

Scam Alert - Automated phone calls claiming to be from 'Visa'

We are warning residents about automated telephone calls that claim they are from 'Visa'.

The calls which state they are from the 'Visa security division' make claims about suspicious transactions often for several hundred pounds which it says have been made on 'your card'.

The recording continues to give press button options to 'speak to a member of our security team'.

These calls are a **scam** and the claims made are **not genuine**.

If you receive this, or a similar call, **do not** interact with it in any way and **hang up**.

It is likely there are several variations of these calls stating different transactions, amounts and actions that can be taken.

If you are concerned about the security of a bank account or credit card contact your bank or service provider directly using the Customer Service number printed on the card, on a recent statement or via information available on their genuine website or app. **Never** use details provided in a cold call.

Information Alert - 'Copycat' websites

Norfolk residents are reminded to continue to be aware of 'copycat' websites when looking to access official sites to apply or make payments for services online.

Copycat websites are those which offer services from Government Departments or Local Government but are not the official site and charge an additional fee over the genuine cost, even where the official application fee is free, for their 'assistance'.

Many of these companies are legitimate and it's not against the law for a company to offer a service similar to an official body

People often get confused because the copycat sites can be unclear whether they're an official service or not.

Scam Alert - Fake parcel delivery emails

We are again warning residents about emails claiming to be from parcel delivery companies stating they are unable to deliver an item.

Recent examples have included messages claiming to be from EVRI stating 'your package has been held due to an unpaid invoice'. The message goes on to say that the recipient needs to 'pay 2.45 GBP' via a button in the message.

These messages are sent by criminals who have created fake website to look like the genuine ones, with the same branding, layout, and font choices. These are used to gather personal and financial information or take payments.

If you receive one of these messages do not click on any links.

Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from the Royal Mail

We are highlighting a warning from Action Fraud who have received over 5,000 reports about fake emails claiming to be from Royal mail.

The email states that you have missed a delivery and that an item is waiting to be collected. In some emails it claims the item was sent by 'HM Revenue & Customs'. The email goes on to provide a link to 'view delivery options'.

These emails are not from Royal Mail and anyone following this link will be taken to a genuine looking fake version of the Royal Mail

Scam Alert - Emails claiming to be from 'Microsoft'

We are warning residents about a number of scam emails circulating claiming to be from 'Microsoft customer support' stating they have received '62 complaints about your email account from Google Drive'. It goes on to state that 'thousands of spam emails were sent out from your email address in the last 3 days' and that 'we require clarification now to avoid mail account deletion within 48 hours'. The email then provides a link to 'Run & Scan for viruses'.

These emails are not from Microsoft and anyone following the link will be taken to a website which will attempt to gather personal, email account and financial details or download malware.

Our advice is always to be wary of claims made in unexpected email approaches and never click on links or open attachments if approached in this way.

Reporting scams

Reporting scams you receive helps us continue to build up intelligence on the scammers and how they target people.

If you have received a telephone cold call which you believe to be a scam or think you have been a victim of an online scam you can report it to us via our partners the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on freephone **0808 223 1133**.

Feltwellians Around The World

Memoir for Sylvan Ellwood Weaver Born August 5, 1915. ↓ Killed in action April 4, 1943. Part 7

Written by Larry Weaver (son of Sylvan's younger brother Armand)

As I write in the first person I, Larry, will type I(S) so you will know it is what Sylvan thought or felt as I imagined he would. When I write things that I am feeling or thinking I will write them as I(L).

The Philips plant located in Eindhoven Holland produced the majority of glass based radio tubes used in the production of radar sets. 25,000 sets and 250.000 of the EF50 pressed glass bases were quickly manufactured in 1941 and sent to England factories making the radar sets literally hours before Germany flattened Rotterdam with bombs and Holland fell to their occupation. But now radar sets and the precious EF50 radio vacuum tubes would not be going to the German Reich.

Operation Oyster was a R.A.F. Operation/raid carried out with daytime medium bombers among which Venturas of #487 R.N.Z.A.F. (Royal New Zealand Air Force) were used (flying at low altitudes of 100ft for which they were not designed) so as not to kill Dutch civilians i.e. they could see what and who they were bombing and the Dutch could see them coming. In spite of this precaution, 150 civilians became casualties. As I(S) said I missed it by 10 days. It took place December 6, 1941 after a month of careful planning and training for it. I arrived in Feltwell December 3 but did not get T.O.S. (Taken on Strength) into Squadron #487 until December 16. Because I was not a part of the preparation and also not yet T.O.S. into Sqn. 487 I was not involved. I heard all about it though and how many planes were lost and 7 soldiers killed. Oh well, this was the reality of war.

Sqn. #21 moved from Bodney to Feltwell to train our Sqn. #487 and Sqn. #464 of the Royal Australian Air Force. The R.A.F. Sqn. 21 was stationed at Methwold in the countryside 3 miles north of Feltwell. Don Palmer a local farmer there remembers the sudden influx or Aussies and New Zealanders. His Dad had managed a farm in Australia before the war, and when that fact became common knowledge at the camp, a lot of the airmen started visiting the farm. A lot of them had been farm boys so they showed up at milking time to help Don. Sometimes there were so many of them there were hardly enough cows to go around!

Our coming there in December of that year would be the start of operations in January '43. There were successful ones as well as numerous bad ones. During the winter months Feltwell/Methwold Squadrons continued to fly 'circus' bombing operations on France and the Low countries. 'Circus' ops were low level bombing raids with heavy RAF Fighter cover. In late February/early March 1943 the Ventura squadrons were taken off bombing operations to take part in 'Operation Spartan' a major training exercise for the invasion of Europe. The Feltwell units were to make mock attacks on 'enemy' positions within the UK. During this, March 2, a Canadian piloting a Ventura crashed near base and all were killed.

March 28, '43 I(S) took part in one of the most successful raids made by our Group 2 bombers. Our Sqn. #487 with Sqn. #464 attacked shipping at Rotterdam. 6 ships were reported damaged 3 of them with direct hits. March 29, all 3 Squadrons made two separate attacks causing considerable damage to the port installations and shipping.

April 1 - 3, '43 our Squadron moved from Feltwell to Methwold about 3 miles away. This new base was not as well appointed as the peacetime station at Feltwell. Diary records say: it did not take long for us to settle down and were soon agreed that it was not a bad place: after all we still visited Feltwell. Group Captain Kippenberger was still 'King of the Castle' and that meant quite a lot. The move

was completed by the evening of April 3 and in the early afternoon of the following day the squadron was able to send 12 Venturas to attack Caen aerodrome, and in the evening the same number bombed the docks and shipping at Rotterdam. I(S) was in this latter raid. We were in trouble of some kind (perhaps mechanical) but pressed forward to target to deliver our bombs. When we set out to return and had just crossed the coast of Holland flying westward, inadvertently flew over an enemy convoy. It was from this point on our flight was doomed.

I(L) will include the letter from the Under Secretary of State of the British Air Ministry as the next page. Following that will be two pages including three letters written home. I(L) will include some comment about some of the letters. The third one March 15, 1943 was written three weeks before he was lost but probably wouldn't have been received until much later presuming mail did not go by air. Sylvan's folks were notified of his death by telegram. In his letter Feb. 28. '43 he commented that he either was in bed (not accustomed to the cold, humid climate of England winters) or over at the hangars (there had been lots of mechanical failures with the Venturas), so I(L) think there would be plenty of questions directed at the ground crews. And then the last line in that letter heralding the 'Weaver' sense of humour. His last letter sent home, March 3, '43 was written 2 days before he went on a 9-day leave. It appeared that he had a few trips into London. One of those may have been to the R.A.F. hospital (used for Canadian soldiers also) in Uxbridge (a borough of London) where he had been called in for a check-up on his operation.

Also included here is of the letters sent to John Williamson's family as they seemed (to me(L)) to be more consolatory.

Syn. #487 stopped using Venturas after a disastrous raid on Amsterdam May 3, '43 in which 12 aircraft and all men except three perished. You will see that if Sylvan had not perished April 4, he may have succumbed in later raids. An interesting note: the moto of Sqn. #487 was: Ki te mutunga, which in Māori meant, 'Through to the



end. The Squadron badge was a tekoteko (carved sculpture of head and body of a Māori warrior) holding a bomb.


I(L) count it a great honour to have been able to weave this account of a great man Sylvan Weaver.

Our speaker for August was yours truly. I was inspired by an earlier presentation in which a quiz-like activity involving naming popular television programmes from the 50s, and 60s, caused great interest. I decided to do one that was

advertised under the tag line. "Anything can happen in the next half-hour." Some members of a certain age and no doubt some readers will remember that tag line as coming from the popular children's

television series, *Stingray*. What you may not recall is that *Stingray* was made by the gentleman pictured, Gerry Anderson.

Gerald Alexander Abraham was born 14 April 1929 in London. His paternal grandfather had his name changed to "Abrahams" by an immigration official upon his arrival in 1895.

Gerry's mother changed the family name to "Anderson" in 1939.

One highly relevant fact from Gerry's late teenage years involves his elder brother Lionel. Lionel volunteered for service in the RAF in WW2 and at one point he was stationed in the United States for advanced training. In a letter home he described a US Army Air Forces air base called Thunderbird Field, the name stuck in Gerry's memory.

After the war Gerry earned a traineeship with the British Colonial Film Unit where he developed an interest in film editing. He moved on to Gainsborough Pictures, where he gained further experience and he remained there until the studio closed in 1950.

On 16 October 1952, Gerry married Betty Wrightman and they had two daughters, Linda and Joy.

In the mid-1950s, Gerry joined the independent television production company Polytechnic Studios as a director, where he met cameraman Arthur Provis. After Polytechnic collapsed, Anderson, Provis, Reg Hill and John Read formed Pentagon Films in 1955.

Pentagon was wound up soon after and Anderson and Provis formed

AP Films, with Hill and Read as their partners. Anderson did freelance directing work to obtain funds to maintain the company.

AP Films' first television series was for Granada Television. It was called *The Adventures of Twizzle* and was a series for young children. It was Gerry's first work with puppets. Twizzle was followed by another low-budget puppet series called, *Torchy the Battery Boy* in 1958. These puppet productions made Gerry world-famous, but he was always unhappy about working with puppets. He used them to get attention and a good reputation with TV networks, hoping to eventually make live-action films and television dramas.

It was during the making of *Twizzle* that Gerry began an affair with Sylvia Thamm who he married in November 1960, following his divorce from Betty. Sylvia had been married twice before.

AP Films' third series was the children's western fantasy-adventure series *Four Feather Falls* (1959–60). Provis left the partnership, but the name AP Films was retained for several more years.

Despite the success of *Four Feather Falls*, Granada did not commission another series. APF got into financial trouble and the company was struggling to find a buyer for their new puppet series. They were rescued by Lew Grade, the Associated Television (ATV) boss, who bought the show. This began a long friendship and a very successful professional association between the two men. That new show was *Supercar* and, despite being five years old at the time, I remember it with fondness.

Supercar was developed by Gerry and Sylvia and Reg Hill and based on a story written by Sylvia. She took on a larger role and became a partner in the company. Supercar also marked the official debut of Supermarionation, the electronic system that made the marionettes more lifelike and convincing on screen. The system used the audio signal from pre-recorded tapes of the actors' voices to trigger solenoids in the heads of the puppets which made their lips move in synchronisation with the words being spoken.

Supercar was followed by Fireball XL5, the only Anderson series sold to an American TV network, NBC. After Fireball XL5 Lew Grade bought AP Films. He became the managing director, and the

Andersons, Hill, and Read became directors of the company.

Soon after the buy-out, APF began production on a new puppet series, *Stingray* (1964), the first Supermarionation-based British TV series to be filmed in colour. For the new production APF moved to new studios in Slough. This allowed them to make improvements in special effects as well as advances in puppet technology using a variety of interchangeable heads for each character to convey different expressions.

Then came the BIG one, *Thunderbirds*, which was inspired by a mining disaster in Germany in Oct .1963. From this Gerry created a new programme about an international rescue organisation. (Remember that letter Lionel had written during WW2?)

Grade was enthusiastic about the idea and backed a series of 25-minute episodes but after seeing the first one he was so excited that he insisted each episodes be extended to fifty minutes. Gerry had wanted actress Fenella Fielding to be the voice of Lady Penelope, but Sylvia convinced him that she ought to play the part.

APF was renamed Century 21 Productions, and enjoyed its greatest success with *Thunderbirds*, and the series made the Andersons world famous. However, it was cancelled midway through the second series because Grade was unable to sell the show to an American network.

During the production of *Thunderbirds* the Andersons' marriage came under increasing strain. Gerry considered divorce, but this was halted when Sylvia announced that she was pregnant. Gerry Anderson Jr., was born in July 1967.

Following *Thunderbirds* work began on a new series, *Captain Scarlet and the Mysterons* (1967), which saw the advent of more realistic puppet characters which, thanks to improvements in electronics allowed miniaturisation of the lip-sync mechanisms, could now be built closer to normal human proportions.

Two *Thunderbird* films were made but both flopped and Century 21 problems were compounded by their next series, *Joe 90* (1968). Here ends Part One.






The Mounting Cost of Missed Appointments at the Surgery.

A bit of a drop in NO-SHOWS in July which is good but then, on the other hand, they've only gone back down to being in the early sixties, unfortunately. They fell by 11, from 72 to 61. This brings the total number of missed

appointments for the year so far to 490.


This means that 490 other patients could have been seen by a doctor in the first 7 months of 2024 if only people had cancelled their appointments rather than simply not turning up.



"Please, if you cannot attend your appointment, cancel it."

As stated before each missed GP appointment costs an average of £30. Using this figure I calculate the accumulated cost of all the missed appointments so far this year and this is presented in the chart over the page. The additional 61 missed appointments in July represent an additional loss of £1830 worth of lost healthcare for the month. If there are no more missed appointments this year which, on past performance seems unlikely, the total cost will

remain at £14,700, money that has to be spent to pay the bills and the staff but for which no direct healthcare benefit is received by anyone.



Remember, that this waste of our precious GP time is, ultimately, a needless waste of your and my taxes at a time when the NHS is under immense pressure to meet all of our expectations. Those who follow the news will have heard that the BMA is so concerned about the decline in funding for GP surgeries that they are allowing their members to take industrial action should they choose to do so by capping the number of appointments per day. Which makes cutting the number of No-Shows even more important. Please raise awareness of this issue by discussing it with your friends, neighbours and even complete strangers you might meet in a queue at a checkout!

I wonder if the number of missed appointments would go down if people got a bill each time they failed to turn up without cancelling? Let me know what you think by emailing me at garlandp@btinternet.com.





"Recently we have had to reduce the service from 20 customers to eight, but those who are left are really in need of the service and it


is a dreadful shame to disappoint them."

WILDLIFE CRIME UPDATE

A response officer has sadly dealt with a pigeon trapped in a Fenn trap. Thankfully the bird was none the worse for the incident, but the trap had been set illegally. Fenn traps are legal if they are big enough and set in the correct manner targeting allowed species. However they must always be set with the trap in a tunnel/cover to stop untargeted species getting caught. If you spot a Fenn trap like this DO NOT TOUCH IT – instead, please take a photo and record the exact location (ideally using What3Words) and report it to the Police using our online form. Removing or touching the trap could ruin forensic opportunities.

We are also dealing with several reports of crows and pigeons being shot with air weapons in built up areas. It is an offence to kill any wild bird unless exempt under a licence. None of the general licences available will be applicable in these circumstances and therefore these birds have been shot and killed illegally. The latest incident occurred in Attleborough near Sainsbury's and we are appealing to anyone with any information to come forward. As a team we have carried out extra patrols in the area and handed out letters to highlight the issue.

We continue to receive a number of complaints around destruction of bird nests and disturbance offences. Although you may expect most nests to be done with by this time of year, it wouldn't be unusual to see them continue to be used well into September


RURAL ROAD SAFETY

Rural roads disproportionately account for the number of serious collisions our Roads and Armed Policing Team deals with. Since Norfolk has no motorways, many of our roads are considered rural and with harvests under way we can expect more slow-moving vehicles on them.

Getting stuck behind a tractor pulling several tonnes of grain for a couple of miles is not much different to sitting at a red light for 2 minutes. However some people take unnecessary risks when overtaking slow moving tractors, putting themselves and other users in harm's way. All motorists are advised to pass farm machinery slowly, to give them space and to remember these vehicles are legally entitled to use the road.

One final thing to mention around rural roads is the speed limits. The national speed limit often applies but that does not mean you have to do 60mph. You should always drive according to conditions. You never know what might be around the corner and the question to ask yourself is could you stop if you needed to if you encountered another vehicle or a child on a bike or a family out on a walk?

MUTTERINGS FROM THE FARMYARD

As I write this during the first week of August we have already completed about 70% of our cereal harvest which is very early for us. We have had a warm, dry break which has been ideal for combining and now a damp afternoon in which to fix a very annoying electronic fault in the machine and time to type these notes. Yields have been surprisingly good so far as we had thought that the wet summer was causing significant disease problems.

The wet winter and spring caused several of the Paulownia trees to die from surplus water around the roots. These have now been replaced and the remaining areas of the fields have been planted with new saplings. These and the young native trees seem to have enjoyed the summer so far but the young plants are receiving trickle irrigation on a daily basis.

The vineyard continues to thrive. When we planted the tiny, grafted vines last year they were like little babies that required plenty of tender loving care. The idea is that they should concentrate all their energies in establishing a good rooting system down into the chalk subsoil where the ground water is. This they seem to have done and the plants can now best be described as unruly teenagers. They have grown like crazy over the last few months. Many are over 8 feet tall and require almost constant tucking into the wire trellising for us to be able to get our tractor and machinery up and down the rows. They are developing woody stems which will be pruned back this winter to create the trunks that will be the basis of their structure for the years to come.

I see in the press that the French farmers are so disappointed in their yields of wheat that they are applying to Brussels for some

form of state aid from the European Union. I know that we now have a Government of a different hue but I don't think that there is any prospect, or requirement, for state aid of that nature for British farmers. What we need from the DEFRA team is stability and a long term plan that we can all work to. The new team is quite urban based but by all accounts seem very willing to listen. During my time we have had two Secretaries of State for agriculture in this constituency and both have been very happy to listen to our concerns but not necessarily ready to act on them.

The Paulownia trees are provided by Carbon Plantations Ltd.

From their website: "To achieve our goals and contribute to the UK Government's Net Zero Strategy, we have identified a fast-growing hardwood tree called Phoenix One®, a sterile (and therefore non-invasive) hybrid of Paulownia, which produces

strong yet unusually light timber with attractive insulation properties.

The fast-growing nature of Phoenix One® makes it particularly effective at carbon sequestration, and also provides a regular supply of exceptional, locally grown timber with a wide range of uses. This makes such plantations commercially viable undertakings with many environmental benefits and in line with the UK Governments Net Zero goals."

In 2022, they established their first project at Euston Estate in Suffolk. They now have four

sites in Norfolk. Trees at Euston grew over 4 metres in 2023! They produce enormous leaves as can be seen in the photograph.

CAN YOU RACE FOR WILDLIFE THIS AUTUMN

On Sunday 20 October we will be holding our annual Race for Wildlife, where our nature-loving supporters are encouraged to join us to run or jog either a 5k or 10k route across the reserve. We set both routes to take in a wide variety of different habitats and terrain, so you'll pass through not just the fen and reedbed for which we are well known, but also firmer woodland paths and the beautiful riverbank which follows the Little Ouse past our northern boundary.

There is a fantastic atmosphere on the day of the event, largely generated by our small army of wonderful volunteers. They will be dotted around the reserve in their hi-vis jackets, as marshals, water station helpers, first aiders and general encouragers of runners! For those familiar with the reserve, both groups of runners will start at the same point south of East Wood, and head towards New Fen. There, the 10k runners will continue down the track south of Trial Wood, through the grasslands of New Fen South and the reedy paradise of Shepherd's Fen, an area not normally open for public access. We are able to use this extended route only at specific times of year, such as October, for occasional events- when all of the birds have finished breeding and we can be sure we won't be disturbing any nests. Eventually, the 10k runners will reach the riverbank at Botany Bay, the furthest reaches of the reserve, before turning east and following the river to the Washland Viewpoint. Along the way, they will be combine with the 5k runners who join the riverbank at Joist Fen. Running together along the riverbank for around 2km, all runners will then drop down from the viewpoint to wind through the woods of Brandon Fen towards the finish line.

We will number each runner and time them carefully (this is usually my job!) and once every runner has crossed the finish line, I will

Did you know that cats and dogs can be blood donors to other cats and dogs? For cats the criteria to be a blood donor is that the cat must be between



1 year and 8 years old, and weigh at least 4kg. They should preferably be in indoor cat, otherwise they must be Feline Leukaemia and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus negative, be up to date with their vaccines and flea and worm treatment. They must never have been outside the UK and not be on any medication. They must be of good temperament and be easy to handle.

They will undergo health checks for heart murmurs and haematology and biochemistry blood samples will be taken for analysis to make sure they are completely healthy.

In cats there are 3 different blood groups – A, B and AB. Most domestic cats are group A, along with all Siamese cats. Pedigree cats are predominately group B.



To take the blood, the cat will be sedated and the blood will be taken from a vein in the neck. About 55ml of blood is taken, and then exactly the same amount of electrolyte solution

will be administered to the cat, to protect its blood pressure.

For dogs the same criteria as for cats apply for them to become blood donors. 1-8 years old, weigh more than 25kg, be up to date with their vaccinations and flea and worm treatment, not be on any medication and never to have been outside the UK.

There are 2 blood groups in dogs - DEA1 Negative and DEA 1 Positive. 30% of dogs are negative so they are the universal donor as negative blood can be given to positive dogs, but not the other

The reason a cat or dog may need a transfusion are numerous. Some of the more common needs for a transfusion are, anaemia, ruptured spleen, surgery when there is a large blood loss, rat poisoning, as this causes internal bleeding, trauma, such as road traffic accidents, sepsis, cancer, kidney disease, infections and auto immune problems.

The red cells of blood cannot be stored for longer than 35 days, and then in a temperature-controlled fridge. However, the plasma part of the blood can be taken off and stored in a deep freeze for up to a year. The plasma contains all the clotting factors and is used for animals who have a problem with their blood clotting. There are few transfusion centres in the UK for animals, so most vets keep a list of dog or cat donors, and call on them when there is an emergency. As in humans, dogs and cats can give blood every 3-4 months. If you would consider your dog or cat to be a blood donor, speak to your vet.

Mr Storey gave an update on the Queen Elizabeth Hospital project and following the change in Government said the leader of Norfolk County Council will meet with new ministers and MP's to discuss priorities for Norfolk and ensure the QEH is still on plan for 2030. The Council supported the Primary School's PTA's request to run a tuck shop from the Changing Rooms throughout the school summer holidays.

Residents are encouraged to deposit any glass waste into the bottle bank on the playing field as the Parish Council obtains recycling credits for every tonne collected.
