UNEXPLAINED ENCOUNTERS AT A FELTWELL FARM

Some weeks ago, I sat down with Feltwellian Ken Lawrence who wanted to tell me about some of the strange experiences he had had whilst growing up at Muriels Farm. What follows is a collection of the spooky encounters he experienced.

"When I was six years old, living at Muriels Farm, we had no electricity, only oil lights to see our way in the dark. I had a night light sitting on my chest of drawers and mother would put it out when she went to bed and I was asleep. One night I saw something standing in my doorway, a grey shape about 5ft tall. It didn't do anything, thankfully, because I wasn't very brave but I told mother I didn't want a night light anymore. This happened only the once.

"One time we had a couple come and stay with us. Back then (1960s) you didn't sleep together if you weren't married so I had to leave my bedroom. The girl got my bed and the boy had the spare room. I had to sleep in the front room."

"One night whilst they were staying there was a rumpus but I didn't really wake up. I enquired the following morning and the girl, of about 18, who was sleeping in my bedroom said she'd heard a man talking, she didn't know what he was saying but she had screamed out in fright. My dad said it wasn't a man she'd heard but it was the ducks in the field nearby. She said, "It weren't no ducks, I know what I heard." Anyway, they swapped over bedrooms. In the big bedroom at the farm, you always felt like someone was looking over your shoulder constantly."

"Almost 20 years ago some other people were staying at the farm. A young girl, less than 10, went to bed one night. She shrieked out not long after. "What's up," she was asked and she said, "There's a man talking in my bedroom." She had no knowledge of the previous experiences of the other people." Ken was told about this and asked if anything could be done. In response Ken contacted the lady who had slept in his room in the 60's and asked her exactly what had happened and her story was identical to what the girl said, he then contacted a spiritualist called Eileen from Northwold. She said she would come over and investigate which she did. The house had had

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some alterations but despite this they were able to locate the area of the bedroom. After a short while Eileen said, "There is something here that shouldn't be," and she talked to it. After a few minutes she said, "There had been a tragedy here, not necessarily in the house but in the vicinity from before the house was built. The man who had appeared to Ken and the two girls is looking for his granddaughter. I told him he was upsetting people and he said he was sorry, he didn't want to but he wanted his granddaughter. I saw the granddaughter and she looked Victorian with long locks." Apparently, the old man had a limp arm but had it happened when the tragedy occurred?

Ken's father always used to talk about a big fire there had been up there but well before his time. Is there a connection? Is this the tragedy? Eileen said she'd sent the little girl and her grandad to where they should be and there shouldn't be any more trouble.

However, three months later the same little girl said she'd seen a man sitting up top of the stairs. Ken had a look, spoke to Eileen who said it was unlikely to be the old man and was most probably someone who had an interest there in the past and was just passing through. "Touch wood, he caused no further problems."

Ken recalled that he had also spoken to Eileen about the bedroom that had always felt uncomfortable. She said, "Go up there, talk to it and tell it he shouldn't be there, but if it wanted to be, it could. Afterall it wasn't bothering anyone." "I must say I felt a bit of a twit sitting up talking like that to an empty room." When Ken went down the stairs, he had a feeling of two hands on his shoulders pushing him down the stairs, this stopped when he walked into the new area where the house had an extension. It was a though something wanted him out of the old part of the house.

A young girl (now a retired Methodist minister) used to visit with her family when Ken was a boy and the last time she visited Ken asked her, "Did you ever go up to the spare bedroom?" She replied, "I didn't, I didn't like it. There was a horrible feeling." She must have felt the same as what Ken felt, like something was watching her.

"The old man and the little girl are what was haunting the place. I'm pretty sure they've gone," Ken stated.

"We were growing a lot of potatoes on the old airfield, 25 years ago. We'd had a wet week and were behind on the harvesting. I was working the chopper and my son was on the harvester. We agreed to keep the chopper going all night with me on until 2am. Around midnight, Jean came on the CB radio asking if I was still coming home about 2ish. We had a bit of a chat and I said I was."

"Sometime between 1.15am and 1.45am I turned the tractor around on the end and saw a man standing about half way down the potato field, I wondered what anyone would be doing there that time of night. As I drew closer, he disappeared. Now, why would anybody be there at that time of night? I turned around at the other end of the field and he was there again, caught in the headlights. This happened about three times. He was there, definitely, standing in the potatoes. I didn't tell anyone 'cos they wouldn't have worked nights if I had! My son arrived and took over at 2am as arranged. At 6am the next morning the tractor was standing in the yard. What's the matter? I asked. A bearing had exploded about 3am in a big blue flash. Is there a connection between seeing that bloke and the bearing exploding?"

"We used to have chickens back in the early days. We would put them out on the stubble after harvest in the morning but had to go out before dark to put them away from the foxes. One Sunday night, mum and dad decided to walk around on the airfield track after putting the chickens to bed about 9pm. They spotted somebody walking up the track towards them. Who was it? At this time of night. They got to within thirty yards but still mum or dad didn't recognise them and then the figure just melted into the night."

"We used to keep our combine and bailer in a big shed, the Marsden, and early Spring we would start doing repairs on it. There was always a feeling of being watched. My son, when he was a young boy, would only stay out for about a quarter hour and then he would say that he wanted to go back up the farm as didn't like the feeling."

"Many people said they didn't like being in the farmyard at night, they always felt uneasy. One driver wouldn't go round there without

any lights on but I never felt anything in the yard, only in the house."
"When you put all this together, it fits to the man I saw in the potato field. That's very strange."

When mother passed on father, one night, asked me if I'd heard the creaking noises like someone's walking across the landing. Yes, I had. I told him it was the pipes but I didn't believe that. It was just like someone was walking from the big bedroom along the landing.

The house was built in 1938, and altered about 15 years ago. There is no record of anything on that piece of land before then. The family had 82 acres to start with but the RAF took some which they never returned.

After WW1 2 or 3 people were given a parcel of land from which to make a living. On that size plot it was hopeless. In 1938 all the bits of land were amalgamated and the house and sheds and stables were built.

"We don't know where the farm got its name but father got the idea that the land once belonged to a reverend Muriel." As far as Ken knows there was never one of that name at Feltwell.

The question remains: was the man in the potatoes someone who had died tragically in WW2 or one of those who had struggled to make a living after the war and, maybe, died in a tragic accident.

Will we ever know?

Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from PayPal

We are warning residents about fake PayPal emails circulating which claim payment for a high value item has been made on your account.

The email then offers a contact number to 'call us immediately' to block this transaction if it 'was not you'.

This email is not genuine and is designed to panic the recipient into contacting the number provided on which attempts will be made by scammers to gather personal, financial and account details.

PayPal provide useful information on common email scams and advice on how to avoid them. <u>Visit common email scams on the</u> Paypal website.

Scam Alert - Text messages claiming you have received a parking fine

We are warning residents about a number of text messages circulating which claim to be notification of a 'Parking Penalty Charge Notice'.

The message, which claims the fine has been issued by 'a local council' states you have 14 days to pay, or the fine will increase by 50% with payment to be made via a link included in the message.

These messages are not genuine and anyone following the link will be taken to a fake but very convincing copy of the official government website, complete with accurate logos, branding and font. The page asks for personal and payment information including your name, email, phone number and home address to pay the fine.

If you receive this or any other suspicious text messages you can report them by forwarding the message free of charge to **7726**

To forward a text message follow these steps:

- 1. Take a note of the number that sent you the message
- 2. Press and hold on the message bubble

Scam Alert - Emails offering 'People's Keto Gummies'

We are highlighting a warning from Action Fraud after they received reports of scam emails circulating promoting fat burning gummies.

The emails claim that 'People's Keto Gummies will support burning fat for energy instead of carbohydrates' with a link in the message titled 'release fat stores'.

Anyone following the link will be taken to a phishing website designed to steal personal and financial information.

Our advice is **always** to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and **never** click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

Scam Alert - Fake parcel delivery text messages

We are again warning residents about text messages claiming to be from parcel delivery companies stating they are unable to deliver an item.



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Recent examples have included messages claiming to be from EVRI stating they are 'unable to deliver your package' as 'the delivery address is not clear'.

The message goes on to say that the recipient needs to 'confirm their address' within 12 hours via a link in the message to enable redelivery.

These messages are sent by criminals who have created fake websites to look like the genuine ones, with the same branding, layout, and font choices. These are used to gather personal and financial information or take payments.

If you receive one of these messages do not click on any links.

Scam Alert - Investment Scams

We are reminding residents to continue to be alert for contacts offering investment opportunities.

Investment scams can often be difficult to spot as scammers will design them to look like genuine investments. Initial contacts will often be by email or telephone cold call and will claim to be from well-known financial organisations like high street or investments banks.

Common investment scams include savings bonds, fake shares, cryptocurrencies, gemstones, and fine wines.

Scammers also frequently make posts or place paid for adverts often linking to fake news articles which claim that the celebrity or well-known 'media expert' named is promoting online investments after making large amounts of money from doing so themselves.

These post and adverts are placed attempting to lure people into making contact so they can be encouraged to invest in these investment scams.

In reality, the celebrities used in these investment scams have nothing to do with the fraudsters and their image and status are being used without their permission or endorsement. Any money handed over is likely to end up in the hands of cyber criminals with little or no possibility of you ever recovering it.

Protect yourself

- Be very sceptical about emails, cold calls or online adverts from companies offering shares and other investments especially if they're offering higher returns or are 'guaranteed' or 'risk-free'
- Never be rushed into making a decision, if the contactor is trying to pressurize you end the conversation
- Get independent financial advice before making any investment
- Never sign up to anything immediately or if you're told to keep the deal confidential

Make sure the firm is on the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) register of authorised firms, you can <u>check the financial services</u> register by visiting the FCA website

Which? Have put together useful guidance on how to spot an investment scam which can be found on the Which? website.

The Financial Conduct Authority website also provides further details on how to protect yourself from scams.

Scam Alert - Parking payment scams

We are highlighting a warning about fake QR codes on parking payment machines after reports of incidents across the UK.

Quishing, also known as QR code phishing, involves tricking someone into scanning a phony QR code with their phone or device.

The QR code then takes the user to a fraudulent website that might download malware or ask for sensitive information. It's the latest trend used by scammers to get your personal information and money.

QR codes are often found on things like parking machines, charging points, emails, even restaurant menus. Once scanned, scam codes will take you to a bogus website where you innocently input your details thinking you're paying for a service or visiting the genuine site, when in fact, you're sharing all your personal details with the scammers.

How to prevent Quishing attacks

- If the QR code is on a poster in a public area, always check whether it appears to have been stuck over the original. If the sign or notice is laminated and the QR code is under the lamination or part of the original print, chances are it's more likely to be genuine
- If in doubt, download the app from the official Google or Apple store or search the website on your phone's internet browser, rather than scanning a QR code to take you there. It may take longer, but it's more secure
- Check the preview of the QR code's URL to see if it appears legitimate. Make sure the website uses HTTPS rather than HTTP, doesn't have obvious misspellings and has a trusted domain Trust your instincts. If something doesn't seem right, don't share your details.

Reporting scams

Reporting scams you receive helps us continue to build up intelligence on the scammers and how they target people.

If you have received a telephone cold call which you believe to be a scam or think you have been a victim of an online scam you can report it to us via our partners the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on freephone **0808 223 1133**.

What is 7726? A free service for you to use to report suspicious texts or calls you might receive on your mobile.

7726 is a number that most mobile customers using UK networks can text to report unwanted SMS messages or phone calls on a mobile. The number '7726' was chosen because it spells 'SPAM' on an alphanumeric phone keypad – that's a handy way of remembering it.

I recently received this scam email pretending to be from PayPal. It even had a service@paypal.com senders address!

Here's your invoice

If this Charge is not for your Subs-cription Quickly inform us at (844) 660-4912 sent you an invoice for \$199.99 USD

What gave it away was this:

No reference to my name whatsoever, the dreadful punctuation and capitalisation and the nonsense of the sentence. I forwarded it to report@phishing.gov.uk and got an automated reply which, amongst other things, contained this interesting snippet:

As of July 2024, the number of reports received stands at more than **33,687,208**, with the removal of more than **188,550** scams across **345,407** URLs

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

In Memory of Flight Sergeant Sylvan Ellwood Weaver

Born August 5, 1915. Killed in action April 4, 1943. Part 8



Son of a Mennonite family, Sylvan Weaver, born August 5th,1915, grew up on a farm in the Fleet district. He joined the Air Force in Calgary in November of 1940 and after completing his training in Canada as a Wireless Operator and Air Gunner he was sent to England on November 6th, 1942. He was posted to the #487 New Zealand Squadron in December. While stationed in England he wrote several Letters home.

Dear Folks. England 19 -2-43

Received your letter of Jan. 17 yesterday. Sorry to hear mother isn't feeling well. I am fine but still have a bit of a cold. I'll have one as long as I'm in this country. You want me to tell you where I am and what I'm doing. Well, I really can't. We are in a New Zealand Squadron and on operations. That's about all I can tell you. There is nothing exciting happening here and especially around our station. I go to a show every night, either down in the village or on the camp. When we aren't flying,





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which is pretty often, we sometimes do a bit of skeet shooting. The weather is bad today so we are having a stand down which is O.K. because all week we have been flying pretty regularly. We have finished that parcel I received. The cake was really good and the cookies were even better than that. The coffee lasted about 2 days. Just about every Canadian in the camp was in my room making coffee. Over here it's mostly chicory and is really terrible. So far I haven't received any cigarettes. It takes quite a while for them to come. Keep sending 300 per week.

Well. I can't think of anything to write about so will close.

Dear Folks, England 28-2-43

Well. I received another letter from you the day before yesterday so had better get busy and answer it. We had a pretty busy two weeks except for one day off. Sunday is the same as any other day in the week here. We have a church service at 9:15 Sunday morning but I have never gone as I am either in bed or over at the hanger at that time of the morning. This must be a pretty cold winter over there! The weather here isn't bad but it is too damp. The air is always damp and if you don't have a fire on, the room and your clothes are all wet in the mornings. The mails must not be getting over to Canada very well from this side. My Pilot's folks don't get half of the letters he writes and he sends 3 or 4 times as many as I do. I don't get the Castor paper. There is a new regulation isn't there about sending the paper over? Our observer, Staff O'Connor. had a quart of chicken sent over. We heated it in our mess tins over the fireplace. It was really lovely. Hope my box gets here soon. We still get plenty to eat but it is the same thing day after day. I've been longing for some sauerkraut; if you could send some over. I'd really enjoy it. Don't worry about me not taking care of myself. The village here is as dead as Castor; you couldn't go wrong if you tried. Well, will close. Hope this gets to you O.K. All the best.

P.S. Had another letter from Eddie Dorval. He hasn't received any mail from home for over 6 weeks. If his folks haven't had any from him. tell them he's O.K. and having a good time at Gibraltar. By the way. I don't believe we will be going to the East. The planes we would be in are terrible so we will stay here if possible.

Our speaker for September was Robert Enderby. This was Robert's third visit and he choose, this time, to talk about fraud.

 Fraud is the most commonly experienced crime in the UK, affecting UK society economically and socially. It

accounts for over 40% of crime in England and Wales. According to the Office of National Statistics, it was the most common crime type between April 2022-March 2023, with an estimated 3.5 million incidents of fraud experienced by adults aged 16 and over.

Four fifths of reported fraud are cyber-enabled according to the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau. The most common types of fraud in the UK are payment diversion fraud, investment fraud, romance fraud, courier fraud as well as cheque, plastic card and online bank account fraud. Further information on the different fraud types can be found at https://stopthinkfraud.campaign.gov.uk./


Nobody is immune from fraud. The criminals behind it target people online and in their homes, often emotionally manipulating their victims before they steal money or personal data. By staying vigilant and always taking a moment to stop, think and check whenever we're approached, we can help to protect ourselves and each other from fraud.

The sums of money stolen by criminals are vast and the impact on those affected is significant. In 2023 almost £1.2 billion was lost to fraud. (UK Finance Annual Fraud Report 2024)

Fraud offences and victim losses are likely to be much higher because statistics from the Crime Survey for England and Wales had revealed that fewer than one in seven offences are reported to the police. (Guardian article 19/02/2024)

Robert then went on to outline the different types of fraud as defined in the Fraud Act 2006 - The Offences.

Section 1 creates a general offence of fraud and introduces three ways of committing it set out in Sections 2, 3 and 4.



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- In each case: the defendant's conduct must be dishonest;
- his/her intention must be to make a gain; or cause a loss or the risk of a loss to another.
- No gain or loss needs actually to have been made.
- The maximum sentence is 10 years' imprisonment.

1. Fraud by false representation (Section 2)

The defendant:

- made a false representation
- dishonestly
- knowing that the representation was or might be untrue or misleading
- with intent to make a gain for himself or another, to cause loss to another or to expose another to risk of loss.

The offence is entirely focused on the conduct of the defendant.

- using a stolen credit card in person or using someone else's credit card details online
- selling, or attempting to sell, an item which you do not own
- stating that a car, or other item, is in good working order when you know there is a significant issue with it
- collecting State benefits that you are not entitled to
- exaggerating your income on a mortgage form

2. Fraud by failing to disclose information (Section 3)

The defendant:

- failed to disclose information to another person
- when he was under a legal duty to disclose that information
- dishonestly intending, by that failure, to make a gain or cause a loss.
- Failing to provide relevant information about your personal circumstances or history when obtaining your insurance cover.

For example, not disclosing an underlying health condition when obtaining medical insurance or failing to inform the insurer about a



You make an insurance claim because you believe that you have lost your wedding ring. You subsequently find the ring, but you do not inform your insurer and take the payout anyway.

3. Fraud by abuse of position (Section 4)

The defendant:

- occupies a position in which he was expected to safeguard, or not to act against, the financial interests of another person
- abused that position
- dishonestly
- intending by that abuse to make a gain/cause a loss
- The abuse may consist of an omission rather than an act.

Examples include:

- A family member who has power of attorney for a mentally incapacitated relative using their position to take money from the person's bank account.
- An employee who deliberately abuses their position to give discounts or contracts to friends, family or other favoured associates.
- A charity trustee who steals charity funds.

More information from Robert's talk on fraud, how to avoid it and where to get help and advice will be included in future months as and when I can squeeze it in.

There must be some of my dear readers who have similar worries and the initial advice would be to Google the subject. However, the results can be confusing here is SO mγ "nutshell" version to get you started. As we grow older, we may discover that we don't remember information as well as we used to, we misplace things or forget to pay a bill. This is normal but, if the memory problems become more serious, we may have

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trouble driving, using the 'phone, or finding the way home. 



The Mounting Cost of Missed Appointments at the Surgery.

A sizeable drop in NO-SHOWS in August which is the biggest monthly drop since we started following these figures. Maybe the message is getting through, we will have to wait for future figures to be sure. They fell in August by 20, from

61 to 41. This brings the total number of missed appointments for the year so far to **531**.



This means that 531 other patients could have been seen by a doctor in the first 8 months of 2024 if only people had cancelled their appointments rather than simply not turning up.

"Please, if you cannot attend your appointment, cancel it."

Each missed GP appointment costs an average of £30, therefore, the cost of all of the missed appointments so far this year is £15,930, money that has to be spent to pay the bills and the staff but for which no direct healthcare benefit is received by anyone. The additional 41 missed appointments in August represent a loss of £1,230 worth of lost healthcare for the month. *See over.*





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

OCTOBER ON THE BIRD RESERVE

Whilst Summer in astronomical terms may have now finished weeks ago, at the end of August, on the reserve and in the wider countryside the transition into autumn and towards winter is much more gradual and gentle- thankfully for us! In October, on fair weather days there will still be dragonflies to see- these will mostly be the smaller Common Darters- where the male is bright red and the female a sandy-brown. There will also be a few of the very elegant Willow Emerald Damselflies too- as their name suggests they are a beautiful metallic green and look impossibly slender, with fully transparent wings. They have a weak, fluttering flight and are easy to miss as they float past you. But they rest often and are quite confiding, especially if you approach slowly- so you can often get a really good look at them.

We'll still have a few butterflies too, especially larger species like Small Tortoiseshell, Red Admiral and Peacock. As well as Comma butterflies, these will keep breeding so long as the weather is mild enough, so keep an eye on sunny nettle patches for their spiky caterpillars, and on late-flowering plants such as Asters, Buddleia and Sedum in gardens and parks. On the reserve they will be enjoying Buddleia and the fluffy pink heads of Hemp Agrimony. Comma caterpillars feed on either hops or nettles and are fantastic bird-dropping mimics- which means they often go unnoticed! Autumn can be the best time to look for some spectacular species of moth too-like Hummingbird or Broad-Bordered Bee Hawkmoth, both of which fly by day and are big fans of Buddleia, Salvias, Delphiniums and Lavender. And if you grow any Tobacco Plant (Nicotiana) at home, it's well worth a look on a warm, calm night for the huge and beautiful Convolvulus Hawkmoth, which migrates here from Africa, sometimes as late as November. They have a very long

tongue ideal for sipping nectar- whilst hovering- from Nicotiana's long tubular flowers and are quite a sight.

It also won't be too late to spot some summer-visiting birds, either. Unlike the Cuckoos and Swifts which leave the UK pretty soon after breeding, Hobbies and warblers like Whitethroat and Chiffchaff can often still be seen in the autumn. They are all likely to stick around for as long as the weather holds- because they rely on an abundance of flying insects- larger ones like dragonflies for the Hobbies and smaller ones for the warblers, as well as spiders. Talking of spiders-our special colour form of the Marbled Orb Weaver is looking at its best now- the females grow steadily throughout the warmer months but in late summer and in autumn their abdomens really swell with developing eggs. The more usual yellow colour-form is pretty striking but the rarer 'marmoreus' is quite common here, and in other fenland sites like Wicken Fen so a visit at this time of year to see it is usually rewarded.

The wildlife and natural spectacles of summer are not quite over yet - even if it is October. So hold fire from grabbing the hat and gloves and why not pop down to see us and enjoy getting close to nature? Whether it is birds, butterflies, dragonflies, spiders or even just the fresh air, space and peace you like, we hope you can find it here at Lakenheath Fen this autumn. Ticks love the autumn weather! However, unlike fleas – which largely cause skin irritations in cats and their owners, ticks can also carry a range of



serious infectious diseases. Ticks can be found in long grasses and wooded areas, especially where there is wildlife such as deer and hedgehogs. Here they wait for an animal or a human to brush past them so that they can jump on and feed. They attach using mouthparts and will feed on blood from their host for several days before dropping off. Ticks can cause problems in two ways.

Local tissue reactions: firstly they can sometimes cause redness and swelling at the attachment site. Disease transmission: ticks can spread diseases which pose serious health risks to both pets and humans. The major ones are:

Lyme disease, also called borreliosis, is spread by ticks; affected pets (and also humans) can develop swollen joints and stiffness. They can also develop a fever, anorexia and lethargy. In some cases the disease causes life-threatening kidney disease.

Babesiosis (caused by Babesia Canis) is an emerging tick-bourne disease, destroying red blood cells and causing acute signs of anaemia in affected dogs. Ehrlichiosis also attacks red blood cells and can be fatal.

Current evidence suggests that tick-borne diseases take many hours

after tick attachment to be transmitted. Using a produce that rapidly kills or repels ticks will help to reduce the risk of these diseases. No tick product is 100% effective however, so cats should be checked for ticks regularly and any found, removed with a special tick remover. Never

Parasites are still a big issue! Ticks and harvest mites both enjoy the cooler moist conditions of autumn and while fleas are in decline outside, they are quite happy to live in our centrally heated homes! Keep up with your regular protection and do check with your vet that it covers all the right beasties!

Firework night is fast approaching which can mean nights of worrying for our pets. Loud bangs and flashes cause anxiety, and, even in some seemingly relaxed pets, yawning, panting, restlessness and hiding may all be signs your pet is suffering from anxiety.

Preparation is the key! Coping with fireworks takes planning and preparation before and during the event. Many pets will benefit from calming supplements such as plug-in diffusers. In severe cases, anxiety relieving sedative medicines can be used to reduce a pet's fear and response and help them to be calm and settled. On the night, keep cats inside to help prevent them getting injured or lost. Closing the curtains and playing calming music or keeping the television switched on may also be helpful.
