mississippi. Before he left for the summer vacation Mamie schooled him in what to expect and how to behave because the differences between living in Chicago and Mississippi were immense. Before he entered the train Mamie gave him a ring which belonged to his father and Emmett gave her his watch saying that every time you look at it you will think of me. After a sixteen hour train journey, on August 21, 1955, he was met by Mamie's uncle Mose. Mose and Elizabeth Wright lived in the small town of Money, Mississippi.

In the mornings Emmett and his cousins picked cotton and when the heat got too much they would go swimming or drive into town.



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On the evening of August 24 Emmett and some of his cousins drove into Money by Maurice Wright to visit Bryant's Grocery and Meat Market to buy candy. The market was owned by a white couple, 24-year-old Roy Bryant and his 21-year-old wife Carolyn. Carolyn was alone in the front of the store.

What exactly happened between Emmett and Carolyn is disputed but suffice it to say it annoyed Carolyn so much that she ran out to the car to get a gun. The boys made a hasty exit and told nobody what had happened.

In the early hours of August 28 Roy Bryant and his half-brother John Milam turned up at Mose's house and demanded to have the boy who did the talking. Mose begged the men to just give Emmett a beating, explaining that he was from Chicago and didn't know how to behave down here. Mose informed Mamie of the kidnapping. Mamie contacted the Chicago press.

A few days later Emmett's body was found in the Tallahatchie river, weighed down by a 75lb gin fan, so badly beaten, naked and shot in the head that it was only the ring that indicated it was Emmett.

Mamie was informed and the news of his death became front page news in Chicago. When Mamie arrived at the funeral room she insisted that his coffin was opened. The funeral was held in South Side, Chicago and Mamie insisted that the coffin remained open so that people could see what had happened to her son. 50,000 people turned up.

As a result of the publicity Bryant and Milam were charged with murder. The white population closed ranks. On September 19th in Sumner, Mississippi, the trial began. The courtroom is segregated, white people sitting at the front and black people standing at the back. Mamie is present. The national and international press is present. They cannot believe what is happening and how the black people are being treated. Clarence Strider, Chief of Police, is accused of hiding two witnesses in the local prison so that they could not be questioned and of hiding evidence. The defence is that the body is not Emmett's and that he is still alive hiding in Detroit. Carolyn Bryant's testimony was not heard at the trial as the judge had ruled

it inadmissible, because of this the reporters started to do their own investigations. Mose is a key witness and is asked to point to the man who took Emmett. A black man pointing at a white man in segregated Mississippi. Imagine what he must have been thinking and fearing. He pointed at Bryant. Mose was immediately taken by car to the railway station, went to Chicago and never returned.

Before the all white jury returned, Mamie left Sumner fearing what would happen when their verdict was delivered. It took them an hour to find Bryant and Milam innocent.

Four months later, under the protection of the Double Jeopardy law, Bryant and Milam sold their story for \$4000 to a nationwide magazine in which they explained how Emmett had been kidnapped, beaten, killed and thrown into the river with a weight tied around him.

The case of Emmett Till brought the issue of racism front and centre in America. 100 days later Rosa Parks gets arrested on a bus, Martin Luther King gets involved. Bob Dylan writes a song, Bobbie Gentry writes one and the lyric, thrown off the Tallahatchie bridge, goes down in history.

There was silence in the room for several seconds after Kevin had finished this most shocking and sobering of stories. The story of Emmett Till is told in the 2022 film Till. It's hard to believe it's true.

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
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









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The Cost of Missed Appointments.

Eagle-eyed readers will have spotted that since January 2024 I have been including the number of missed appointments, each month, at Feltwell surgery. This month, having enough data to make the exercise worthwhile, I am presenting the numbers in a different, more visual, form in the

chart below. Whilst the number of missed appointments each month appears to have settled in the low sixties the accumulated total now stands at 357. However, the financial impact of these missed appointments keeps on increasing, but, what is worse, in your editor's humble opinion, is that 357 other patients could have been seen by a doctor.



I can only echo what the partners at the surgery say and that is this, "If you cannot attend your appointment, please cancel it."

As reported in last month's issue, the funding the Surgery receives from the government is only increasing by 1.9% this year, despite, like everyone reading this, costs increasing well above that figure. "This year, practices will receive an average of only £107.57 per registered patient per year, for all appointments, tests, referrals etc.



This increase does not get close to covering our current costs.

The impact of the financial pressures is already being felt. The core income to practices fell by 20% in the last year. We cannot afford to pay for locums or over-time. "

Now, each missed GP appointment costs an average of £30. Using this figure I have calculated the accumulated cost of all the missed appointments so far this year and this is presented in the chart below. If there are no more missed appointments this year the cost will remain at £10,710, money that has to be spent to pay the bills and the staff but for which no direct medical benefit is received.



Why am I doing this? I'm highlighting this issue for several reasons. First, to stimulate conversations which might, hopefully, raise awareness of the problem beyond the confines of this magazine and, second, to make people think about cancelling appointments rather than simply not turning up. Thirdly, because it is, ultimately, my and your taxes that are being needlessly wasted at a time when the NHS is under immense pressure to meet all of our expectations. I'll finish this article with this startling statistic:

A NHS England report in 2019 estimates more than 15 million appointments are missed annually in England. Approximately 7.2 million of these are missed appointments with GPs, costing NHS England £216 million per year.

THE FASCINATING CONNECTIONS OF THE HUMAN SKELETON: A HUMOROUS LOOK AT 'DEM BONES'

Have you ever found yourself humming the tune of "Dem Bones," the delightful spiritual song that cleverly connects our skeletal structure in a way that makes both children and adults tap their feet? If not, let's take a whimsical journey through this classic ditty, exploring the marvels of our anatomy while having a good chuckle about the mysterious "funny bone."

"Dem Bones" teaches us about the interconnectedness of our skeletal system, starting with the famous lines:

- The knee bone's connected to the leg bone: This continues the line of connection down to the tibia and fibula in our lower leg, essential for supporting our weight and enabling our movements.
- The shoulder bone's connected to the neck bone: The clavicle (collarbone) and scapula (shoulder blade) work together with the neck vertebrae, offering a remarkable range of motion. It's what allows us to shrug, wave, and even scratch our backs when no one's around to help!

For instance, when someone says, "I've got a bone to pick with you," they're not referring to a literal bone but rather a gripe or complaint. 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
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West Norfolk Aviation Society June 2024 Report



WILDLIFE CRIME UPDATE

The last month has continued in a similar vein as the previous month, with lots of calls around nesting birds and the actions of a few who are disturbing them. It is a criminal offence to disturb any nesting bird and all work including hedge cutting where possible should be avoided until after the nesting season to prevent harm.

Sadly, I had a first this past month, with a report of a laser being used to disturb the peregrines on Cromer church. The laser was shone into the box, not once but twice, disturbing the female, causing her to clamber over her last remaining chick and fly off. She left the nest for several hours, but thankfully her maternal instinct clearly kicked in as she did eventually return. The chick seems none the worse.

UPDATE

After this newsletter was written the male involved 'handed himself in' and the following update has been made available:

The suspect who disturbed the nesting Peregrines identified himself at Cromer Police Station on Saturday 1 June.

The man aged in his 40s and from the Cromer area apologised and said it was a genuine mistake.

The incident was dealt with by way of a community resolution and it was agreed the laser would be destroyed, the man would make a donation to the Peregrine Project, and that he would engage in a formal discussion with a police officer about the safe use of lasers.

Officers have also dealt with a young teenager who was using an air rifle at wild birds. The teenager has been dealt with on a local level. This is a concerning trend being seen across the country in urban areas, with ongoing work at a national level to tackle the issue with potential legislation changes in the future. As a force we will always take appropriate action and deal with those involved, such incidents can also effect individuals should they wish to apply for shotgun or firearms licences in the future.

CURIOS NO. 10

First, the answer to Curio No. 9 from last month.



Ans: In the days before CDs - even before the days of the Dansette Record player, large 78 rpm records were made from a hard, brittle compound called shellac and were played on big, electric radiograms or smaller "wind-up" record players. The stylus or needle through which the sound was amplified wore out quite quickly. Silver steel "needles" were supposed to last for 10 plays (gold coloured ones at least twice as long - but who was counting?) By inserting a worn needle in the nib at the end of the honing tool, it was possible to sharpen a worn needle. (But presumably an oversharpened needle might damage the record's playing surface!).

And now for this month's curio. See photograph over page.

brought this gadget into the museum but everyone there had no idea what it was used for.

FISHING AND THE LAW

The closed fishing season ends at the end of the day on the 15th of June, and from then people can start fishing on rivers and other moving waters.

That said, there are many rules and bylaws you must be aware of before just heading out fishing on rivers.

The first thing you need, no matter whether you fish on rivers, private lakes or fishing clubs, you must have a valid rod licence. You must also have the correct number of rods on your licence. Children under 13 do not need a licence, children between 13-16 need a licence but do not need to pay the fee. To obtain a rod licence visit https://www.gov.uk/fishing-licences. If you do not have a rod licence, you could be reported for prosecution.

During recent patrols with Environment Agency Fishery Enforcement Officers and Angling Trust Volunteers, we checked over 80 rod licences in two days. We issued eight enforcement notices for expired licences, fishing with a two rod licence when using three rods and no licences at all. Its important to remember EA Fishery Enforcement Officers are warranted officers and it is a legal requirement to produce a valid rod licence to them (or name and address to check the database these days) or any police officer.

If you are fishing on private land or waterways, you must have permission from the landowner, failure to do so you could be committing an offence under the theft act (theft of fishing rights). Always follow local signs as they are put in place for a reason.

There are also many laws around whether certain fish can be caught and taken or have to be released. It is important you are fully aware, if you plan to take any fish, the limits which are available here: https://www.gov.uk/freshwater-rod-fishing-rules/fish-size-and-catch-limits

CATS

We often take phone calls from a member of the public whose relative has died leaving one or more cats, that no family member can take in. If the

house where the owner lived is rented, the rental company may only give the family members a week to empty the house. One case in particular springs to mind. The poor cat, having lost his owner, also began to notice the house being emptied. His favourite chair had gone, and he was left alone in the house feeling very lonely. Family members came in once or twice a day to feed him, but he was still very unhappy.

Fortunately, when we were contacted, we happened to have a space with a fosterer who has no other animals and fosters indoors, so the cat went to her. He eats well and uses the litter tray, but she can tell that he is very sad. His world has changed and he doesn't understand why. The cat, called Boy, approaches her for a fuss and enjoys sitting on her lap, but the fosterer can still tell that he is sad.

If the house of the person who has died is owned, then the family members have a little more time to empty the house until it is sold. But it still means that the cat which is left behind spends a lot of time on his own. One such cat only had the conservatory to live in and could come and go through a cat flap. But how does he feel when he comes home and there is no one there to greet him? He could spend longer and longer time away from home, and maybe he won't come back at all, because there is no one there. On this occasion Bond, as he is called, came into our care. But we don't always have an indoor foster space, so this large black cat is in one of our outside pens, in a fosterer's garden. He is also confused and cannot understand why his world has changed.

It was fortunate for these 2 black cats, both in their golden years, that we had space to take them in. But what if we were full where would they go then? We are a very small branch with only 10 spaces for cats or kittens, and sometimes we are full and have a waiting list of cats needing to come into our care, for whatever reason.

If elderly owners of cats were to sign up to our Cat Guardian scheme, they would be reassured that their cat will be taken care of if they are no longer there. It means that your cat would automatically be taken into our care, and if our branch was full, they would go to one of our rehoming centres at Dereham or Downham Market. If you were to sign up with us, we would take details of your cat's specific details, likes and dislikes and what kind of homes they would be best suited to.

Its free to join, you just complete one of our registration forms and return it to us by freepost. You will be sent a Cat Guardians Welcome pack so you can let your friends and family know you are part of the service. The welcome pack contains a registration certificate to be kept with your personal documents and a wallet card to be kept on your person. These two items will notify people of your wish for Cats Protection to take care of your cats should anything happen to you. You will receive a key fob and a window sticker that will alert people to the fact that you are a cat owner.

MARVELLOUS BUT MISUNDERSTOOD MOTHS

The world that moths live in is shrouded in mystery and often misunderstanding, too. At Lakenheath Fen, we hold regular (monthly during Spring, Summer and Autumn) public events where we empty our harmless moth trap from the night before in front of visitors who have booked to see them. When we set our moth trap, it not only helps us to see what types of moths are living on the reserve, but we also count how many- and can compare the information to previous years. We also send in all our records to the county recorder for Suffolk (or Norfolk, if we see them on our land on Cowles' Drove!) and to an RSPB database for all reserves.

We often find that the public events help to show people the positive side to moths- many people just associate them with annoyingly ending up in lit places on warm nights (such as the bathroom!) or eating clothes and carpets. However, out of the roughly 2,500 different moths in the UK, just a handful will feed on natural fibres (like cotton, wool or silk) and none on synthetic fibresso our modern carpets, polyester jumpers and socks are completely safe anyway. Less than half of the 2,500 are attracted to light, so when we set our trap, what we actually see is less than half of the full variety that live on the reserve. Some species we find when we are out and about working on the reserve, and some have their photos taken by visitors too.

What we catch changes hugely with the weather and the seasons. Generally, the warmer it is, the more we catch and a cloudy, calm night is best of all. In the months of July and August we tend to catch our highest numbers- which can be something like it was on 30 June 2022, when we caught 291 moths of 68 different species. In the coldest months of winter, we catch often just single figures, but these catches can include some interesting ones such as December

moth (which has been recorded flying on nights as low as -4c) or Winter moth (whose females are flightless). It's important to trap all year round as all moths have a 'flight period' - a time in the year when they will be around - and we need to trap in that period if we are to record them.

Our largest species that we regularly catch at Lakenheath Fen is the Privet hawkmoth- whilst the vivid pink-and-green Elephant hawkmoth is quite well known (for a moth!) it isn't quite the biggest. We also often see Small elephant, Pine, Lime and easily our commonest hawkmoth, the Poplar hawkmoth. Their caterpillars feed on poplar and willow trees, of which we have hundreds, so we catch plenty of them! Moths are so often imagined as dull and plain in colour too- but the grass-green Large emerald, chocolate-red Ruby tiger or beautiful lemon-yellow Canary-shouldered thorn are some of the many colourful ones we see. And those that are brown, or black, or grey, often have really delicate and complex patterns on them, like the Carpet moths or the Rustics.

Although we put on regular moth events, you can also see them quite easily closer to home- in your garden, or local green space, take a walk on a warm and calm summer's evening. Look especially at fragrant flowers, like Honeysuckle, Jasmine or Buddleia and you may be surprised at the variety you will see as the daylight fades.




