

#### FROM THE HOUSE OF COMMONS LIBRARY

Exchange programmes are defined as arrangements where individuals from different countries visit each other's country. Programmes commonly have an education or cultural focus. The aims of these programmes can include strengthening links between individuals and improving foreign language skills.

Before we left the EU we where part of the Erasmus programme, an education exchange with 11 European members, including the UK. In December 2020, the then-Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, announced the UK would no longer participate in Erasmus and would establish the <u>Turing Scheme</u> as a replacement.

The Turing Scheme funds projects for participants from the UK and British Overseas Territories to undertake a study, work, or training placement in another country (known as an 'outward mobility').

Organisations, such as schools, colleges, and universities, apply for funding for Turing Scheme projects on behalf of participants.

Projects must focus on four main objectives:

- global Britain
- levelling up
- developing key skills
- value for UK taxpayers.

Organisational funding helps cover costs directly linked to the administration and implementation of a project. Funding towards living costs is also available for all projects. Participants on further education, vocational education and training, and schools projects receive funding towards their travel costs. Additional financial support is also available to participants from disadvantaged backgrounds.

For the 2023/24 academic year, 619 applications were received and 474 projects approved. Just under £105 million of funding was awarded for 40,000 participants to undertake placements in more than 160 destinations. Nearly two-thirds of placements are for school children, young people, and students from disadvantaged and historically underrepresented backgrounds.

## NORFOLK DEVOLUTION AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM UPDATES

#### Norfolk announced as priority area for new powers and funding

#### The story so far:

In December 2022, Norfolk County Council agreed an in-principle devolution deal with the then Government. This would have seen powers and funding transferred from Westminster to Norfolk.

On 12 September 2024, the newly elected Government halted the Norfolk deal. Ministers advised the council that they did not support the idea of single county deals with an elected council leader.

Talks were offered on an alternative devolution model and ministers signalled their desire to see a Norfolk and Suffolk mayoral combined authority.

On 16 December 2024, the Government published its Devolution White Paper and announced a priority programme for areas interested in devolution and local government reform. The Government wants to replace county and district councils in two-tier areas like Norfolk with unitary authorities, which run all services.

On 9th January 2025, Norfolk's full council discussed and then the cabinet agreed to submit an application to be part of the priority programme.

On 5 February 2025 the Government announced Norfolk as a priority area for devolution and local government reform stating that, "Ministers want to see a devolution deal covering Norfolk and Suffolk, with an elected mayor. They also want "two tier" areas like Norfolk - where responsibility for key services is split between county and district councils - to replace existing councils with unitary authorities.

To give time for the complex work of setting up a Mayoral County Combined Authority, the Government is putting orders in place to postpone May's county council election.

#### **Devolution and Local Government reorganisation update**

Following the extraordinary full council meeting of Norfolk County Council on the 9th January the council voted in favour of applying to be part of the Government's priority programme for devolution. If successful, this would mean that Norfolk would be best placed to obtain the best deal possible for Norfolk residents. We now know that Norfolk has been successful in getting into the Government's priority program for devolution, although that does mean that County Council elections scheduled for May this year will have to be postponed, to allow time for reorganisation to take place. The Government will be organising a public consultation on devolution for all the residents of Norfolk so that they can have their say on what they think should happen. Just to let you know that, as your county councillor, I abstained on the vote because I did not agree with the postponement of the May 2025 County Council elections. That was reinforced by my decision when I voted against postponing the May 2025 elections at the Borough Council meeting recently. As we were given a mandate to serve in office for 4 years, that in my view is what it should be, to allow you the residents to have your choice of who you want to represent you going forward in the future.

#### Scam Alert - 'Family member' scam text and WhatsApp messages

We continue to receive reports from Norfolk residents of text and WhatsApp messages where scammers attempt to impersonate family members to steal money.

The message will often start "Hello Mum" or "Hello Dad" and will say that they are messaging from a new mobile number as their phone was lost or damaged. They will then ask for money to purchase a new one or claim that they need money urgently to pay a bill.

The scammer will then provide bank details for the payment to be made to, with some coming back with further demands for money.

If you receive a suspicious message (even if you think you know who it is from), calling or requesting a voice note is the fastest and simplest way to check someone is who they say they are.

## Scam Alert - Emails claiming 'your pet's microchip registration has expired'


We are warning residents about emails circulating which claims, 'your pet's microchip registration has expired'.

The email, which often includes information about you, your pet and your pets microchip number, will state that you need to pay a fee for the registration to be updated.

Our advice is **always** to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and **never** click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

If you receive this or a similar email you are advised to contact the existing company that holds the registration for your pet's microchip to ascertain it's current status. <u>Information on all the current</u> approved microchip databases is available on the GOV.UK website.

If you do not know your current provider there is also a link to enable you to check your pet's microchip number to identify who it is registered with. If you do not know your pets microchip number speak with your vet.



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#### Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from 'M&S'

We are warning residents about scam emails circulating claiming to be from M&S stating that 'you have been chosen to receive a Marks and Spencer Afternoon Tea Letterbox Hamper'. The emails, which are branded and designed to mimic genuine emails from the retailer, contains a link to 'answer a few quick questions about your experience' to claim the item.

Anyone following the link will be taken to a phishing website which will attempt to gather personal and financial information to claim the fictional offer.

Our advice is **always** to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and **never** click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

#### Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from PayPal

We are warning residents about fake PayPal emails circulating which claim that a money transfer request has been made on your account.

The email then offers a contact number to 'call us immediately' to block this transaction if it 'was not you'.

This email is not genuine and is designed to panic the recipient into contacting the number provided on which attempts will be made by scammers to gather personal, financial and account details.

You can report suspicious PayPal emails by forwarding them to PayPal at <a href="mailto:phishing@paypal.com">phishing@paypal.com</a> or any suspicious email received to the National Cyber Security Centre by forwarding them to report@phishing.gov.uk

- •Challenge Could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests, only criminals will try to rush or panic you.
- •Protect Contact your bank immediately if you think you have been the victim to a scam. Report it.

#### Selling your vehicle? Never share images of V5C Logbook

We are highlighting a warning from the Driver & Vehicle Licencing Agency (DVLA) to anyone looking to sell a vehicle to never share images of their V5C Logbook.

This is because information within the document could potentially be used to obtain a fraudulent copy of your logbook which could then put the vehicle at risk of being stolen or cloned.

If you are looking to sell your vehicle DVLA advise you should:

**Never** share your logbook document reference number, a buyer does not need this to 'make checks'

**Never** share images or copies of your logbook, you can show the document to buyers so they can check the details match the vehicle but ensure they can't record items like the document reference number

In a recent call reported to us the automated call stated, 'this is bank security', before going on to make claims about payments that were 'about to be authorised' from your account. The message then offers a number of press button options to authorise the payments or to speak to a member of staff.

The wording of the call is designed to panic the call recipient into interacting with the message, if they do it is likely they will be connected to a call handler who will then attempt to gather personal and financial information which could in turn be used to commit further fraud on or with the account.

We always advise people to be very wary of claims made during telephone cold calls. If you receive this or a similar call our advice is **do not** interact with the call and **hang up**.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account or credit card contact your bank or service provider directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or app. **Never** use details provided in a cold call.

Reporting scams you receive helps us continue to build up intelligence on the scammers and how they target people.

#### **MUTTERINGS FROM THE FARMYARD**

As I write this, things are relatively quiet in terms of growing crops. We have had a team of ten experts in to prune the vines back to the fruiting wires, leaving what will be the main trunk for the rest of the plant's life. The suggestion is that some of the varieties are so vigorous that we should expect a modest crop of grapes this year from those and leading shoots have been tied down to encourage that. It is good to think that we might get something to taste this autumn.

We have used the time to do various essential maintenance and to demolish a small cart lodge. This was presumably built soon after the 2nd world war and the timber had rotted and allowed the roof to fall in. The corrugated iron, however, which had been reused from its wartime use, was mainly still strong and at least twice as heavy as anything I could buy today.

The sugar beet has all been delivered and because of the very wet weather last year produced a record yield. Whether we can repeat this during the current year is very much open to question. We have been informed that insecticidal seed treatments will no longer be available and so controlling the aphids that are the vectors of beet virus yellows disease will be much more problematic. Virus yellows decimated some beet crops in 2020 by 70%.

I, personally, am pleased that the current government is determined to establish a better trading relationship with the European Union. I am, however, concerned that our negotiators may not understand how important gene editing will be to aid the breeding of more resilient, better yielding and drought resistant varieties of crops in the future. Europe still does not allow this technology.

I must, yet again, address the issue of Inheritance Tax or the hated Family Farm Tax. I understand how difficult it is to appreciate that although the value of agricultural land is so high the returns from farming that land are so poor. The fact is that many farm businesses in the UK are only just viable despite the fact in many cases they are



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being worked by three generations of the same family. The current proposals will not be affordable to many families without breaking up their current businesses and losing all that knowledge and experience. All the major supermarkets are so concerned that these proposals will undermine the food chain and the ability of the nation to feed itself that they have written to the Prime Minister asking him to reconsider.

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Our speaker for the February meeting was Lt. Colonel John Fuson from USAF Lakenheath.

•The aim of his talk was to emphasise why the USAF at Lakenheath exists, survives and prevents a major war is

because of the relationship between America and the Uk, and between the airbase and the local community

John is a proud Texan through and through, born in Houston, raised in Dallas with the intention to retire eventually to the hill country outside San Antonio. As a young boy he wanted to be a marine Corp fighter/helicopter pilot after seeing the movie Independence Day. He had no idea what was involved in getting there apart from needing to have attended university. On a family vacation to the state of Colorado they happened upon the US Airforce Academy and his father convinced him to apply. Despite not expecting to be admitted he was accepted and in 2007 he graduated as a Second Lieutenant. By then he had realised that he wanted to lead rather than fly. He had studied Civil Engineering and had seen the opportunity to become a civil engineer officer.

He has had experience in Afghanistan, twice, trained as an Explosive Ordinance Disposal Officer (something that the US learned from the Brits—look up Draper Kauffman). He has worked with live Mustard agent and worked at the Armed Forces Mortuary Affairs office at Dover AFB, Delaware; a facility through which all US fallen service members are processed, x-rayed and anything potentially hazardous removed before the medical examiner can carry out their role. He has, therefore, a unique perspective on what the ultimate sacrifice looks like. His Masters degree is on Emergency and Disaster Management which gave him an understanding of the importance of communication and training required to manage such situations.

His first squadron command was in Niger where he served as the US Installation Commander in charge of all of the functions on the base, supporting Green Berets, Special Forces and partnering with Italian, French, German and Nigerian forces to help combat terrorism in the





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area. A disadvantage of commanding in a deployed environment is that you don't have the support of your family but you do have full control of the culture of the unit and the installation.

John's mentor was a full colonel serving at RAF Lakenheath and he asked him what he thought of coming to the Base. At this point John stated that the job is usually reserved for those who are up and coming and he is not one of those but his mentor ignored him and put him in post anyway in summer 2023. Now he has his dream job, being in-command of the civil engineering (CE) squadron. Notably, in December 2019 he spent a week exploring why it is so expensive to maintain US air bases in the UK. The reason? The MoD Défense Infrastructure Organisation. What he hadn't fully comprehended from that short visit was that half of the CE squadron are local Brits and the amount of pride they have in being part of that group.

He then moved on to talk about RAF Lakenheath and the 48th Fighter Wing. The 48th began in 1952 in France as the 48th Bomber Wing. As part of building good relations with the host country in 1954 after a flying demonstration on July 4th the Mayor of Chaumont bestowed the honorary title of the Statue de la Liberté (Statue of Liberty) Wing upon the 48th. The Liberty wing was born. It is the only wing in the USAF to have both a name and number designator. In 1959 the USAF was booted out of France and the UK government offered them RAF Lakenheath, a former 'decoy' base, designed to distract German bombers from RAF Mildenhall and Feltwell.

John is the 42nd commander of the CE squadron, a unique group with the most diverse set of capabilities and skill sets on any airbase. A traditional engineering squadron is responsible for the design and construction of runways, facilities, etc. They control the maps for the base, maintain all facilities (from changing a lightbulb to upgrades to the water treatment system). They are also responsible for the maintenance of the 1006 military family houses across both Lakenheath and Feltwell bases, 1400 dormitory rooms, also responsible for assisting 6000 families find accommodation off base as our neighbours. The other half of the 48th CE group includes the

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
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fire department (80-90 firefighters, 40% being British), emergency managers for chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear detection and decontamination and the Explosive Ordinance Disposal team. They are a 550 member organisation on a good day, 240 unlisted military, 12 officers, 3 dozen US civilians and 250 British direct hires or MoD employees making them the largest employer of British nationals in the area, some of who have worked on Base for nearly 50 years. John will be moved on after two years due to the demands of the job.

As commander John has three responsibilities. Firstly, to buy risk; only a commander can own the risk to his forces and their equipment. Secondly, to inspire everyone in the organisation. Thirdly, to build a culture that enables everyone to reach their maximum potential.

In conclusion, John asked a series of questions. Why is the Liberty Wing here? Why is the 48th CE squadron here? Why are F15s and F35s here waking us up in the morning? Why is demolition practice done at RAF Feltwell? A number of answers were given, some serious, some frivolous but in the end the answer is, Strategic **Deterrence**, so that we never have to get to the point of defence. But what is Strategic Deterrence? It is being so good, so ready for war that the enemy never makes it happen. Which explains why the fire brigade, the bomb disposal unit and the engineers are all in the same squadron. Should, Russia, China, North Korea or Iran attack, the first thing they would hit would be the runways because without our ability to respond, by getting jets into the air, they would have the upper hand. Consequently, decades ago, the Airforce decided that the emergency services and engineers needed to fix things would be brought together under a single commander who was solely responsible for the manning, training and equipping of forces to recover an airbase after an attack. Readiness is shown at Feltwell by breaking and repairing the small runway built a few years ago. In the case of an attack the Base would be instantly shut down apart from members of the 48th CE who would go out and assess the damage. Bomb Techs would check for unexploded ordinance, fire



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fighters would be putting out fires, CBRN techs would be setting out sensors. To cut a very detailed explanation short, the point is to have the shortest, usable strip of runway up and running as quickly as possible, so that the planes can get airborne. Arrestor cables would be deployed to enable the planes to land on the shortened runway. All of this "well-oiled" process is practiced a couple of times a year. It is assumed that any enemy will be watching and know just how quickly planes can be got back in the sky for a retaliatory strike and think twice about attacking in the first place.

# **UPDATE ON CAMPAIGNING AGAINST THE 'MEGAFARM' BY TERRY JERMY, MP.**

I want to thank everyone for their recent campaigning against the proposed megafarm to be built in Methwold and Feltwell by Cranswick.

As we await the result of the application for a permit from the Environment Agency and the Planning Application from the Borough Council, you should be proud in the knowledge that your voice has been heard, and national attention has now been brought to this situation.

Recently, the Telegraph newspaper ran a piece on the application and detailed the hard work of the Cranswick Objection Group who have raised awareness and lobbied the Environment Agency and others.

Megafarms more widely are a real concern of mine and we must continue to push back against such farming practices to safeguard our hardworking family farms who produce high quality British food.

Recent Freedom of Information requests by Sustain and Feedback Global found that intensive poultry and pig farms have violated environmental regulations at least 776 times in Norfolk and Suffolk alone. On average the breaches occurred at least twice a week, or nearly 10 times a month, between 2017 and 2024. Breaches included water, ground and air pollution incidents, including waterways being contaminated with slurry and excessive odours, dead animal carcasses being left outside rather than in sealed containers, farms being overstocked with more livestock than allowed and irregularities relating to the transport and disposal of farm waste.

Cranswick operated sites were amongst farms found to have breached environmental permit regulations.

I want to assure you I will continue to fight against this proposal in every way I can. In parliament I have been arguing that this proposal must not go ahead and called for a national conversation about the future of farming in the United Kingdom. *Continued over page*



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

### A New Chapter for RSPB Lakenheath Fen

In these uncertain times it is lovely to be bringing some positive news to readers, and we would like to spread the word that we will very soon have a brand-new off-road mobility scooter available to hire for visitors to the reserve.

Thanks to an incredibly generous donation from one of our supporters (who wishes to remain anonymous) we have been able to purchase a Tramper - something we thought would always be well out of reach of our modest reserve budget. For those who aren't familiar, Trampers are a brand of mobility scooter which can cope with the roughest terrain easily, allowing the user to go almost anywhere they wish to go in the countryside. It will have various adaptations to make it as accessible as it can be, including a reversible throttle so either the left or the right hand can be used to power the device. It will have a lockable storage box, so that visitors can leave valuables inside - perhaps whilst they pop into Mere Hide - or less valuable things like lunch and a map of the reserve!

We are hoping it will enable anybody with mobility difficulties to enjoy the reserve in ways they haven't been able to before, or in more comfort than they would be in if they had to travel on foot. We have spoken to other RSPB sites that already have Trampers and having one really seems to be a game changer- allowing family groups to visit together, instead of certain members of the family needing to stay at home because the reserve is just too strenuous to walk around. It will also allow people to travel alongside their family, friends or spouses instead of needing to be pushed from behind in a manual wheelchair, as is sometimes necessary. We are immensely grateful to our donor and very excited to see this asset begin to be used by the community.

A little more detail which you might find of interest. We were housed in the #1Barack block the first building on the left as you passed the Guard house. Between us and the guard house there was a wooden structure which for a period of time was occupied by a number of civilians from Northern Ireland who were contracted to paint the hangers.



Picture two, front row, extreme left, yours truly, Age 19, on my left George Winstanley from Wigan, the others I have no record.

My close friend at that time, Tommy McAleer was also Irish which led to many interesting social get togethers. To complete this picture, the American Air base was at Lakenheath at that time and they were usually included in the gatherings, which ultimately leads to the end of my story. Without fail we could always depend on the Yanks to show up in a couple of jeeps on a Sunday morning, bribe their way past the guard room and deliver copious amounts of the "hair of the dog" to the Irishmen.

The parties took place in Feltwell (Chequers), Thetford, and as far away as Kings Lynn.

Before ending I meant to include earlier that the pilot cadets always began their training in one of a couple of old Tiger Moths which

#### **TOTALLY ACCESSIBLE PREMISES**

My uncle was F/S James E Linehan (2nd pilot) and he joined 57 Squadron at Feltwell on 6 November 1941. He flew with 2 crews

both of whom were killed within the space of a week. The crew whom he died with were P/O Noel Percy 'Bill' Morse RNZAF (Pilot), F/S George Hillary Vogan RNZAF (Observer), Sgt Graham Lakeman (2nd W/O & Gunner), Sgt Norman Joseph Naylor (1st W/O & Gunner) and Sgt Roland Geoffrey Richards (Rear Gunner). They flew on about 12 raids together at Feltwell, the last plane being Wellington x3757 which came onto

the squadron on 4 April 1942 and was lost 4 days later with all crew on 8/4/1942. They were on a raid to Hamburg.

He was just 20. The rear gunner was 19

and had changed his name and date of birth to enlist

I've spent the last 4 years researching what happened to the plane and I've also managed to trace the families of the other crew members.

Could you possibly tell me if the RAF police were part of a squadron,

as my father was stationed at Feltwell in ww2 and I know that he escorted prisoners to RAF Prestwick in Scotland. He used to have a document with red printing on it and I'm sure it said 75 NZ squadron at the top but I was only a boy when I saw this, and have not been able to find it since he passed away some years ago. I also have a few photos; one outside I think the cookhouse and one of him in a rugby team with, I think, billets behind him and also one of him in the military band where he used to play the French horn.

There doesn't seem to be much information on the site about the military police and what their role was. Whis is perfectly true as this is the first time anyone has mentioned the military police at Feltwell.



We have to make a decision to either ask the vet to shave the fur off one side of her body (females are always neutered on the left hand flank) and look for an scar which is not always visible. The scar would only be around 2-3 millilitres long and as they are very good at healing, cannot always be seen. Or ask the vet to perform an exploratory laparotomy to look for a uterus. This means spending around one hundred pounds, as it would be the same for a spay. The other alternative is to wait and see if she comes into season.

Fortunately there is now a new blood test to determine neuter status in females based on detection of luteinising hormone. LH, as it is known is a hormone released from the pituitary gland in the brain which plays a role in reproduction. In female cats, mating stimulates the release of LH into the bloodstream, leading to ovulation. In unneutered female cats, LH is normally maintained at low serum levels through negative feedback from the ovaries, unless coitus or spontaneous ovulation has just occurred in which case LH will rise but return to basal levels within 24 hours. Removal of the ovaries through neutering removes the negative feedback and

subsequently the serum levels of LH in neutered females are higher. Levels above 1ng/ml of LH in serum is detected as a positive result and indicates that the individual has likely been neutered.

The test itself is a bit like a pregnancy test. Several drops of serum are added to the well on the test kit and the test is ready around 20 minutes later. A single pink like on the test indicates a negative result. She is not neutered. Two pink lines indicates a positive result. She has been neutered.

This is a great innovation and saves us time and money and gives us the result we need in a short time.
